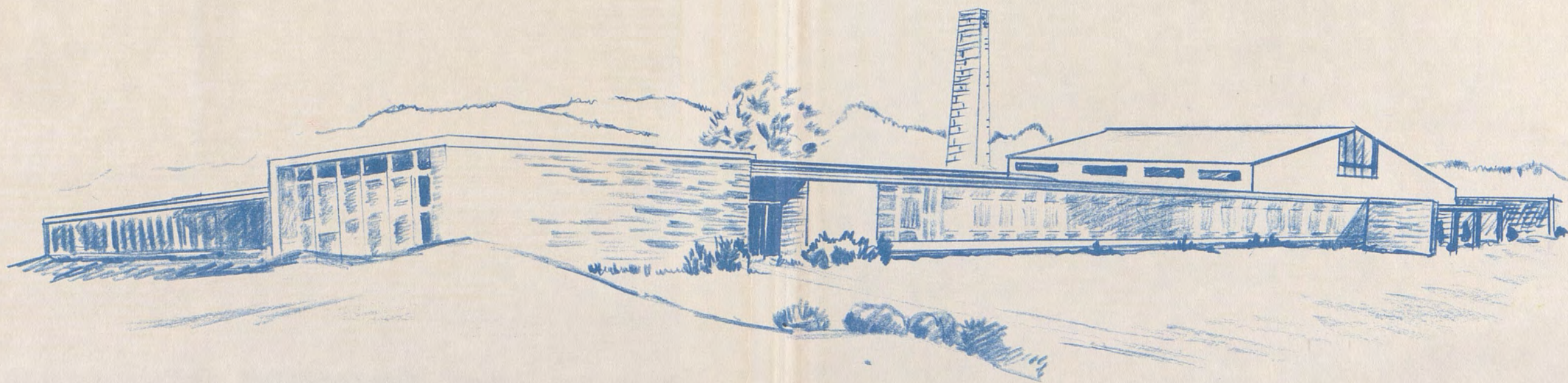
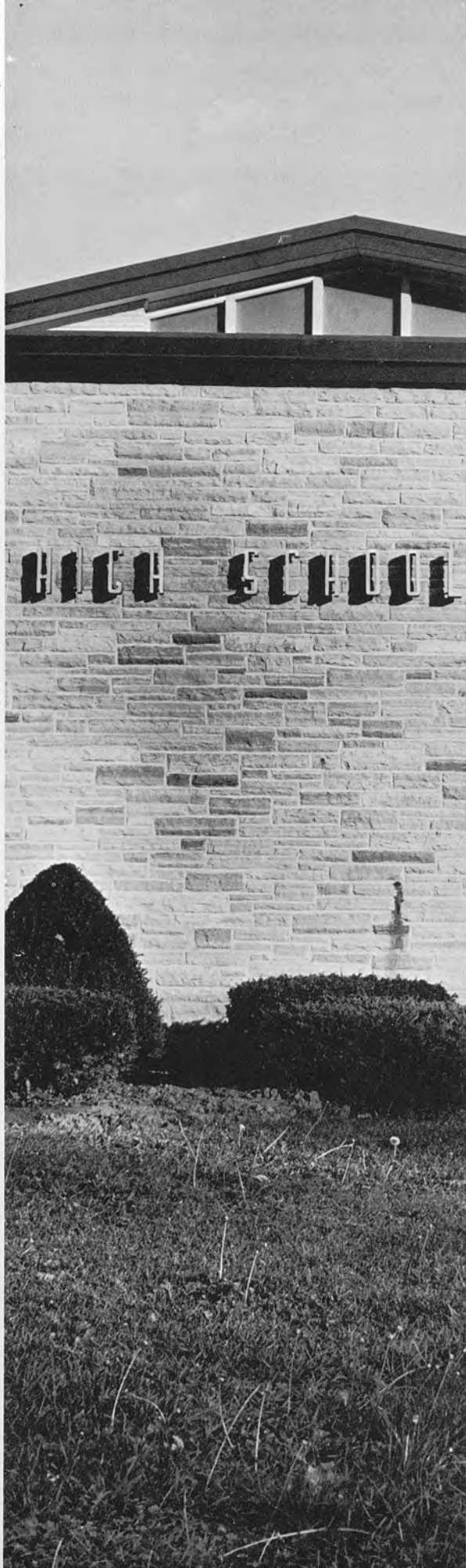

Their evaluation of the Swedish school system and comparison with the American educational system was submitted to the Meet Modern Sweden Committee of the Swedish Government.

