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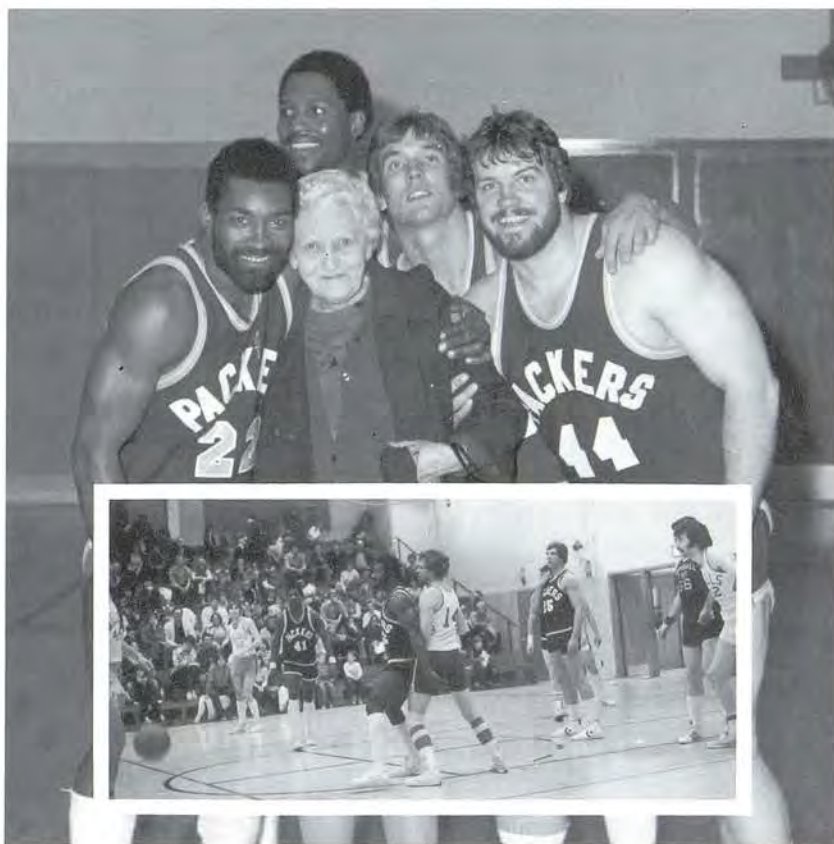

Traveling Athletes Visit WDHS



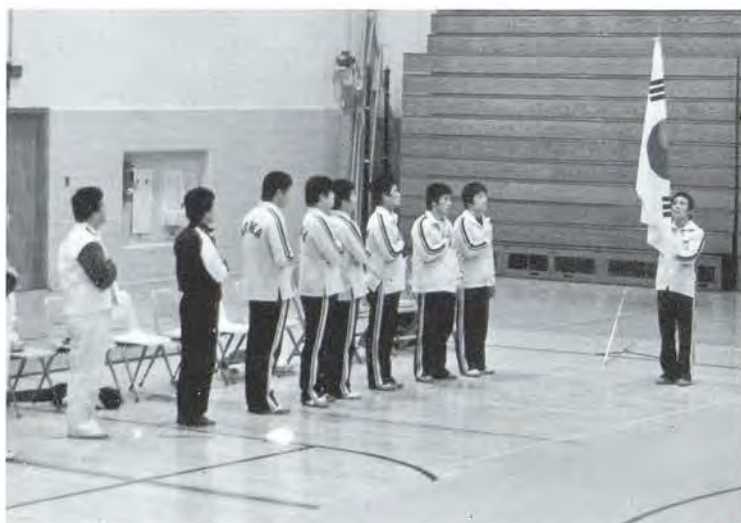

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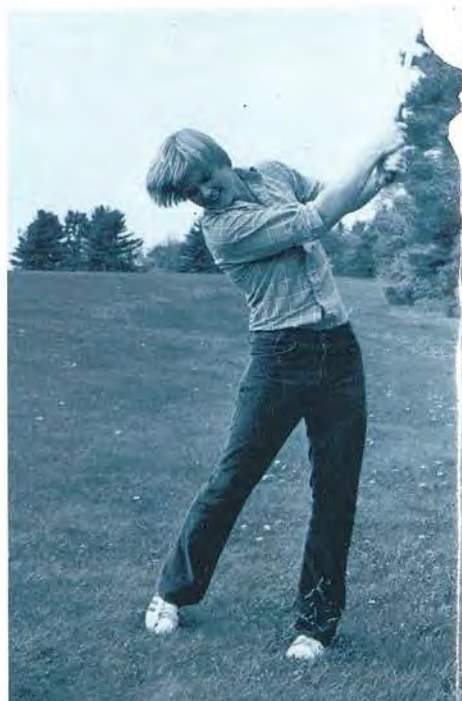

Chiefs Give Kuhl 100th Victory and More

The WDHS football team had an excellent season with their only losses going to Tomah and Reedsburg, who both tied for the conference championship.

