# Instructors Provide Quality Education

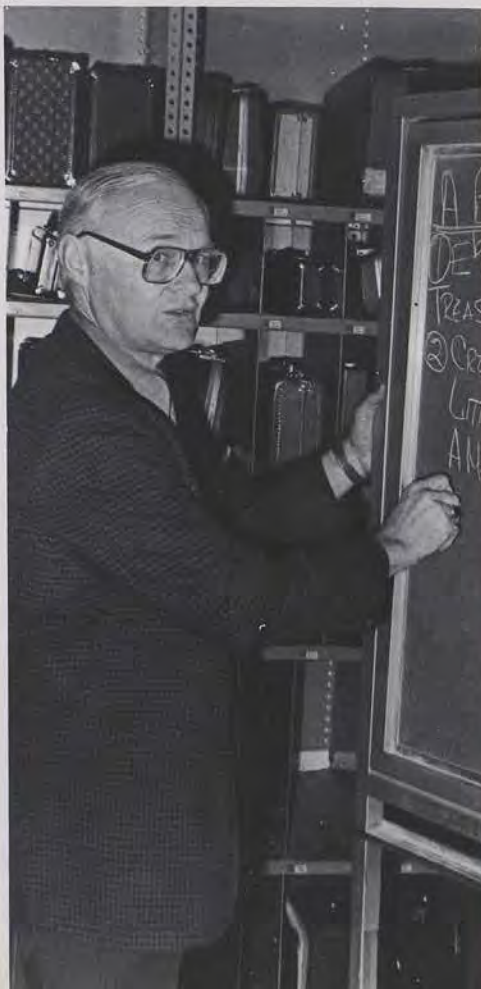

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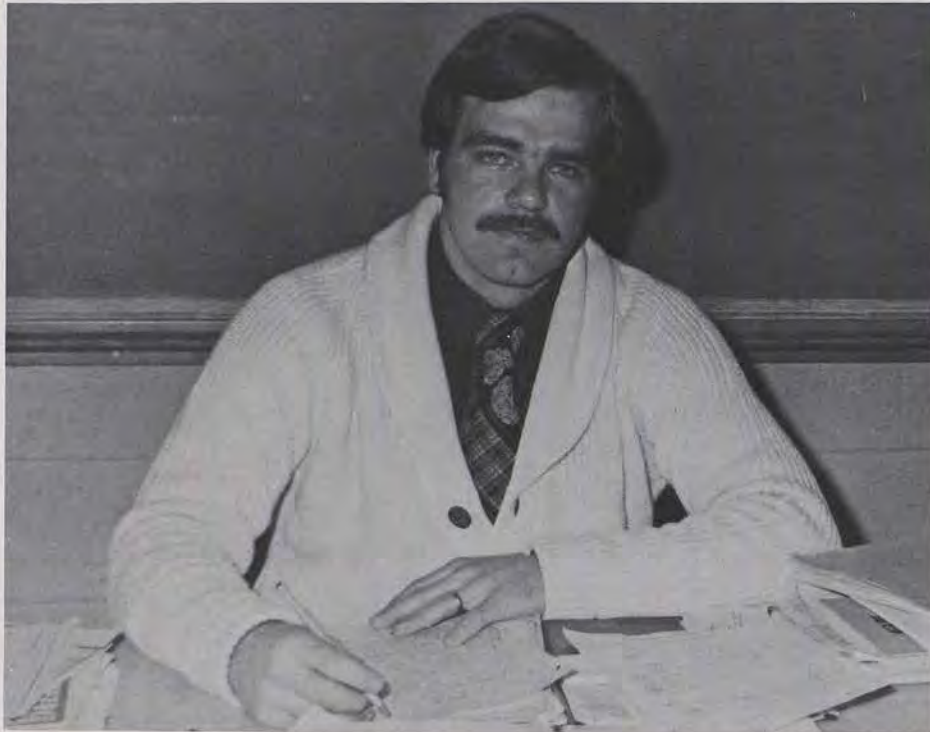