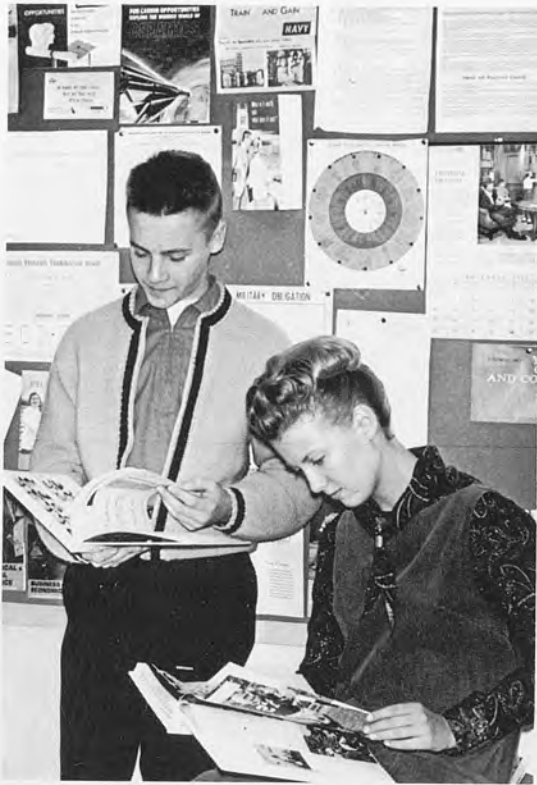

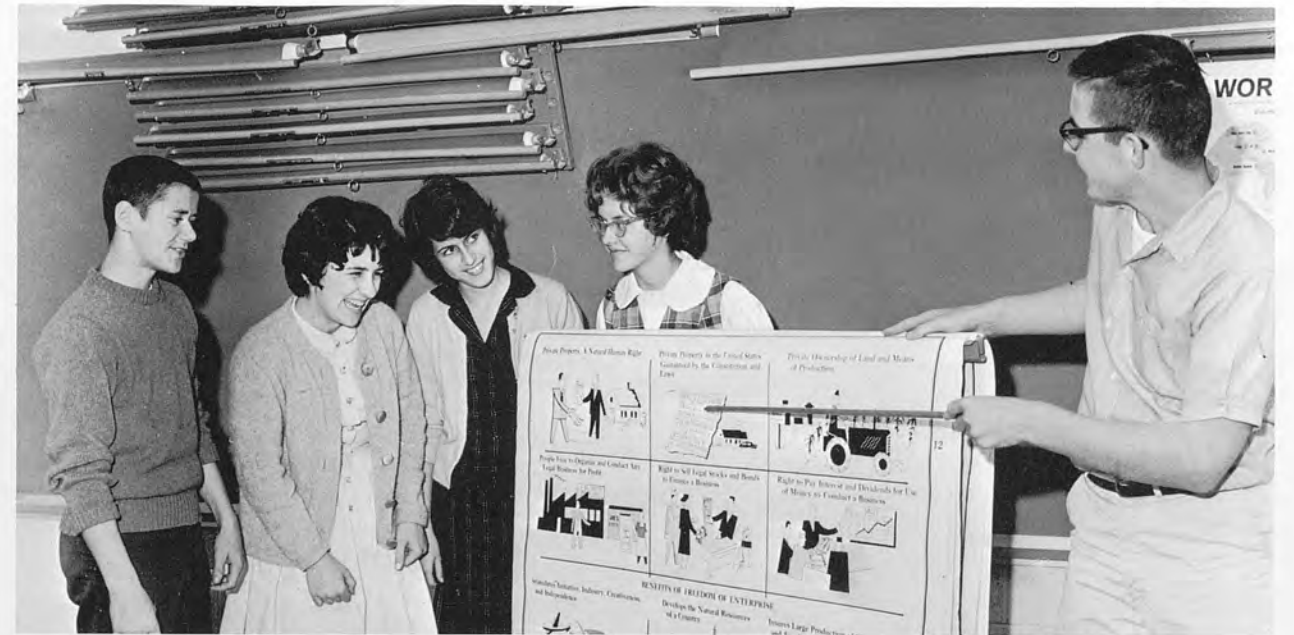