The Chiefs opened their season on the road against River Valley with several people playing different positions. Many mistakes were made as a result of these changes, yet the Dells won the contest behind the "sure-footed" kicker, Dave Hess, with a score of 3-0. After patching up position errors, the Chiefs improved their strategy and tackled a strong Waunakee team, winning 10-0.

Conference play opened with the Dells playing Adams. Both teams performed well, yet the Dells took the contest 20-12. The second conference game was played at Portage. The score was close in the first two quarters, but the chiefs fired up during halftime and came on the field for the second half rolling over their rival with a score of 36-6.

After the Portage game, the Chiefs, with a 4-0 record, met Tomah. The Indians, who already ranked high in the conference, were the team to beat. The young Dells squad played strong, but Tomah's experience prevailed and the Chiefs bowed to their first loss of the season, 14-11.

Fortunately the Chiefs quickly bounced back from defeat to trample Sparta 27-13. They retained their winning attitude when playing host to Mauston. The Homecoming game score of Dells 40 and Mauston 7, proved to all that the Chiefs were back.

Although Baraboo's record wasn't very good, they had an excellent defense. The Dells respected this, yet crushed Baraboo with an impressive win of 34-13.

Then the stage was set. Tomah, Dells, and Reedsburg were tied for first place in conference. The Dells was to play host to Reedsburg. Rain didn't stop the fans, yet the Chiefs never really threatened the Beavers, and paid for this mistake with defeat. The 7-0 score caused the Dells to drop out of first place and to lose any chance of going to State.

With the end of the season, ballots were cast to give recognition to certain players. Senior Dan Marz was voted most valuable player, and Tom Fisher, also a senior, was announced most improved. Some of the reasons for the team's success could be attributed to outstanding leadership by co-captains Dave Hess and Dan Marz, combined with an excellent coaching staff.

The Junior Varsity squad also had a fine season pulling off a 4-3 record. As a whole, the team felt they were capable of capturing more victories. On the other hand, freshmen players lacked team unity the first half of the season, but pulled together to close out the year with a 1-4-1 record.

