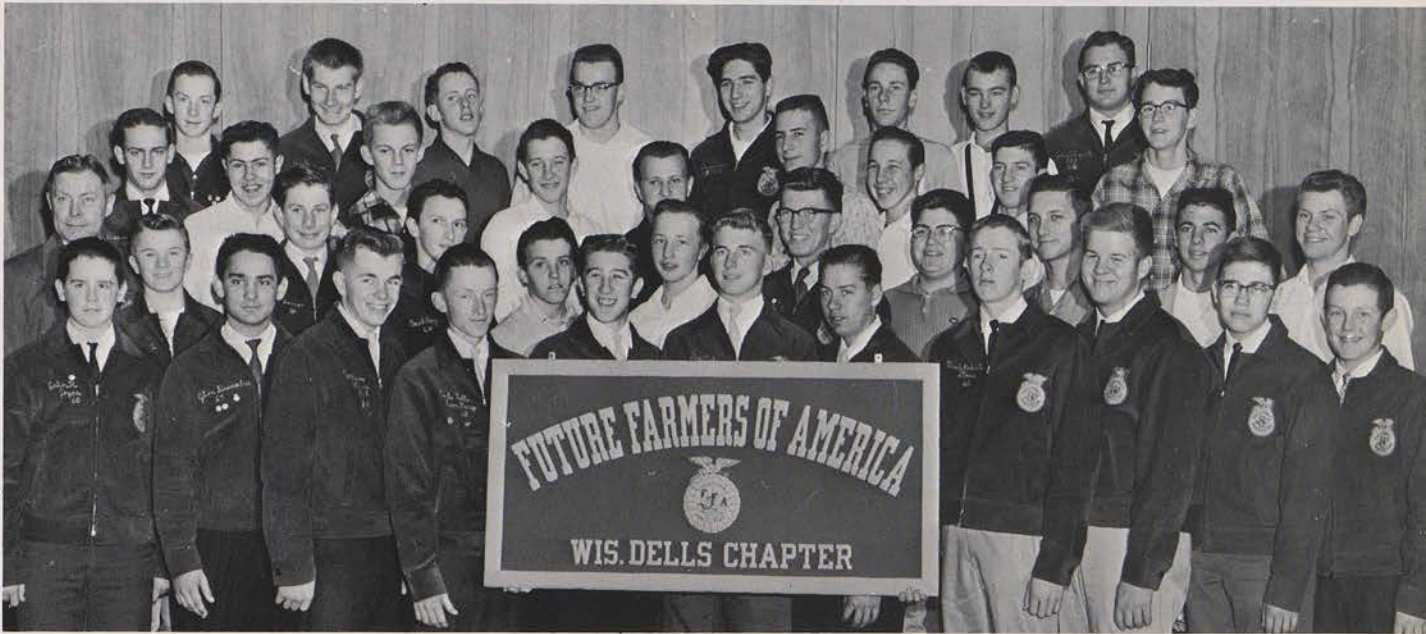

Trackmen Soar to New Heights