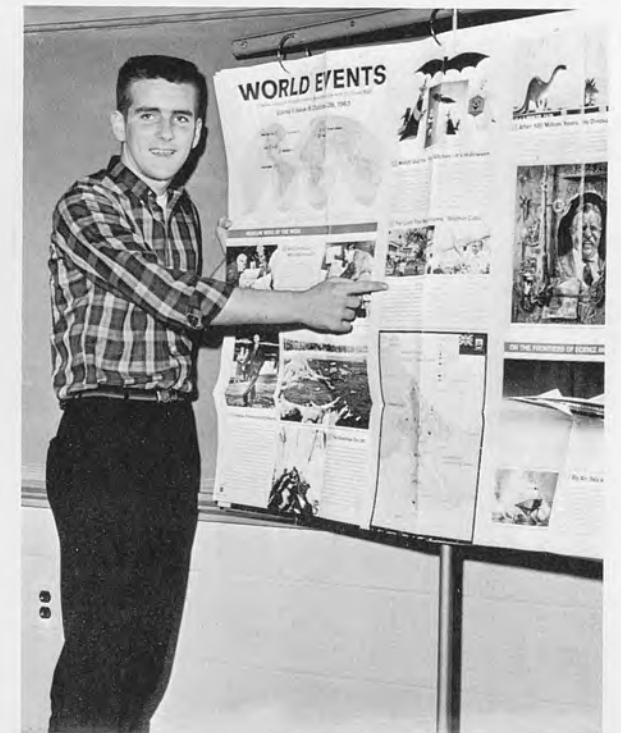

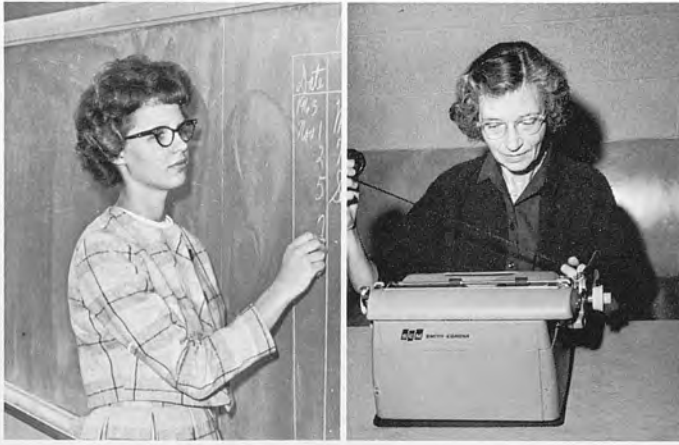

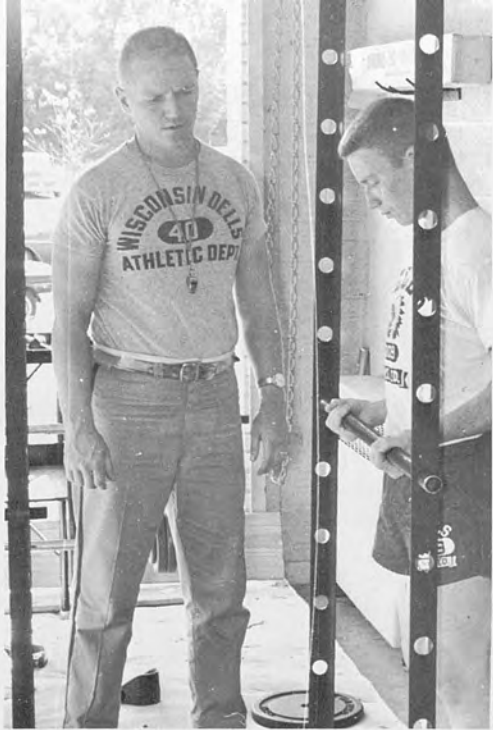