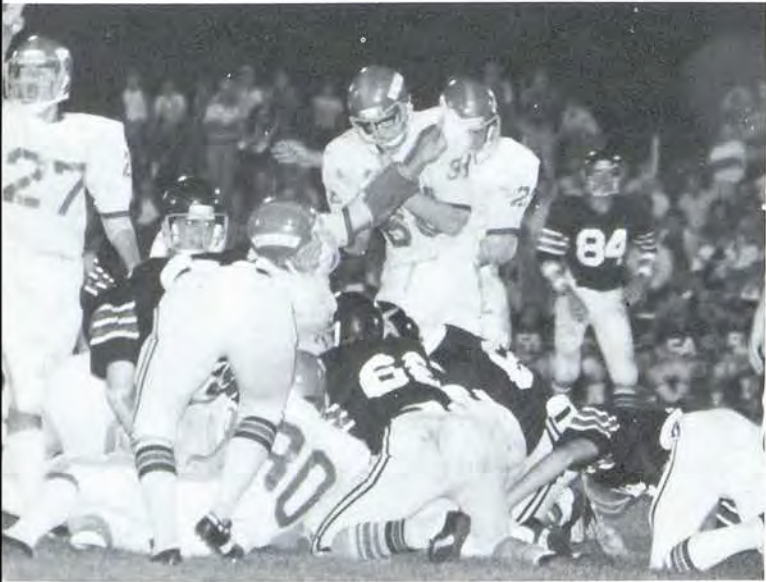

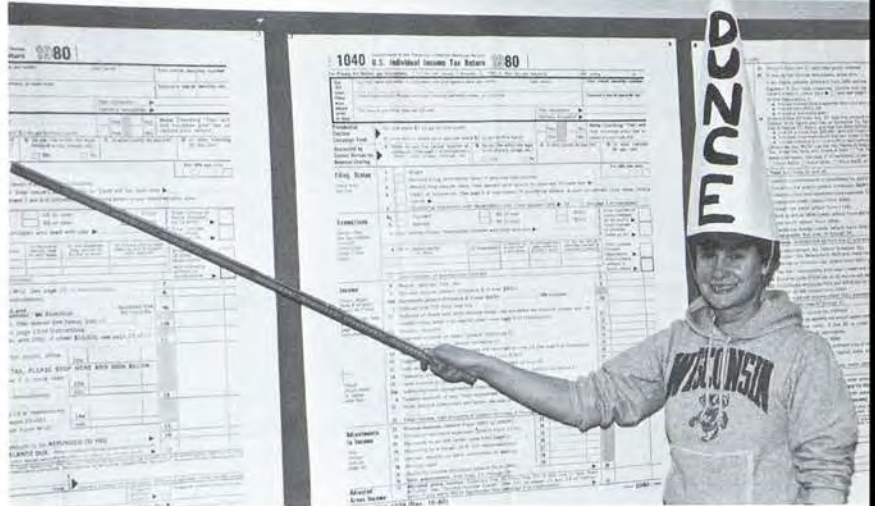
With true determination, in spite of seven defeats, the team managed to win four regular season matches and place fourth in Conference competition.

sively throughout the season. Their first major trip was to Crete, Illinois, where the group was invited to take-part in a music clinic. After being housed overnight by their hosts, the swing choir journeyed home with a greater knowledge of show choir techniques gained through the professional clinicians. The swing choir grew into a close-knit group as they traveled to Fort Wayne, Indiana, to attend the Mid-West Show Choir Festival. The young musicians used their talents to entertain the audience for this highly competitive music contest.

To raise the money needed to fund these trips, the Corporation held their first annual "Cabaret". As supporters came to the Cabaret, they found themselves dancing among the valentines' decorations to the "Big Bands" music provided by the Jazz Ensemble, co-sponsors of the successful event. The Cabaret was highlighted by the Corporation, concluding the evening with a dazzling performance.

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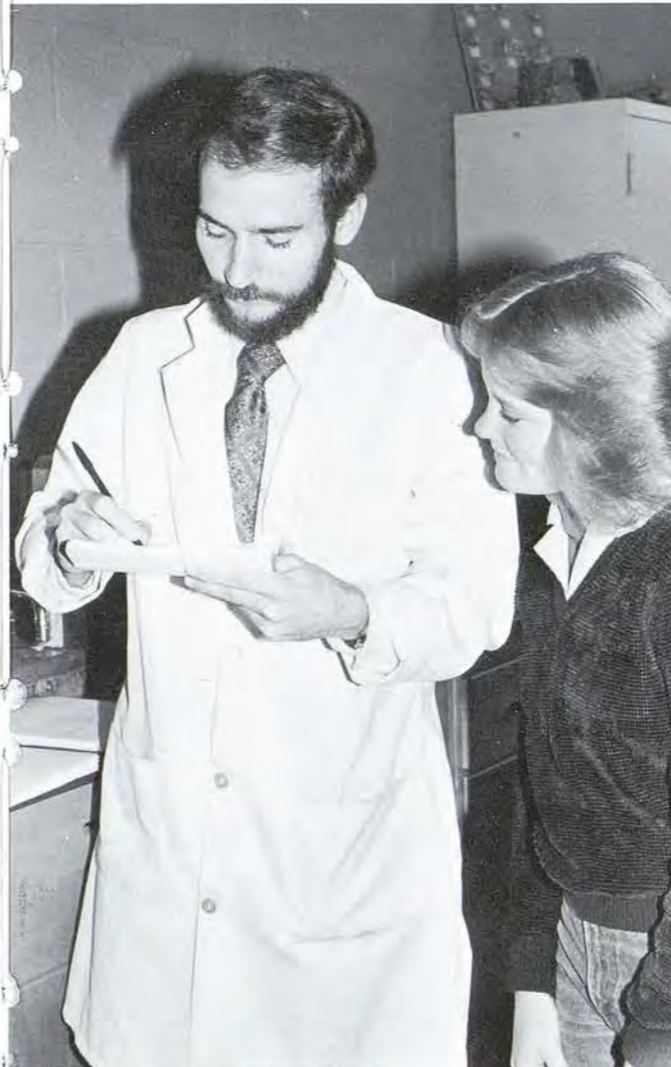

As each student graduates from WDHS, he leaves behind a fragment of his personality and achievement, and hopefully carries with him a token of the wisdom displayed by the administration.