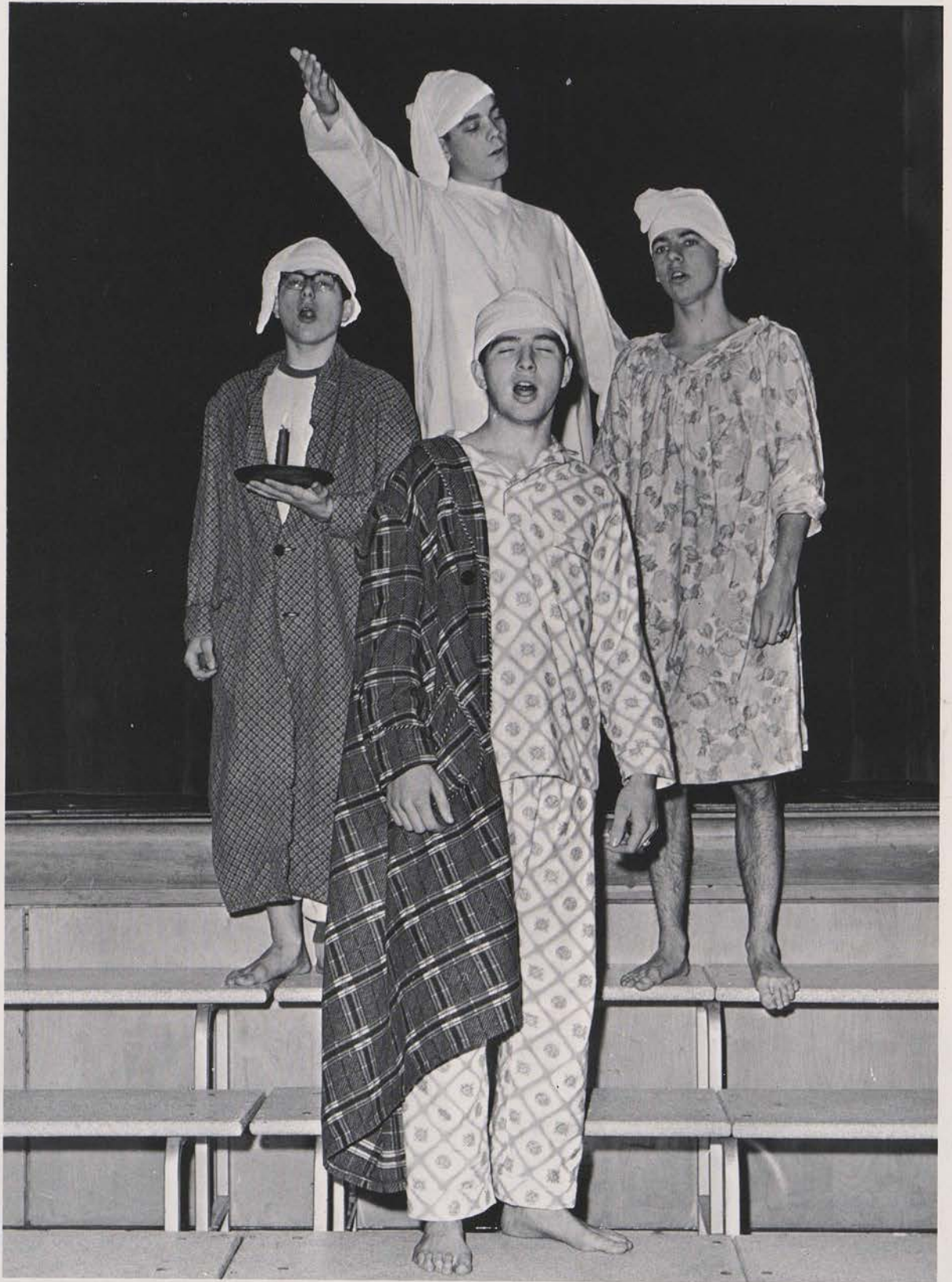

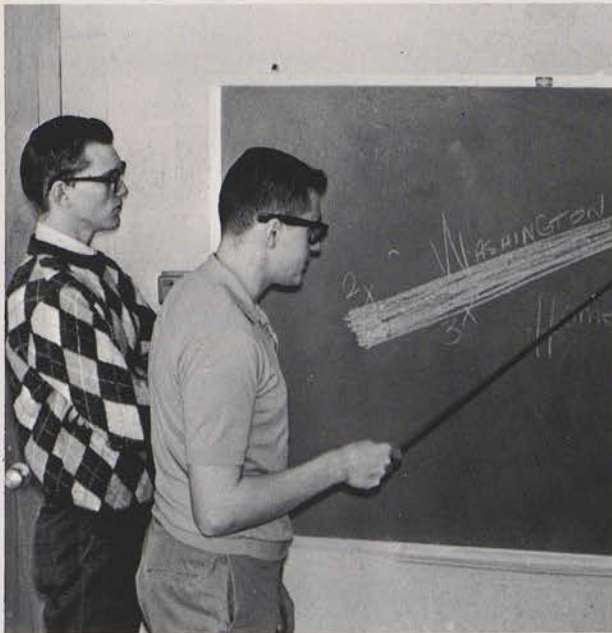

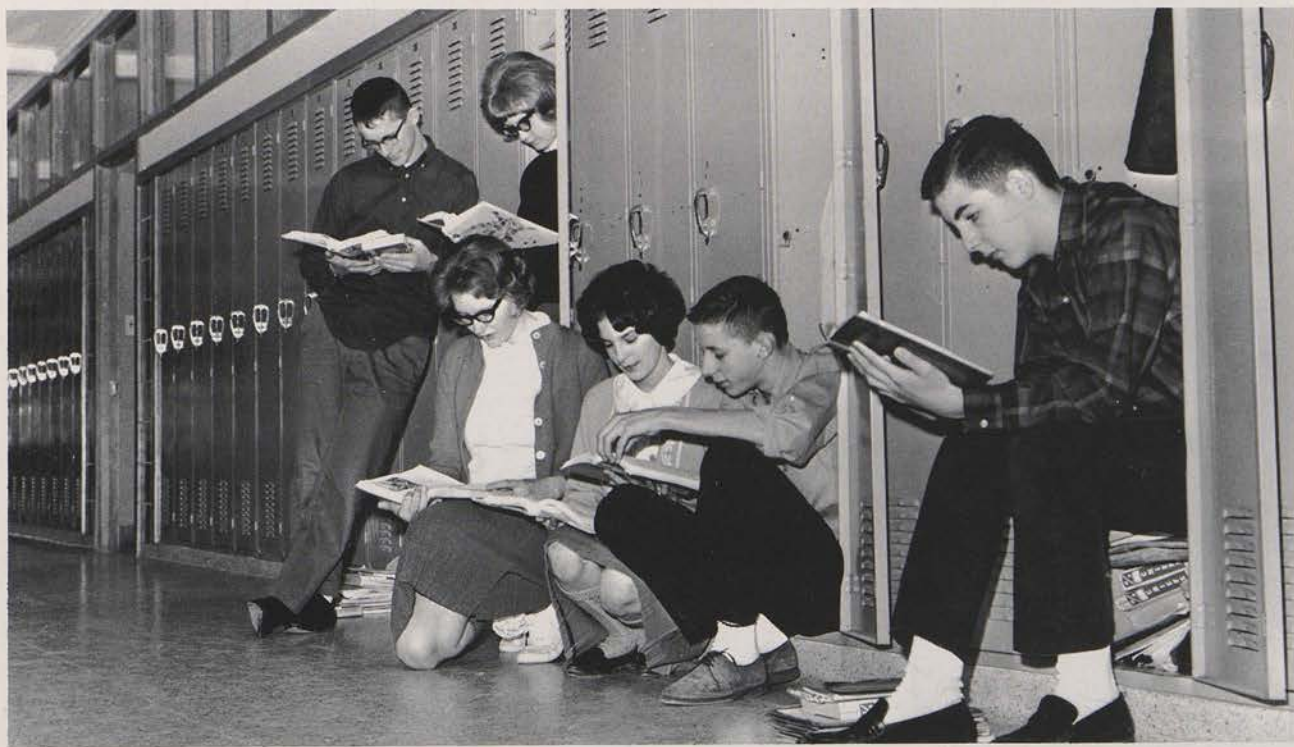

