23—The Junior Prom. The theme is Chinatown, with Larry Woodbury's orchestra.

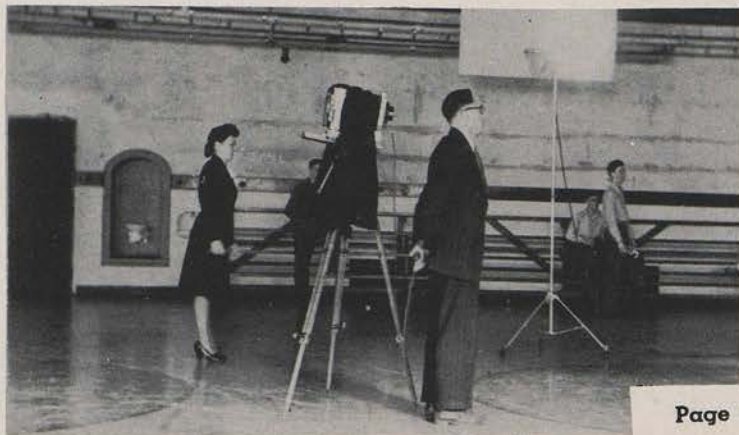
30—Music Festival at Richland Center.

Class History

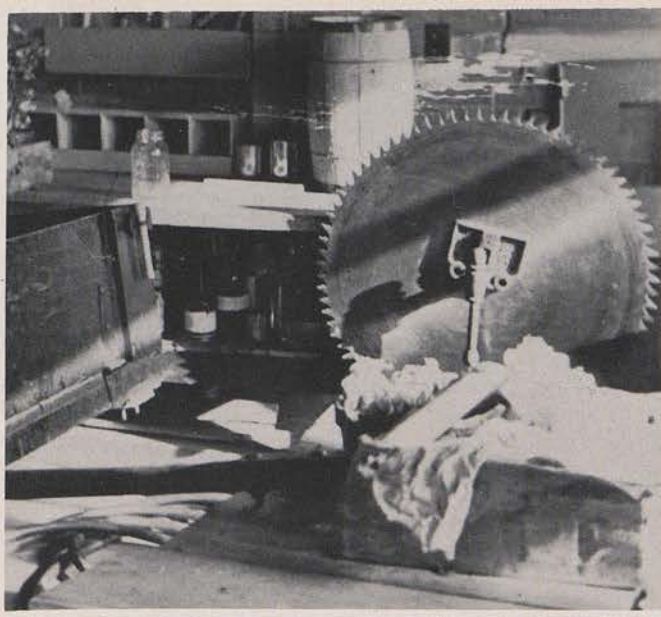

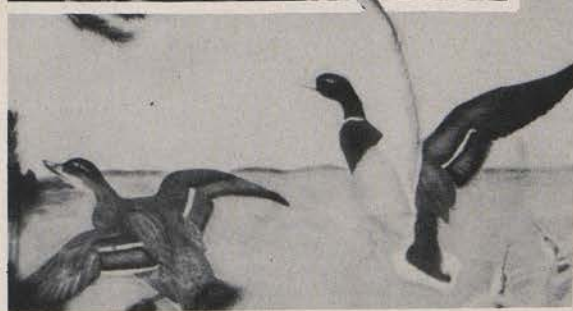
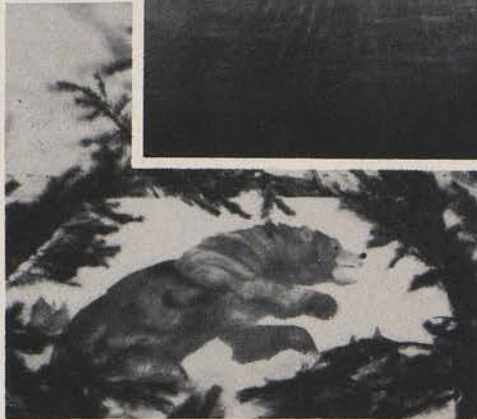
Poor Miss Johnson was our advisor during all this controversy.

