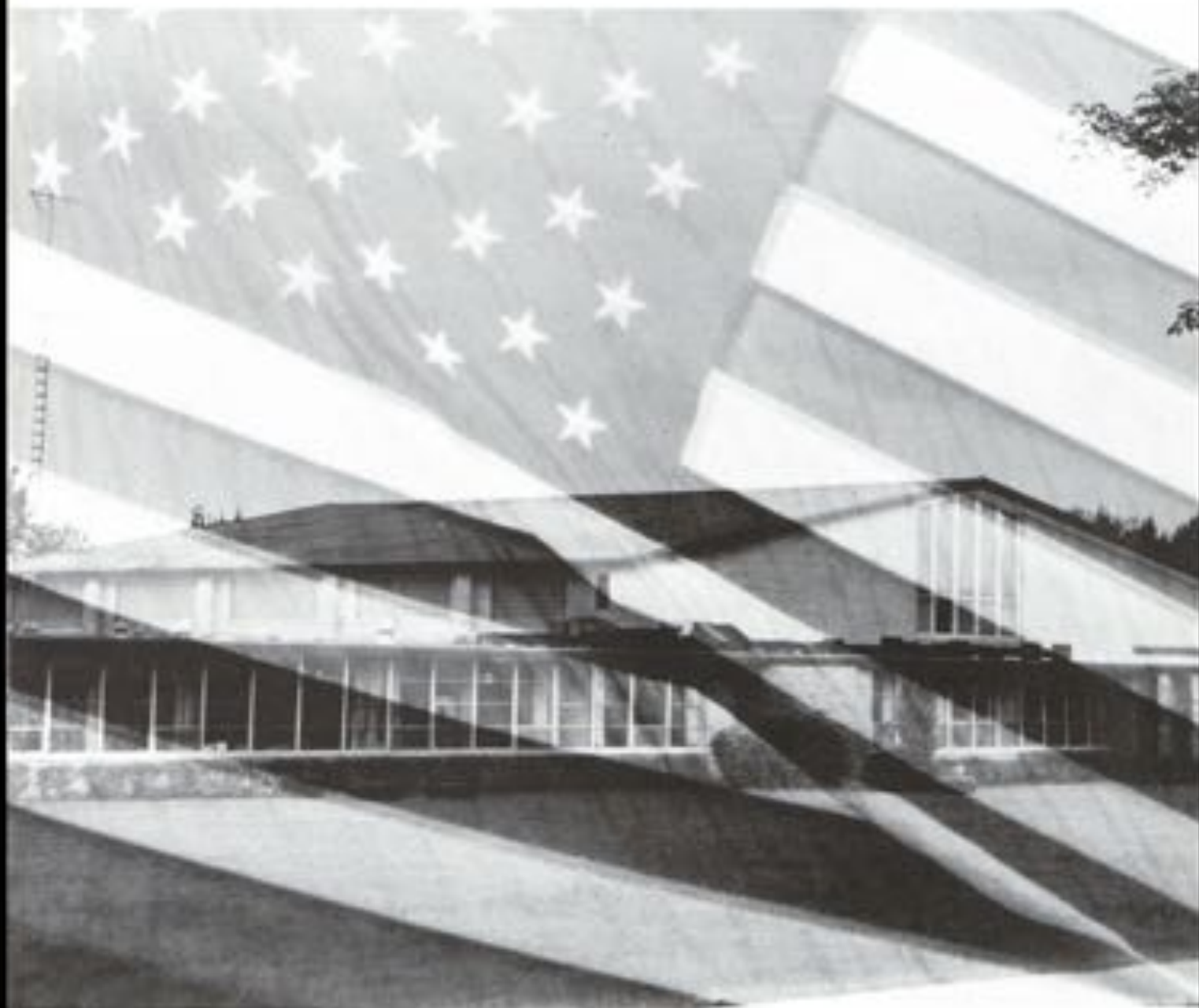

## Math Basic and Complex Methods Taught in Dept.



WDHS offers a well-rounded program in the Mathematics department.

There are three math teachers, Mr. Engberg, Mr. Hyman and Mr. Schauf. Courses range from General Math through Math IV.

General Math gives students the fundamentals of algebra and simple calculations. Students learn how to find areas of polygons, properties of triangles and quadrilaterals, and much more in Geometry. Algebra can be taken either as a one year course in Algebra I, or as a two year course in Algebra IIA and IIB. Algebra II is offered at the completion of either Algebra I option.

Only one credit of math is required to graduate from WDHS, but most students take extra classes to prepare themselves for future education.