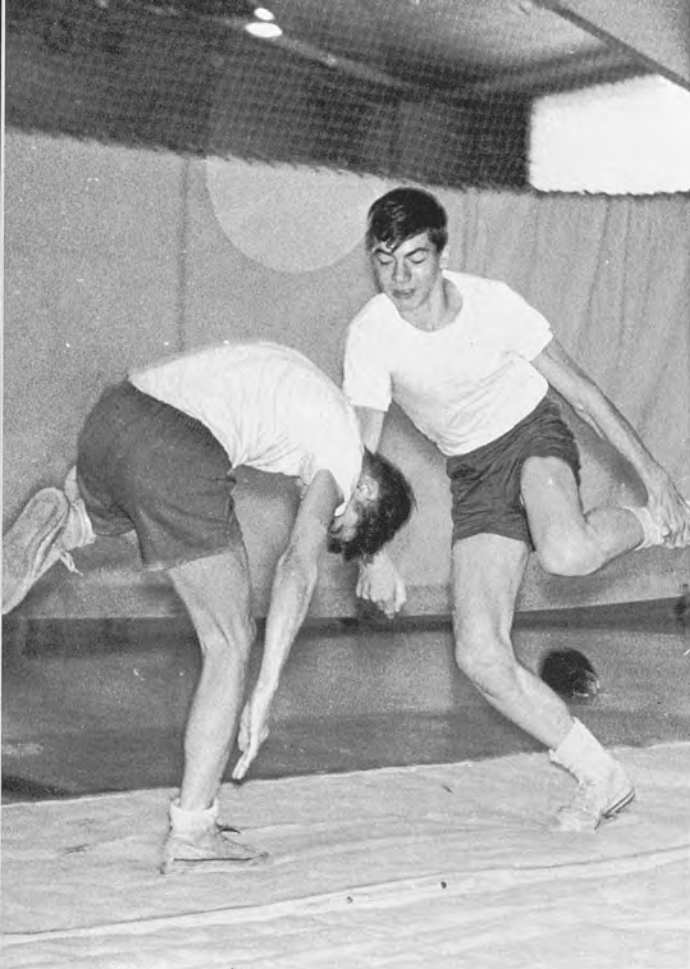
Students Determine Skills In Occupational Classes