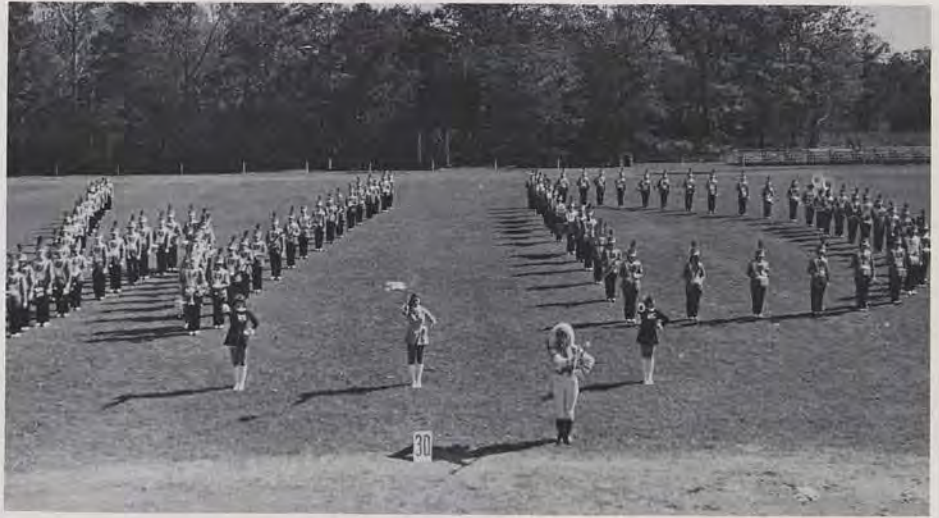
# Marching Band

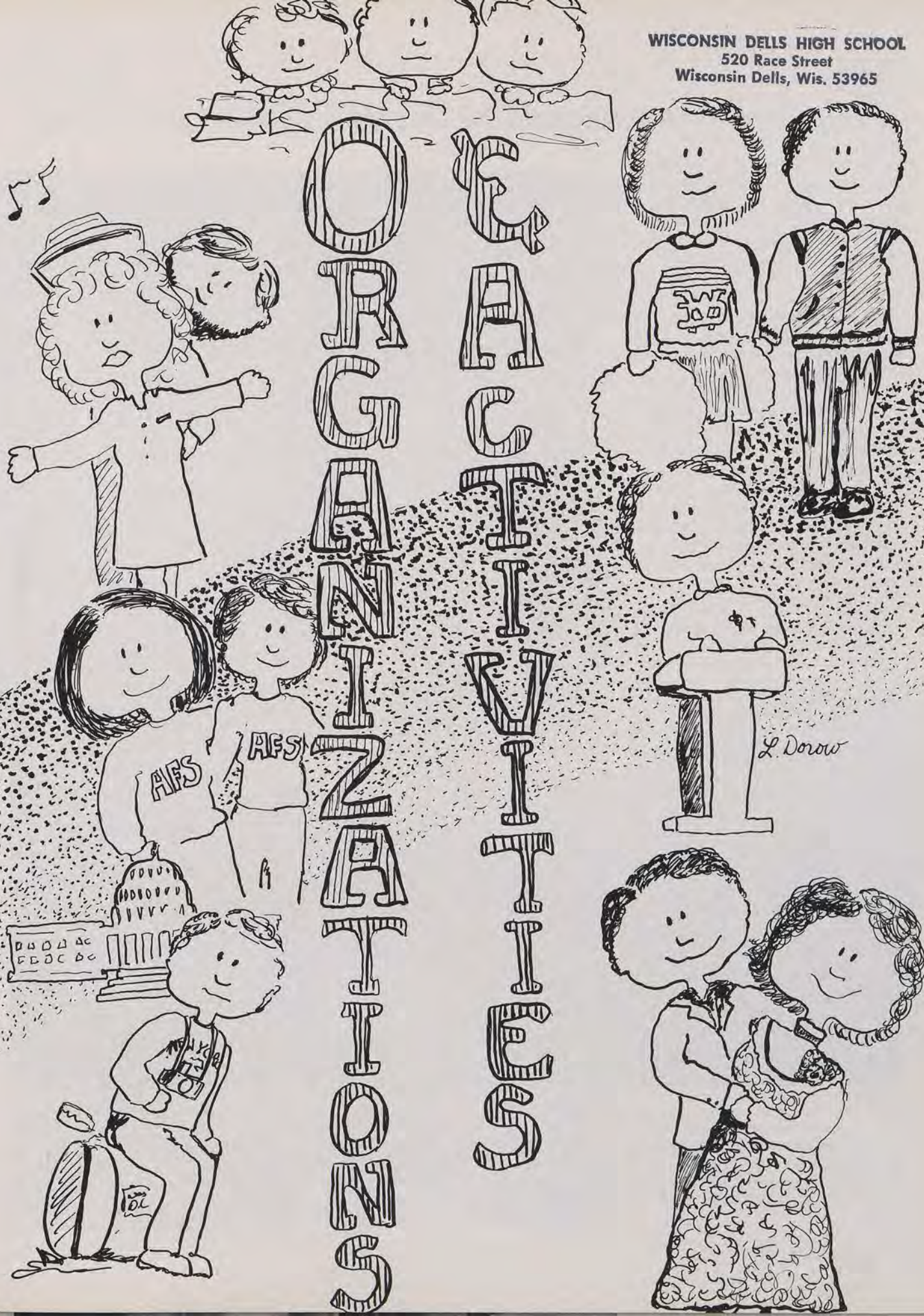

“Til the End of Time” the memories of Prom '77 will remain