HOMECOMING

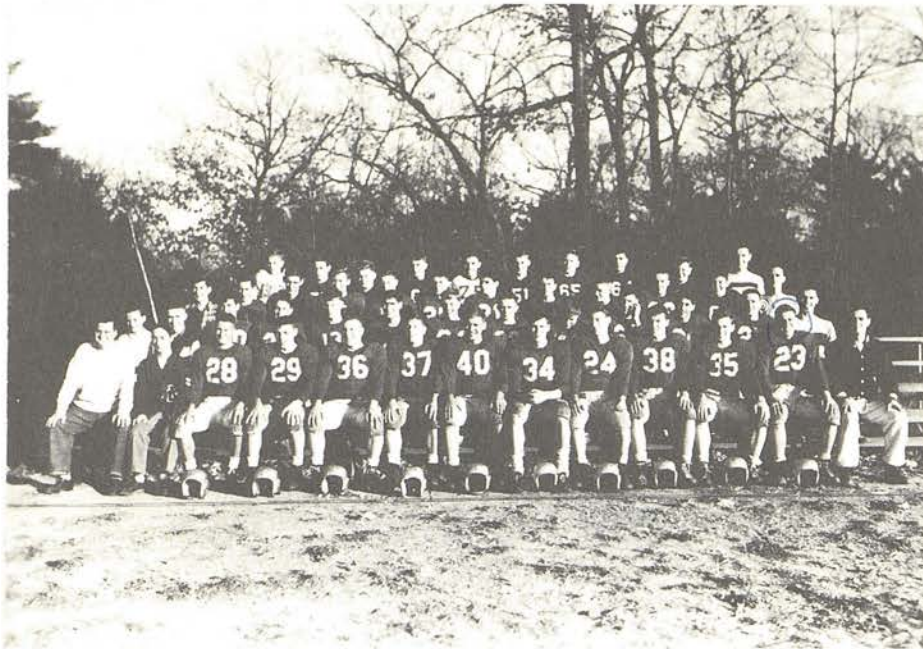
This year's Homecoming, an event long to be remembered by all, was one of the greatest Homecomings ever celebrated at old Dells High. It was held October 19 and 20.

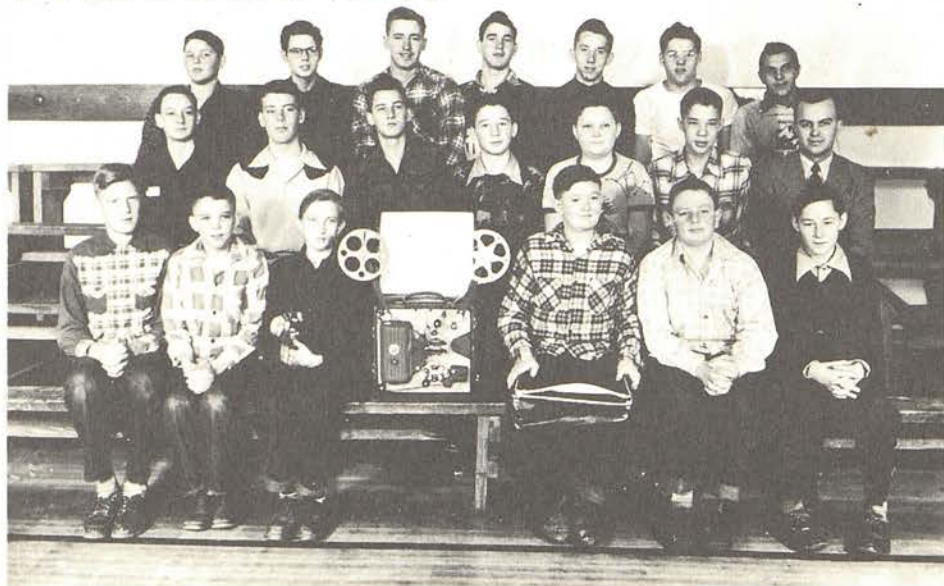