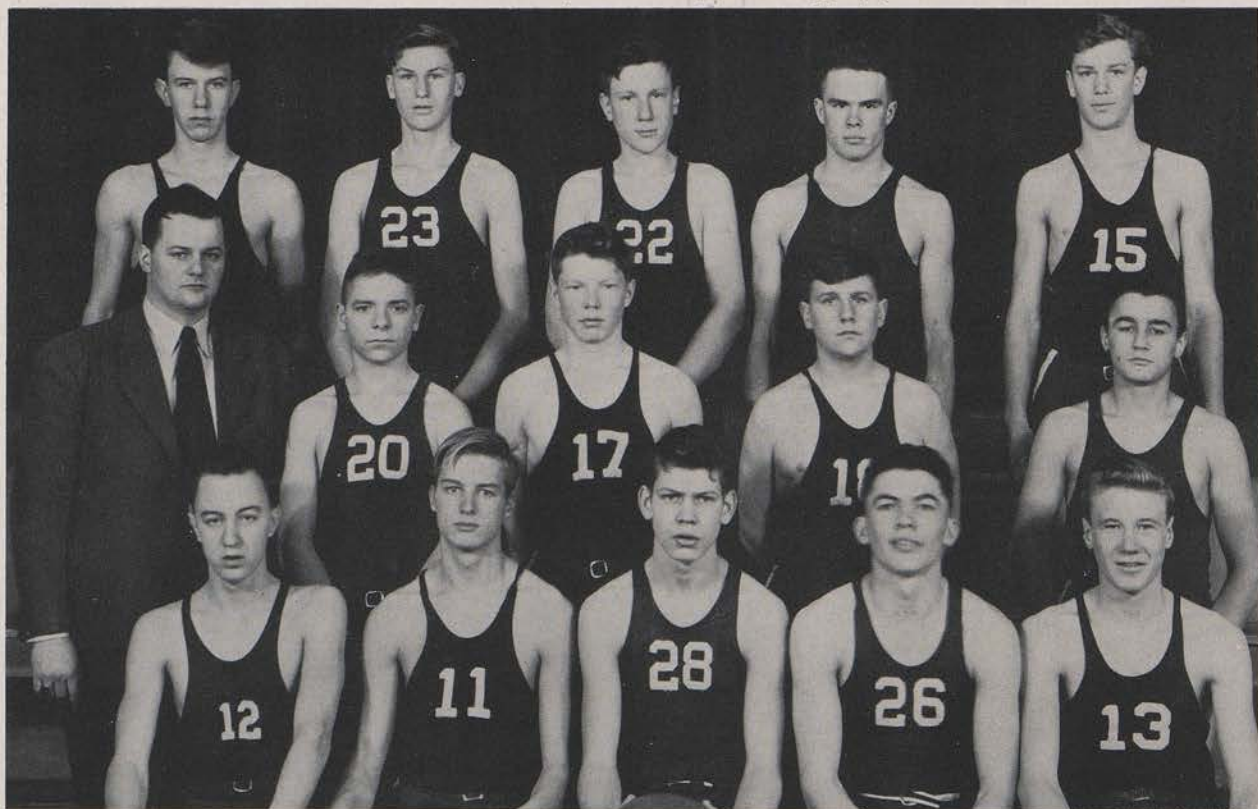
Everybody went home "early," so that the team would have the energy to win the game with Reedsburg the next day. Results: a tie, 6 to 6.