in the minds of couples that attended this formal evening.



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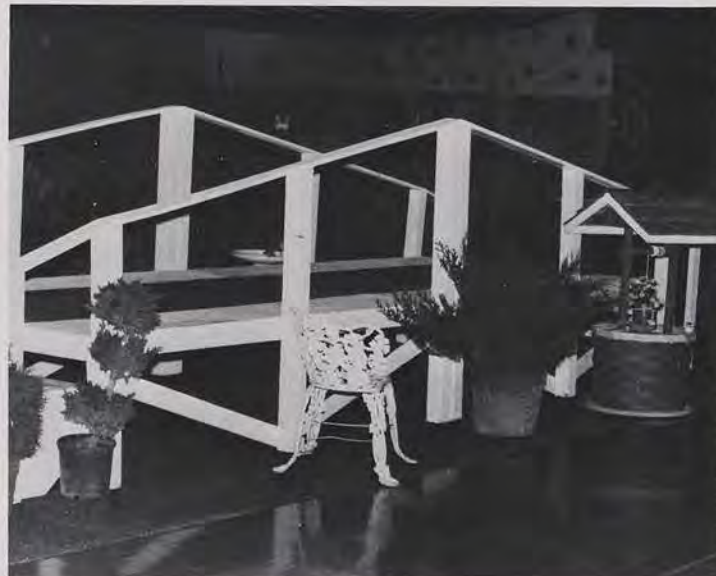

