11. Thou shalt honor and obey thy band director—when he's looking!

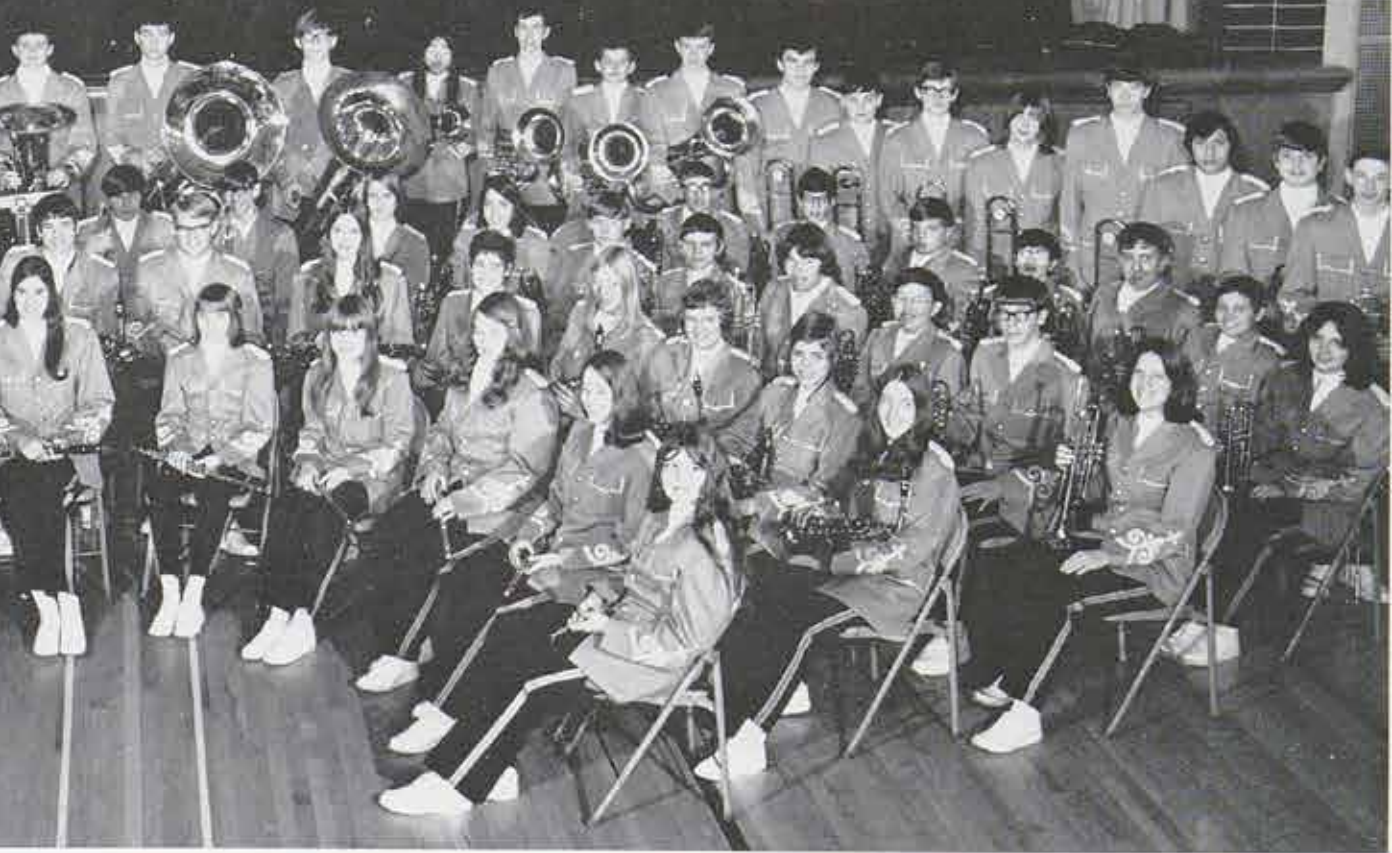

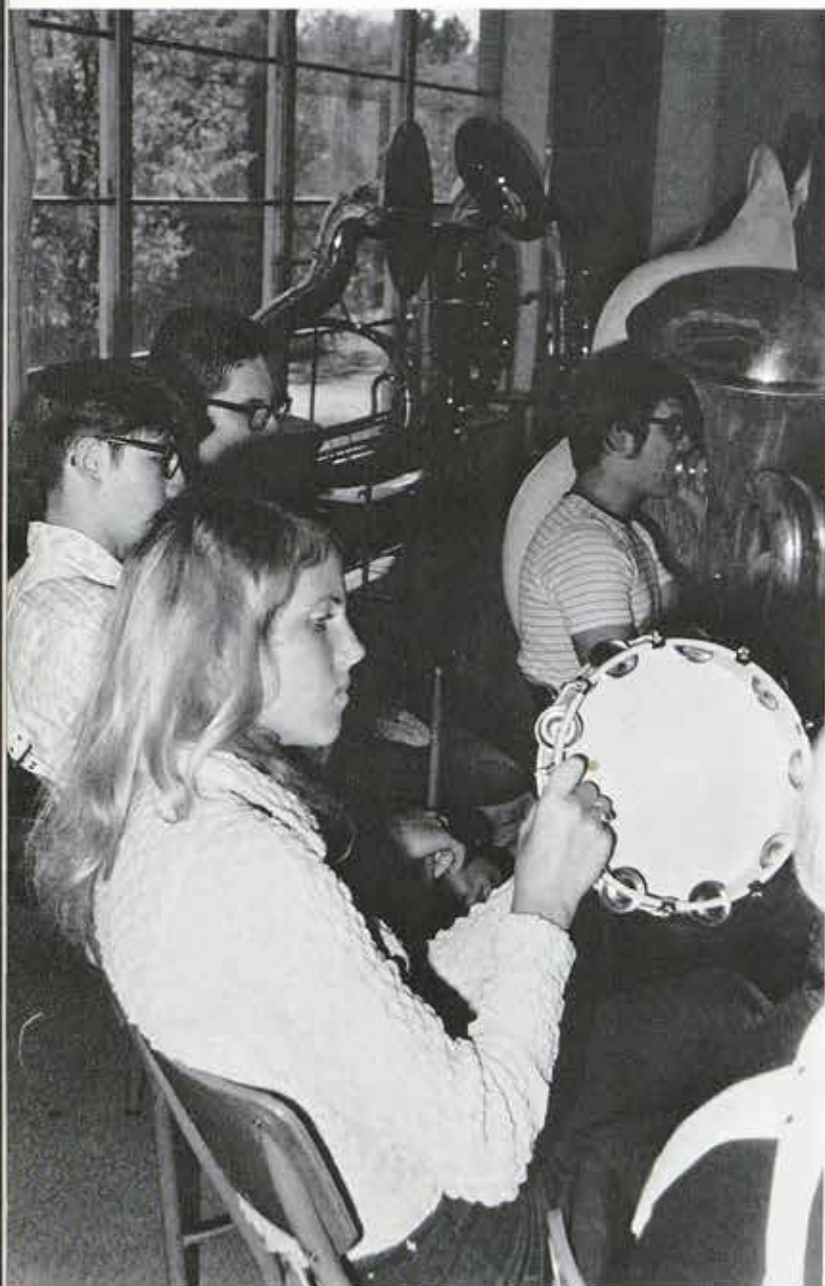

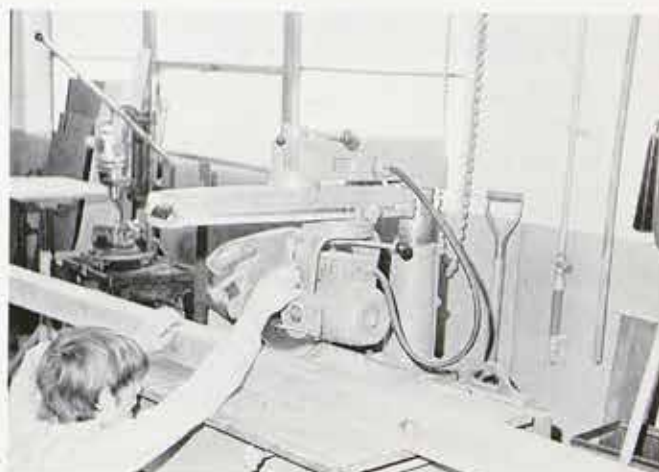

Special Departments Provide Important Services

The specialized faculty of WDHS encompasses such fields as guidance, driver's education, library science, and special education.

The guidance department is handled by Mr. Donald A. Skarda and Miss Bonnie Smeja. Miss Smeja is a new addition to the guidance staff this year, and is well qualified, having studied at Northland College, and Stout State U. 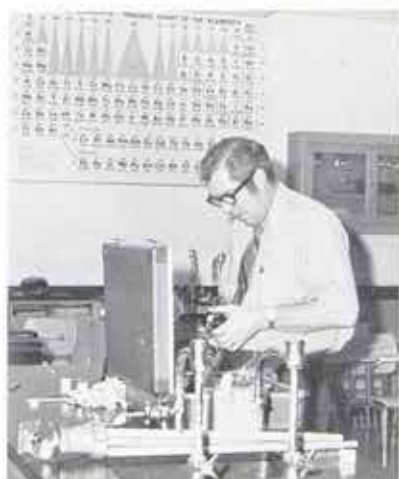
Councilmen Increase Numbers