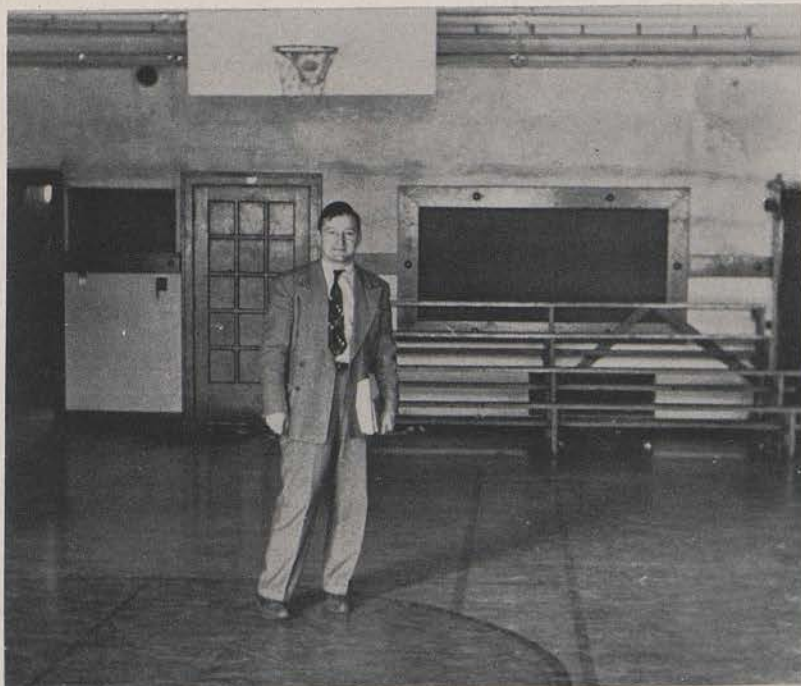

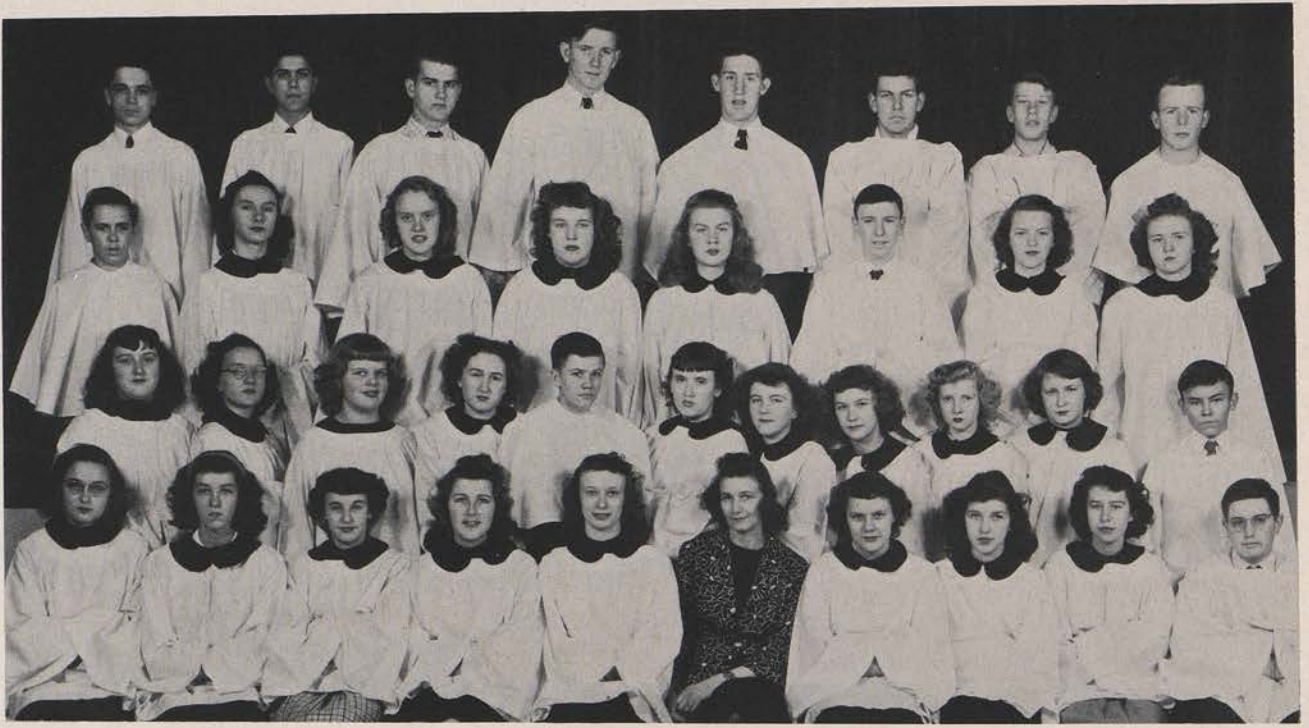

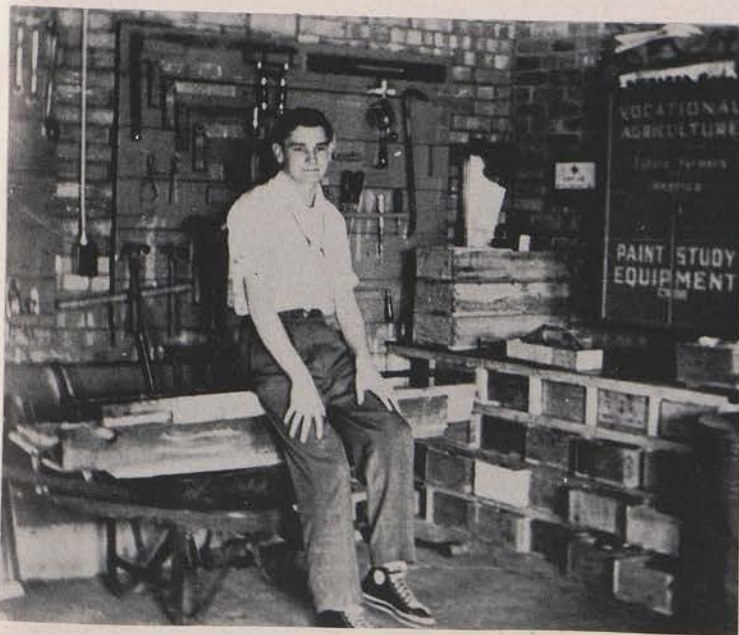
F. F. A.