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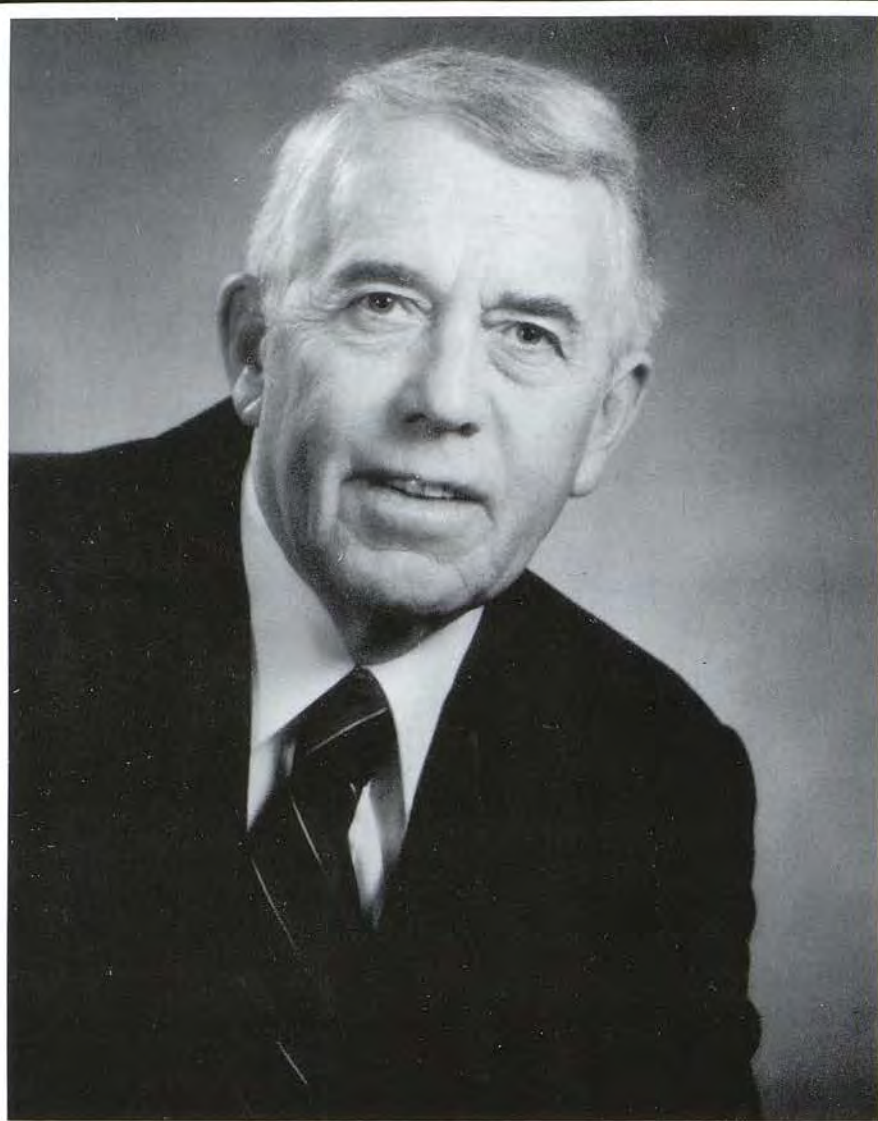

Delectable aromas from the home economics kitchen, and the humming of sewing machines are evidence of the work being done by students in the Home Economics Department.

Persons taking Home Economics classes learn various fundamentals, from sewing on a button, to taking care of a child and managing a family budget. Units of study include family living, child care, housing and home management, in addition to sewing and foods.

Home Economics teacher, Mrs. Brew, "spiced" up this year's Housing and Home Management class by taking the class on a tour of "Xanadu," while the foods classes "whipped" up a special meal for the faculty.

Agriculture plants the seed of experience for the businesses of farming and other related occupations.