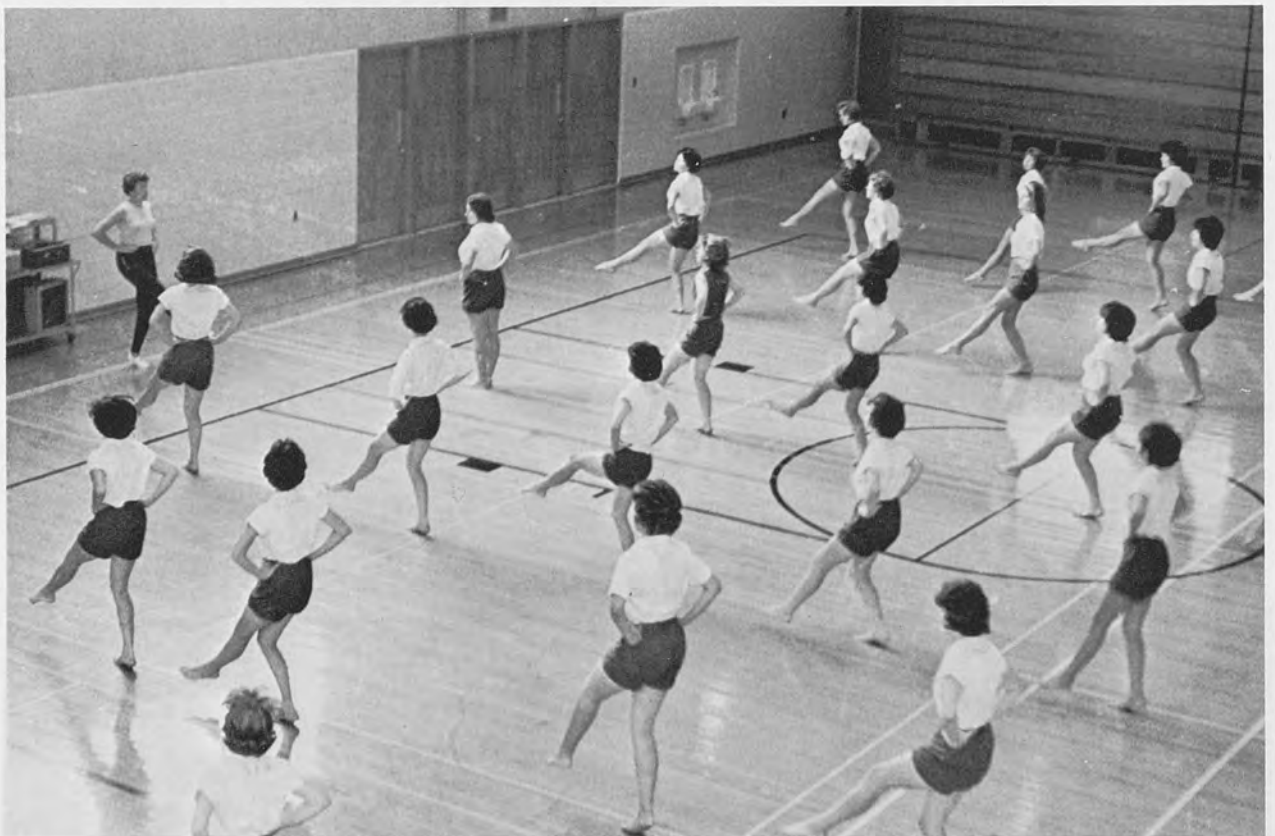

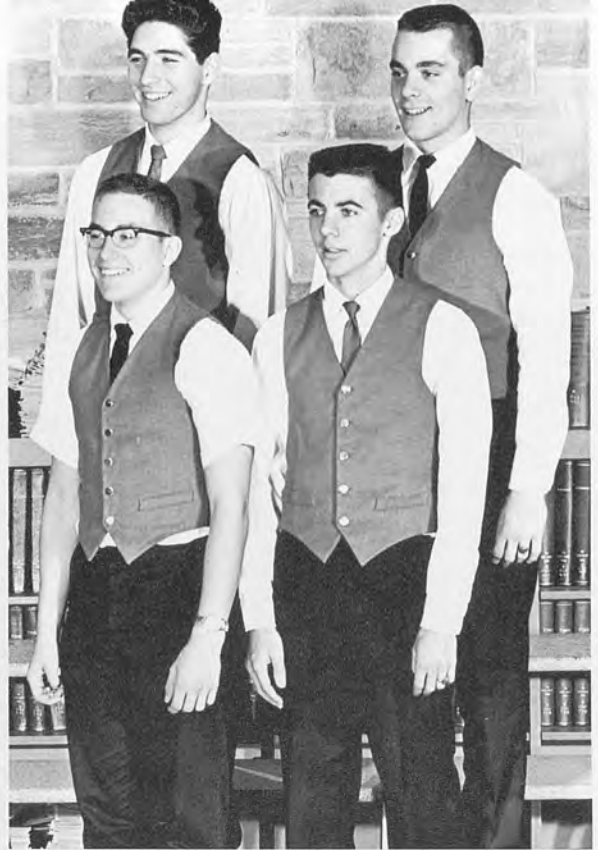

