Homecoming

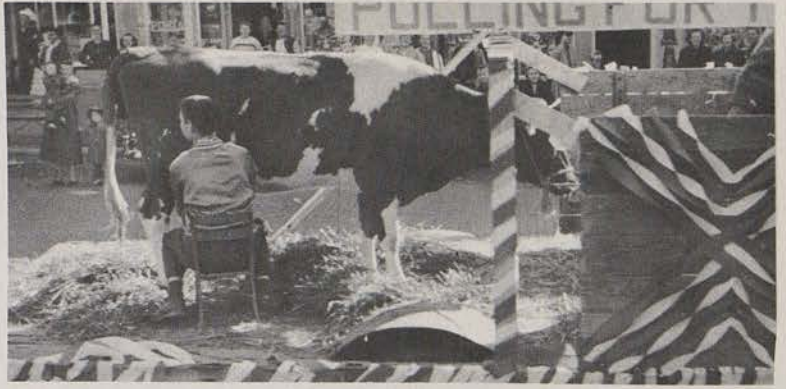
An air of excitement spread through the school as the various clubs and classes prepared their floats for Friday afternoon, October 10, 1952, and the second Dells homecoming parade.