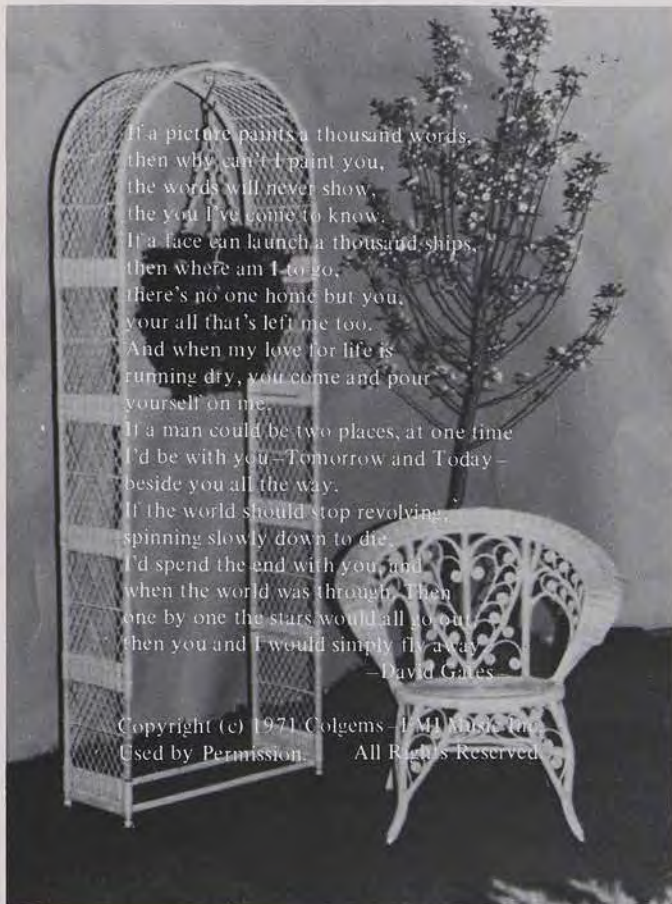

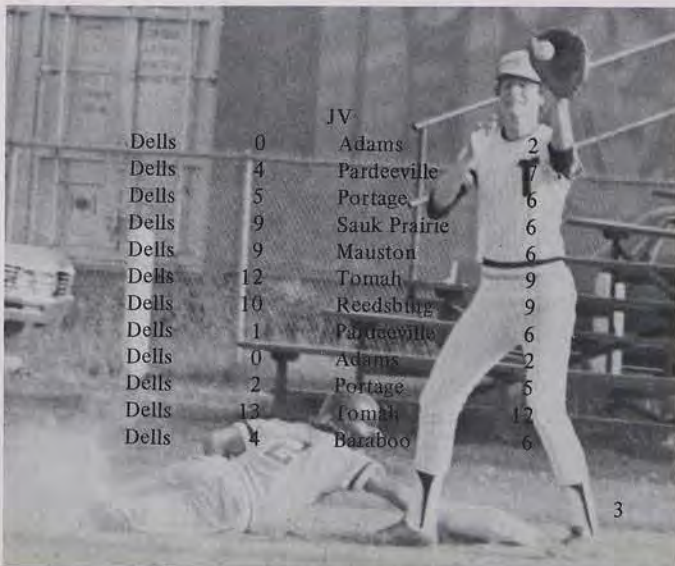

The 1977 Track team proved to have the most successful season in the history of Wisconsin Dells. 1977 was an interesting season for the WDHS football team and fans, as each game provided a different challenge and excitement.