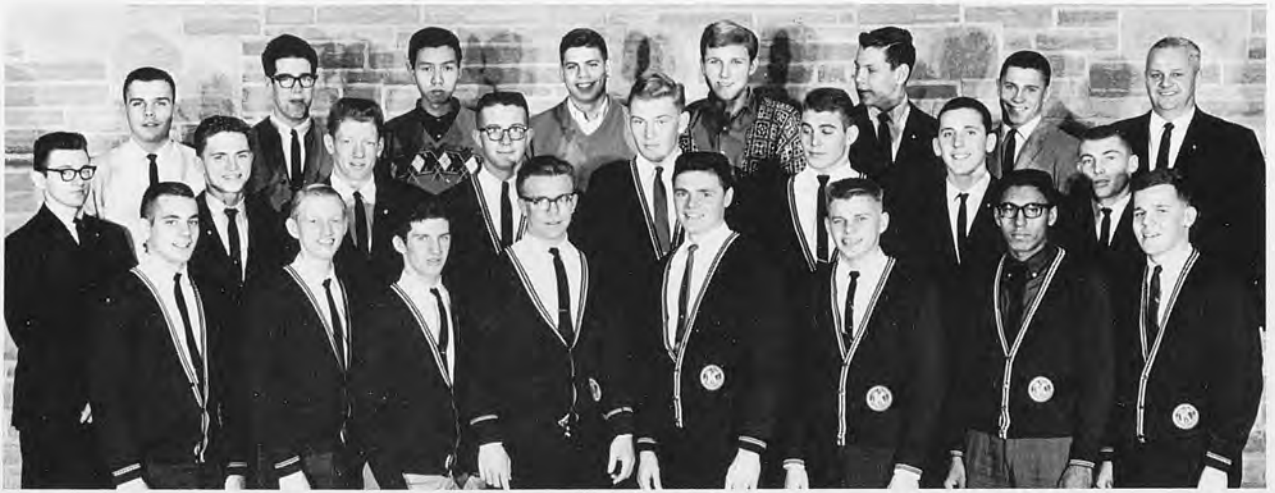

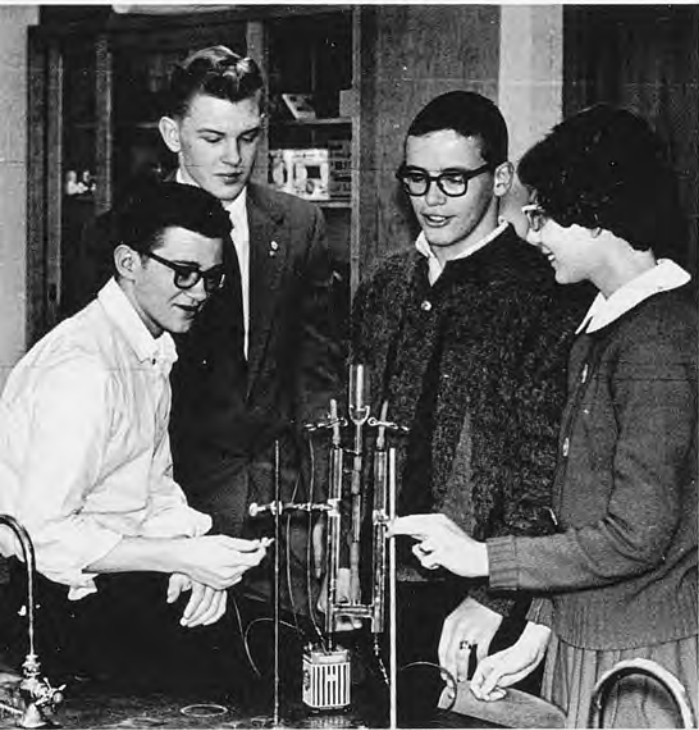

Cheerleaders Lead