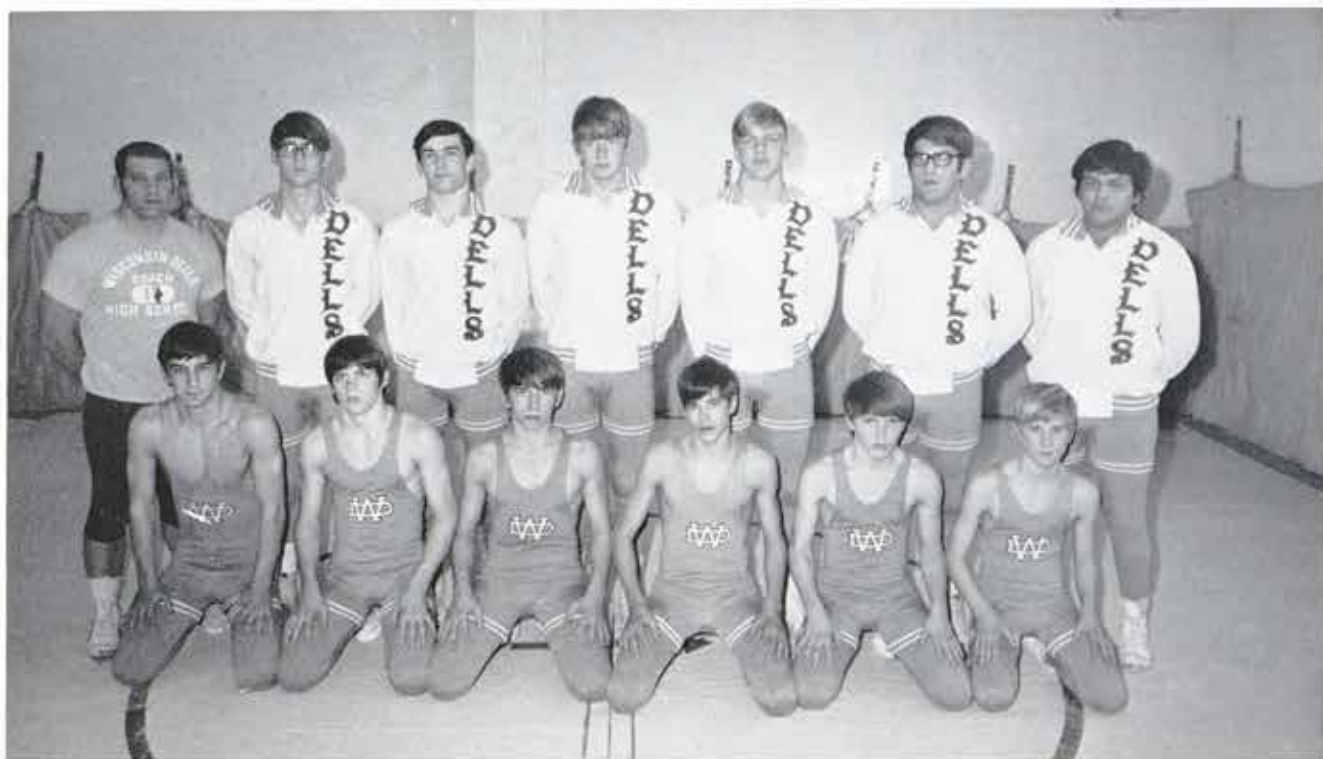