The different electives in Agriculture are vocational in nature so the students "learn by doing," while they are also gaining practical experience in these growing fields. A new class this year was Agriculture III. This was for upperclassmen concerned with management, economics, and mechanics of agriculture. Also there were new units in the conservation classes such as "Alternative Energy" and the "Conservation of Fossil Fuels."

Not only did the Ag. students learn new techniques by using textbooks and listening to guest speakers, but they got a "charge" out of visiting the Farm Power Electric Show in Madison and touring the American Breeders Service in DeForest.

Science is the nucleus of life. It is a required subject with variables ranging from the basic freshmen sciences to Biology, Physics, Chemistry, Electronics and the more advanced Computer Programming.

Freshman ISCS reviews the basic principals of science, and Physical Science II specifically prepares students for exploring atoms in chemistry and understanding the laws of matter in physics. The Biology classes examine living organisms both flora and fauna to help create a respect for the environment. Electronics delves into the realm of basic electricity and communication electronics. Computer Programming is for students who plan to use computers in their career. They practice storing information and programming grade computations.

Our World of English

The language department is the largest of all other departments at WDHS. The variety of classes extend from three major sections: literature, oral English, and written English. Throughout these major departments, there is a multiple choice of electives. This year American Literature was taken off the choice of electives and added to the English 10 class to make it a full year in length. This was done to better the students' English skills, and to make them more aware of American authors and literature.

Many samples of work at WDHS can be seen and heard outside the classroom by the use of the school's section of the **Dells Events** called the "Chieftain," and through a radio program on Saturday mornings referred to as "Chief's Chatter". By these forms of mass media the students are able to function as actual reporters and are also able to state opinions on almost every topic of importance to school life.

WDHS offers four full years of Spanish because of the increasingly important role foreign language plays in universal understanding. The Spanish classes, taught by Mrs. Montemurro, attempt to give students a broad cultural foundation as well as a vocabulary concept in the Spanish language.

This year Mrs. Kay Prosser was a special addition to the language department at WDHS. We, as students, would like to take this time to welcome Mrs. Prosser to our world at Wisconsin Dells High.

"BUSI-NESS"

The business classes were packed with eager students interested in learning typing and shorthand techniques. Under the guidance of Mrs. Reifsteck and Mr. Hoenecke, the students of WDHS followed instructions to broaden their knowledge of the business world. By learning the basics, students found it easy to accomplish typing drills and learned to balance a checkbook.

Accounting, along with General Business and Record Keeping, were beneficial for students wanting to learn the fundamentals of posting ledgers, constructing transactions, and distinguishing between debits and credits in accounts. Other business classes offered were Typing I and II, Personal Typing, and Shorthand I and II. Students enrolled in Typing I were introduced to the keyboard and other simplicities of typing, while Typing II students worked on more advanced assignments, typing out files and mimeographs. Shorthand I students learned to take dictations and to form words with skill. Shorthand II, a more advanced class, enabled students to work in office-type situations.

These classes distributed a large amount of helpful information to all students. With this variety of business courses offered at WDHS, each student is given a head start in business skills.

Specialized Departments Offer Variety

Some people claim that experience is the best teacher. Students in the specialized departments have proven this statement to be true. In these areas students received individual guidance and instruction that enabled them to lead more active and informed lives.

The guidance counselors strived to provide that bit of advice that the average high school student needs in order to make all of those frustrating decisions. Although their purpose is to help students, the counselors' goal this year was to get the kids to feel more responsible in making decisions.

The library, another special aid, offers a unique variety of resources to all students. With the help of head librarian, Mrs. Slocum, students explored a wide area of knowledge beyond the classroom.

A variety of classes were offered to students with different learning needs. These classes included Alternative Education, instructed by Ms. Jones, a new member of the teaching staff this year. There were also reading classes available to students with different interests. Mass Communications was a freshman English class with an emphasis on reading. Basic Reading was a one semester course offered to sophomores and juniors who wanted extra help in a specific area of reading. Accelerated Reading was

a course for juniors and seniors interested in improving their reading rate and vocabulary. All reading classes were taught by Miss Walsh, also a new addition to the staff this year.

Students interested in working with recording and film equipment became involved in the audio-visual program. Under the supervision of Mr. Torgerson, volunteers organized and assembled projectors, recorders, and video tape machines that were used throughout the school.

One of the most beneficial courses taught at WDSH was Driver Education. All students had to know the rules of the road to be a safe driver and pedestrian. Classroom work acquainted young drivers with laws and regulations which were applied in behind-the-wheel training.