Chiefs' Loyal Fans

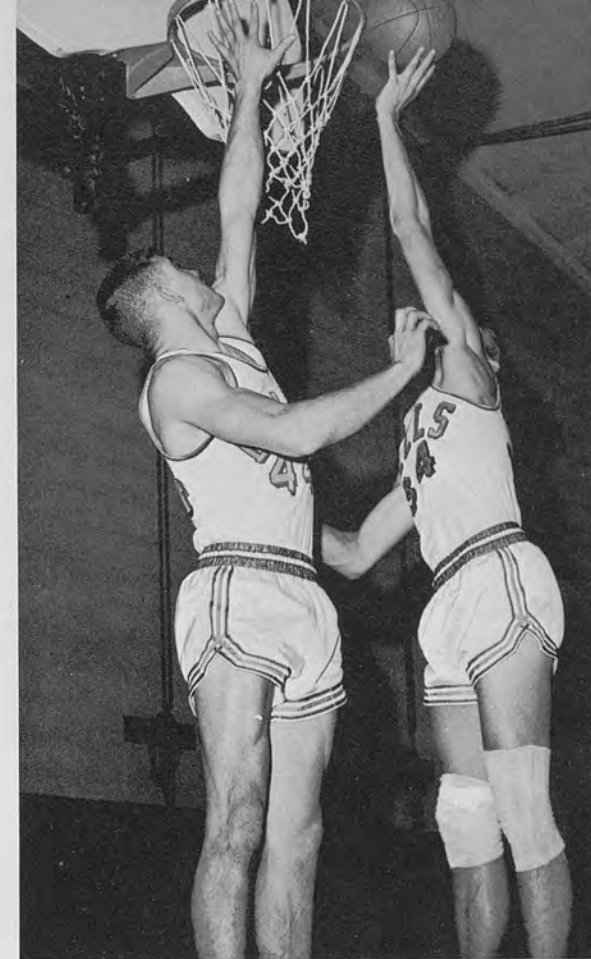

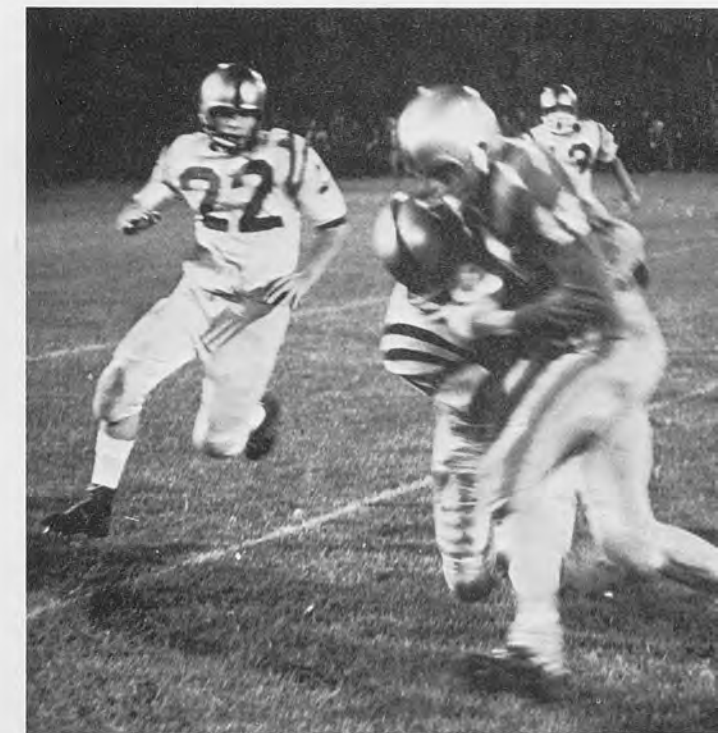

