The Dells was honored at the close of the season by the selection of Benny Olson as all-conference guard. He was nominated by the ten coaches in the loop.

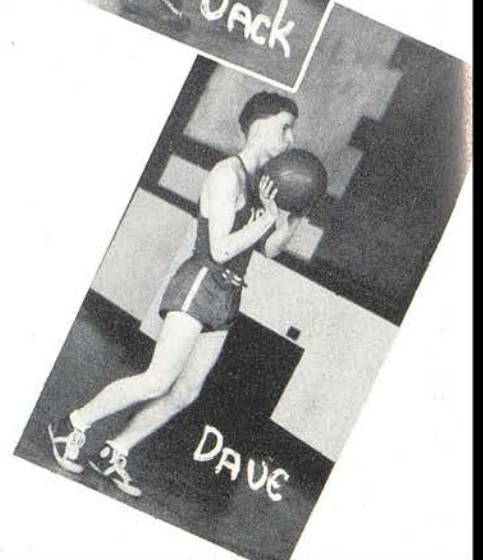
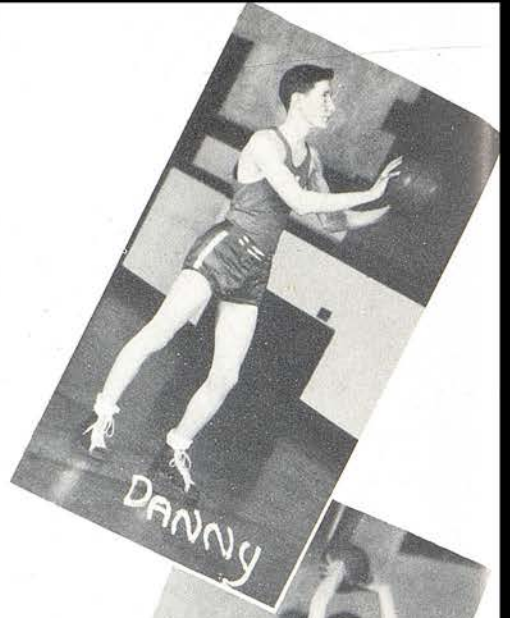
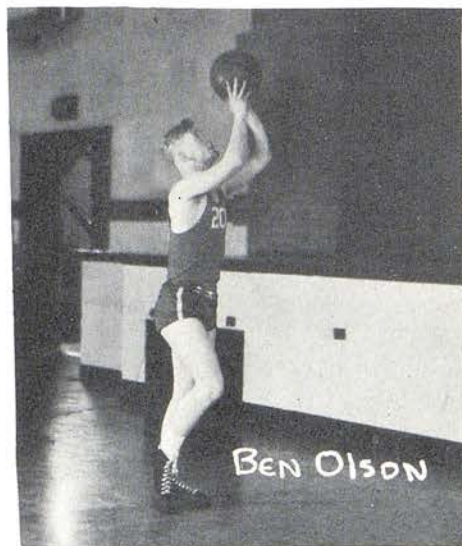
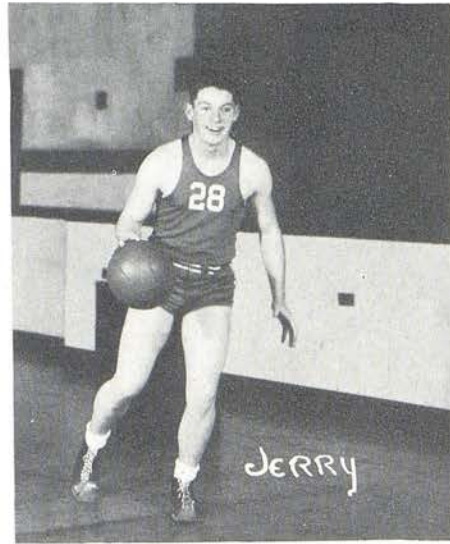
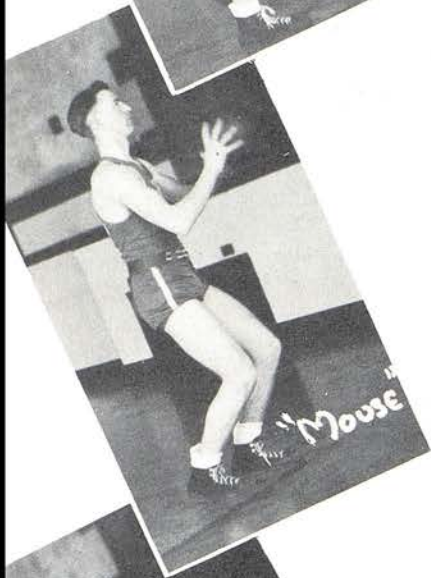
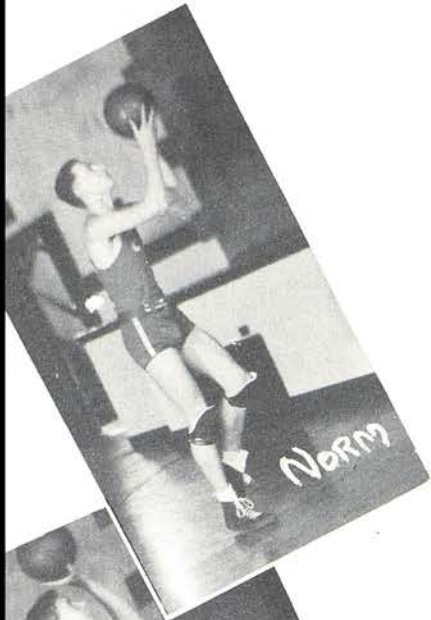