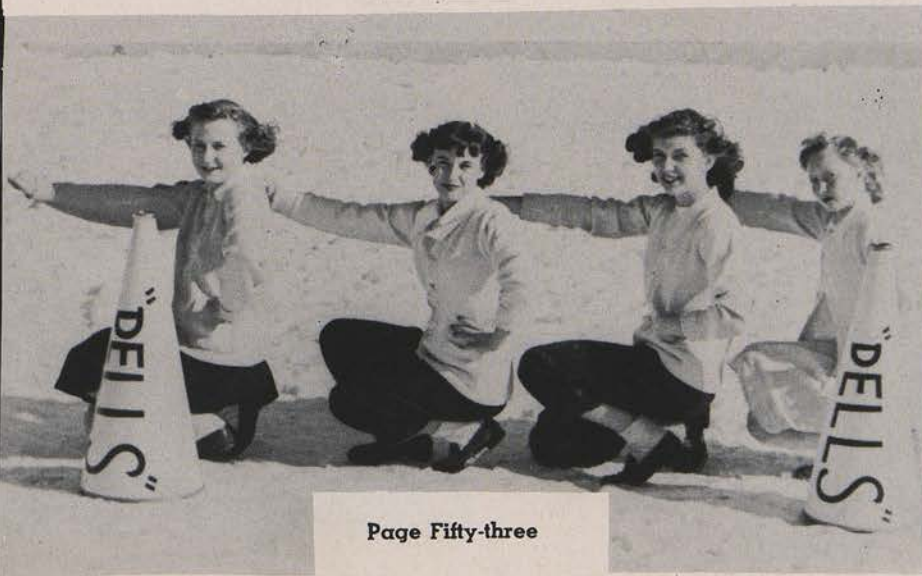

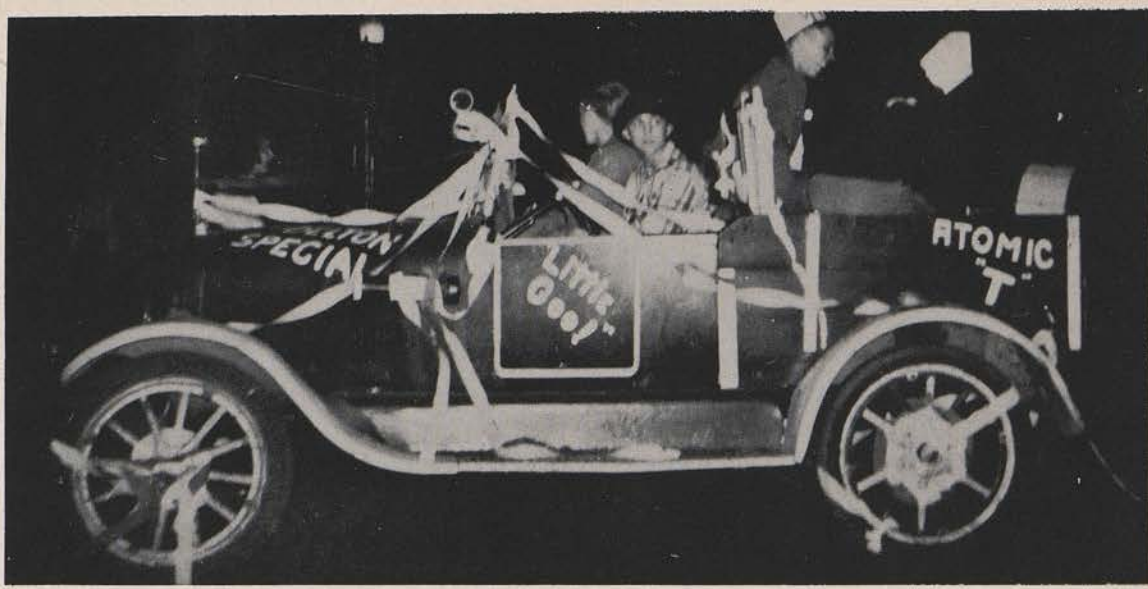