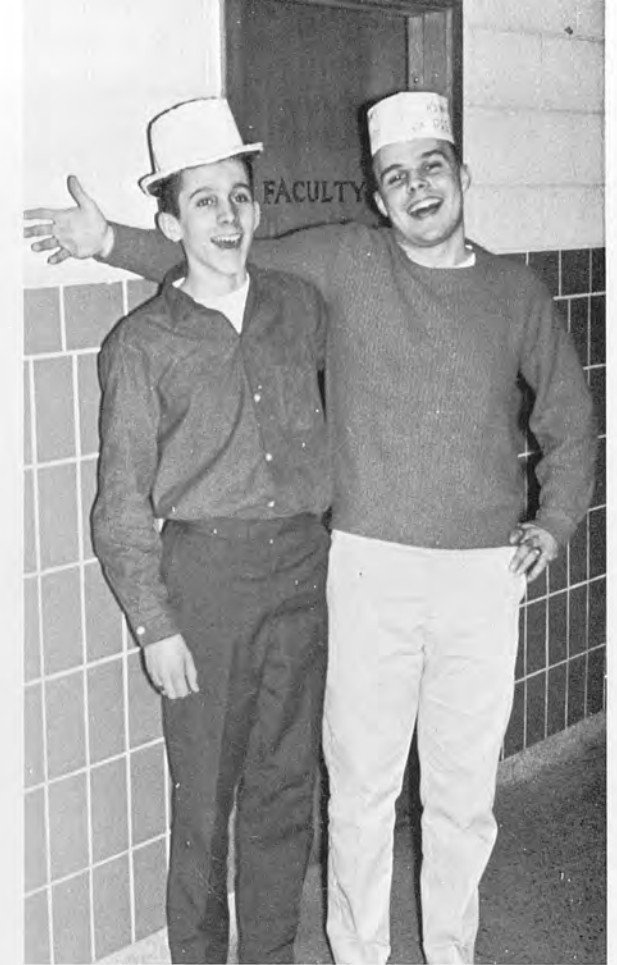

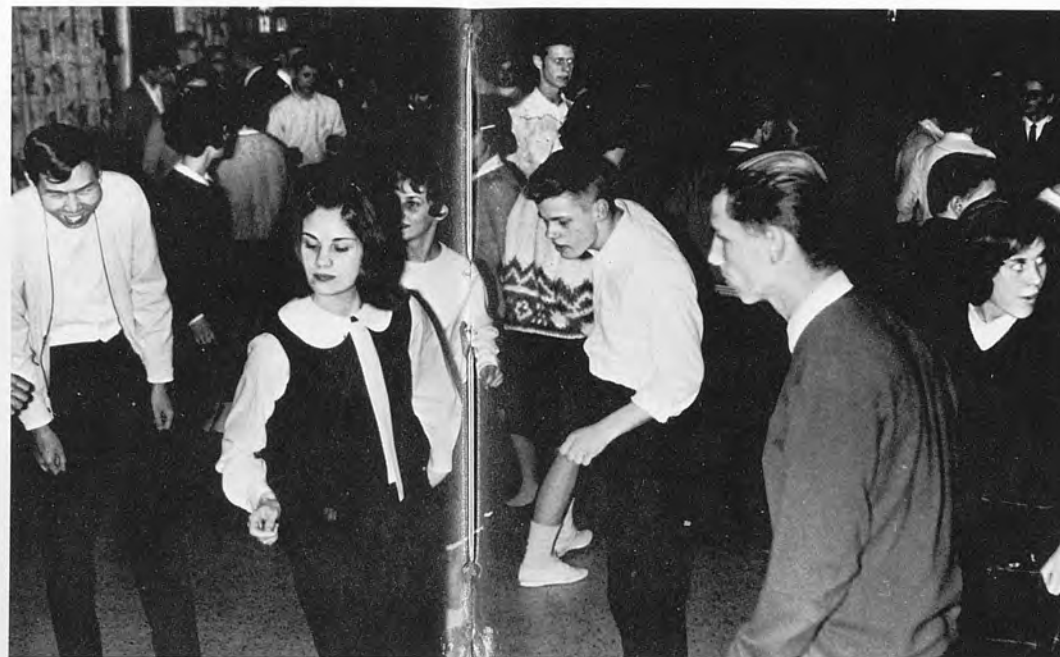