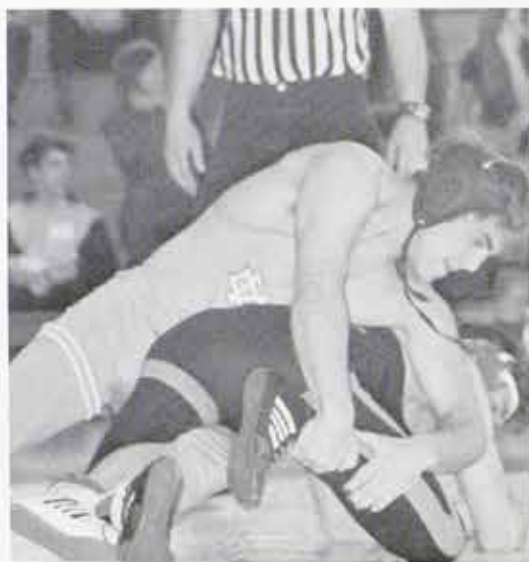

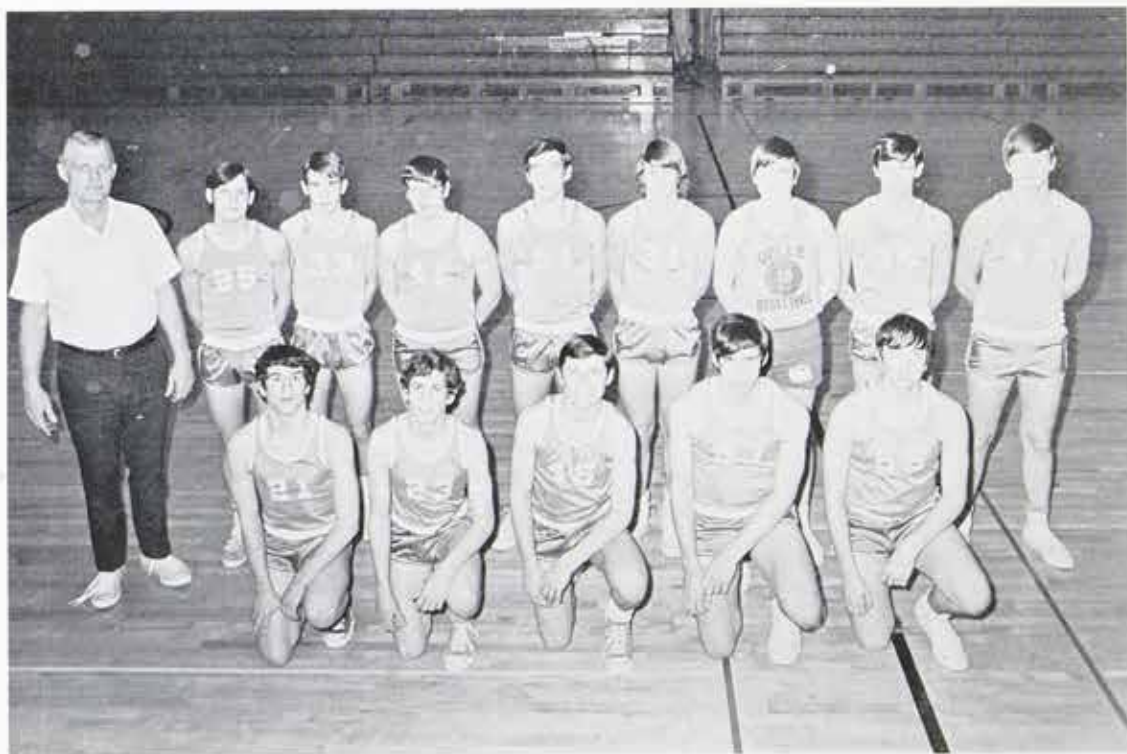