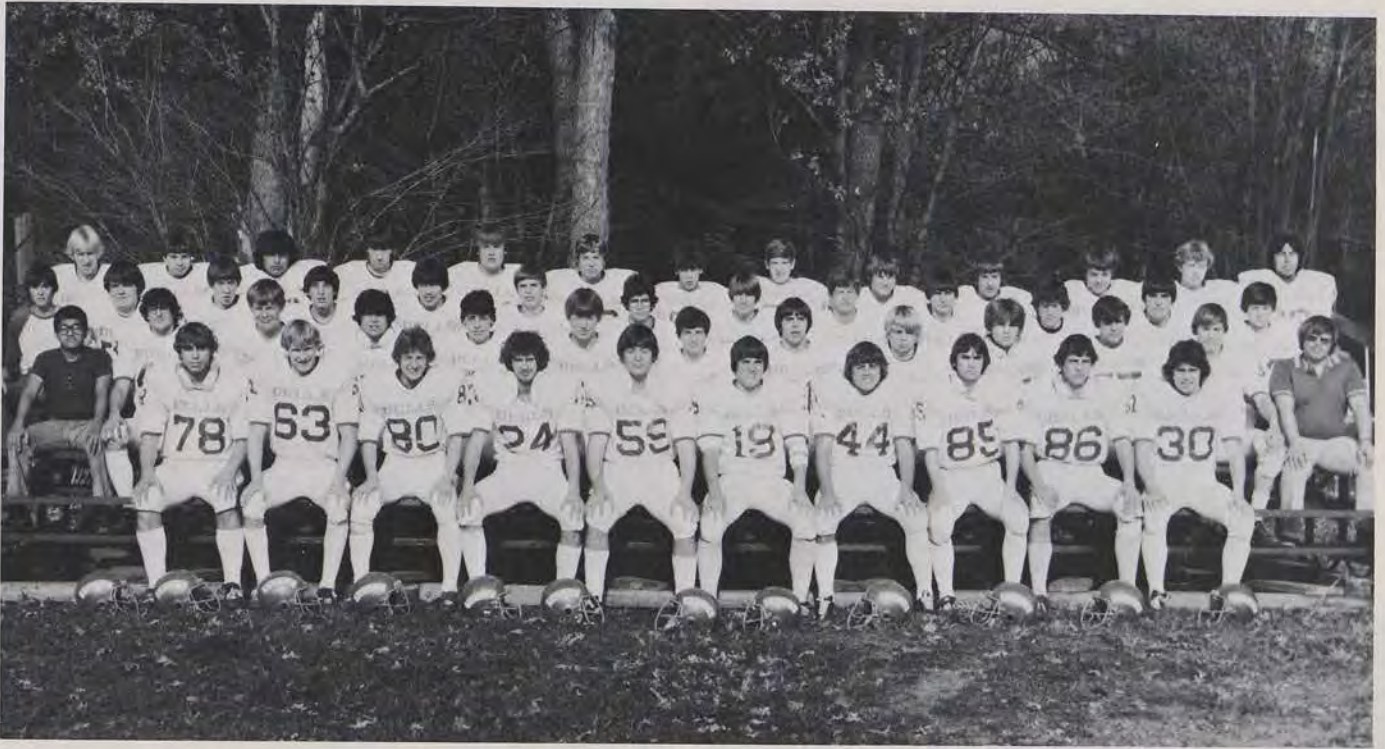

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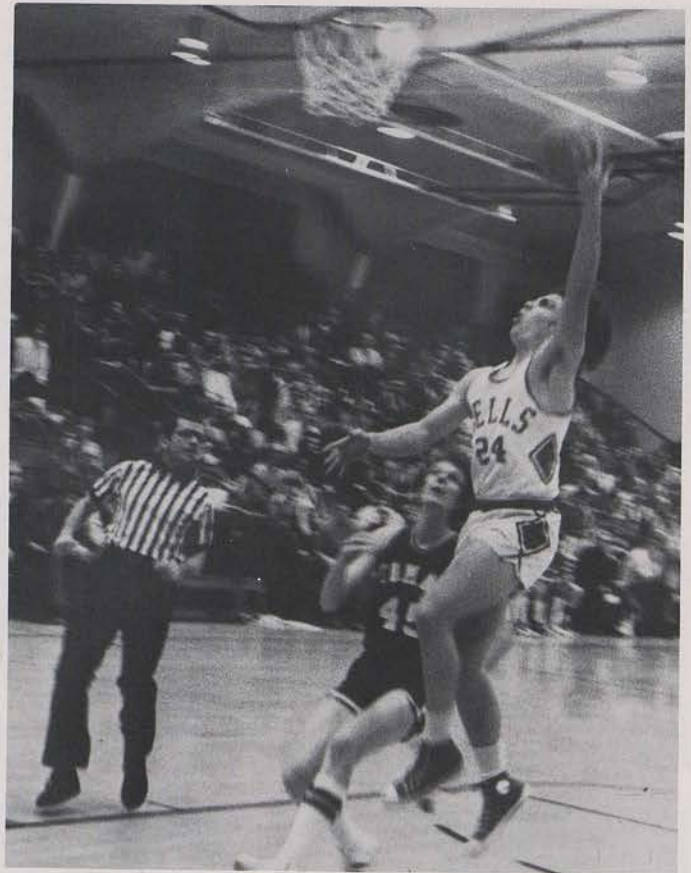