Innovations Blend with Traditions

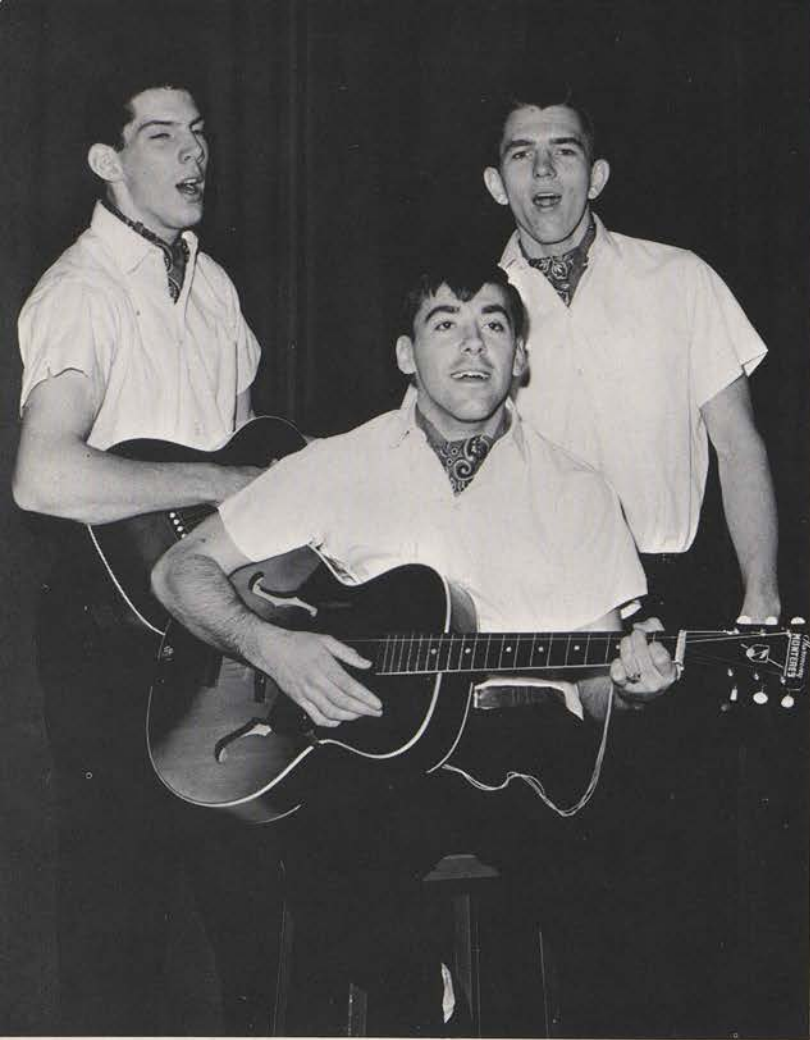