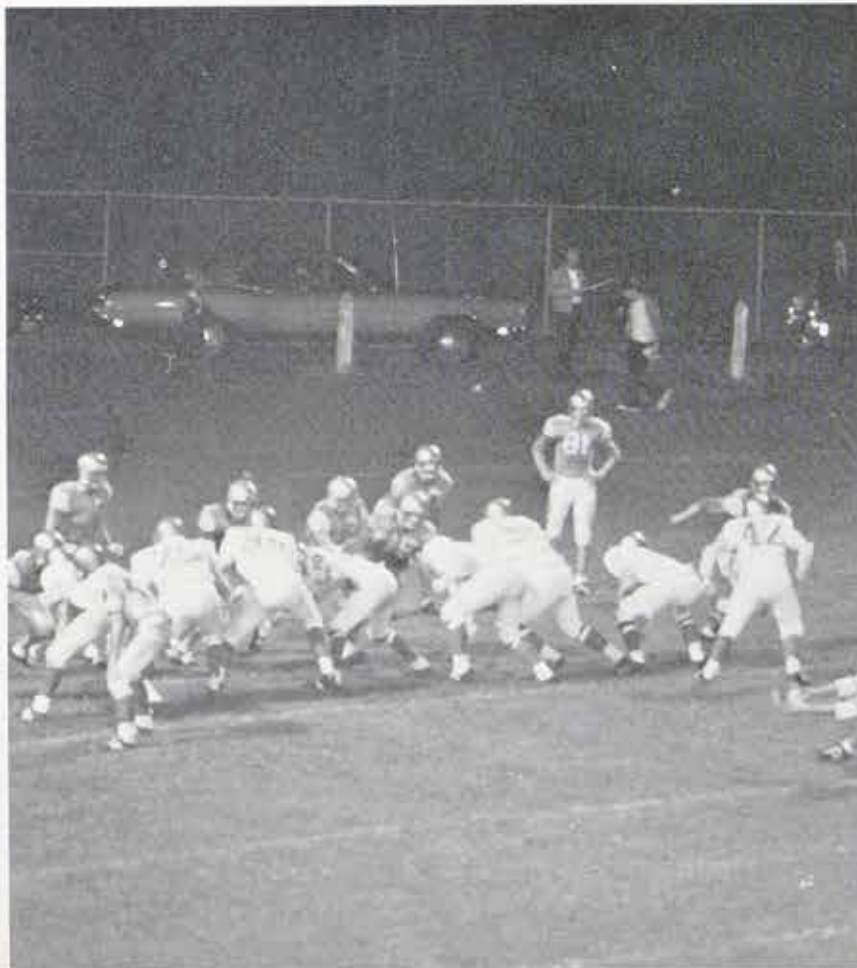