The Baraboo Project, another source of vocational education offered opportunities to obtain skills in building trades, food service, health occupations, marketing, and mechanical trades. These skills aided students in furthering their education and in finding job placements after high school graduation.

All of these diverse areas provided students with experience, knowledge, and guidance that was helpful in the future.

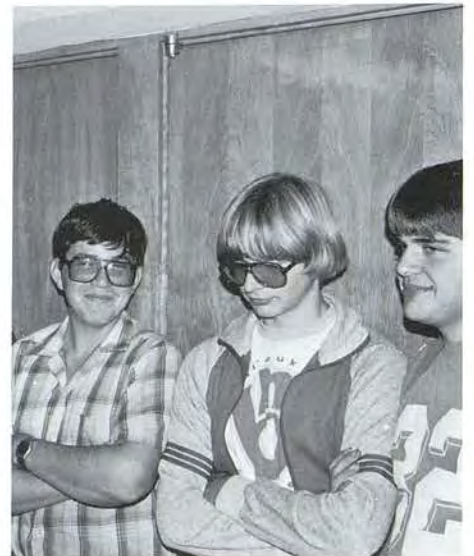
Following these directions, student artists began generating projects of their own original style and technique.

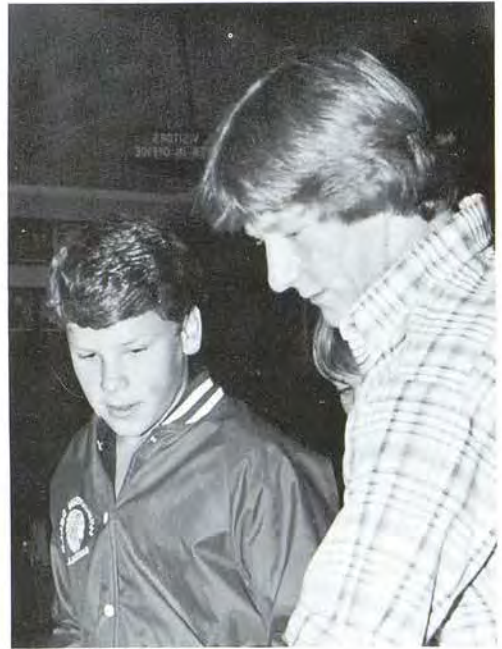
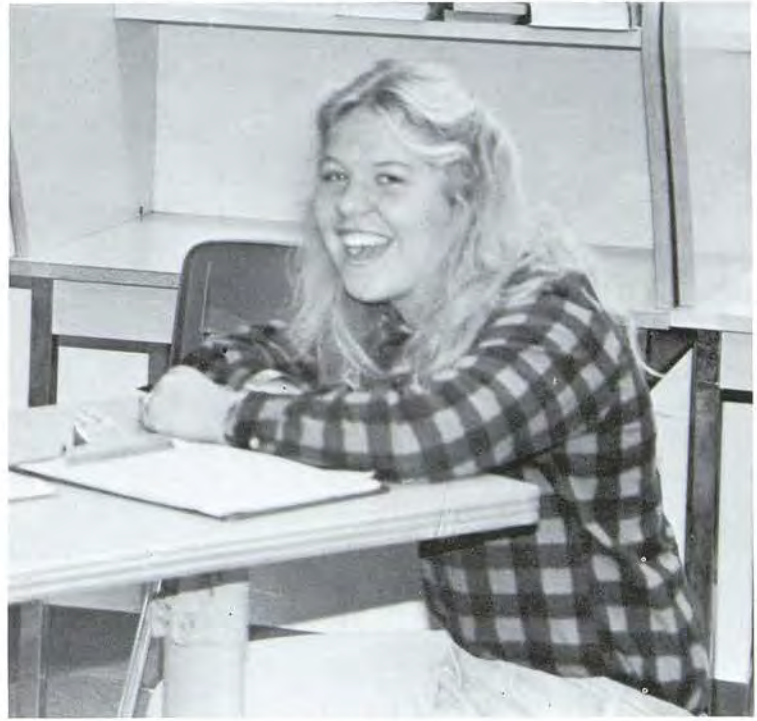
The highlight of the 1981 art classes was the Art Fair, which was a great opportunity for students to display their work and critique the work of their peers.