By defeating Prairie du Chien, 67-65 in overtime, the Chiefs won the Cuba City Class B Sectionals and the chance to play in the 63rd State Basketball Tournament. It was the Dells' third trip; they followed the 1942 and 1968 teams.

The week of March 13-17 was a busy week for Wisconsin Dells. Student Council designated certain days as "Coaches Day" and "Dells Day." 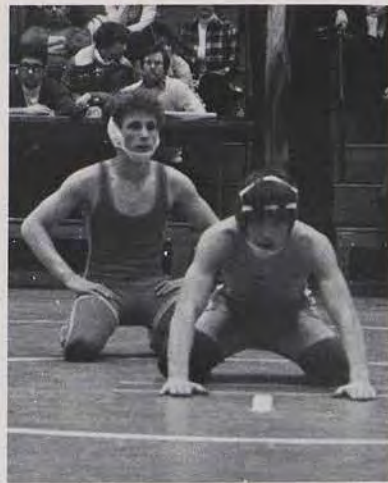

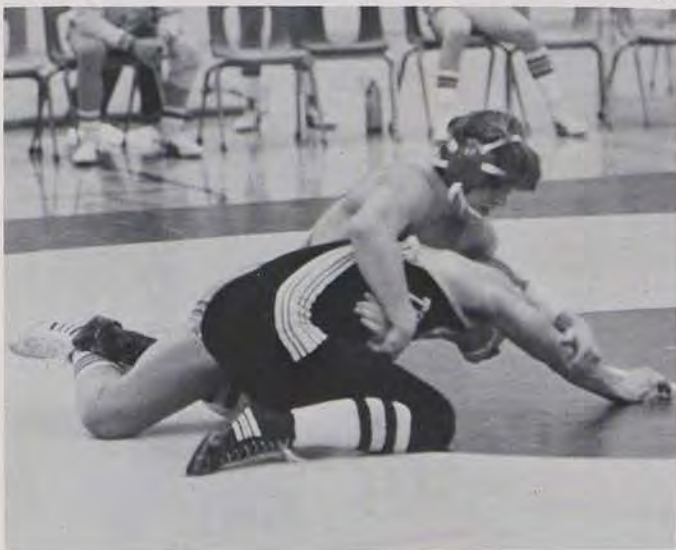

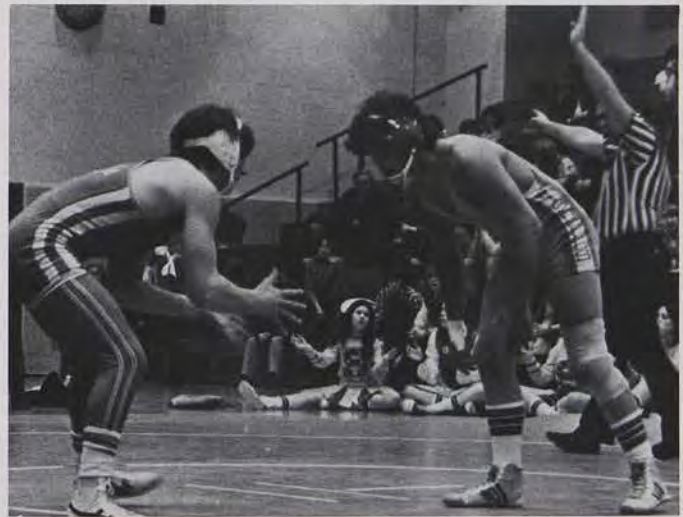

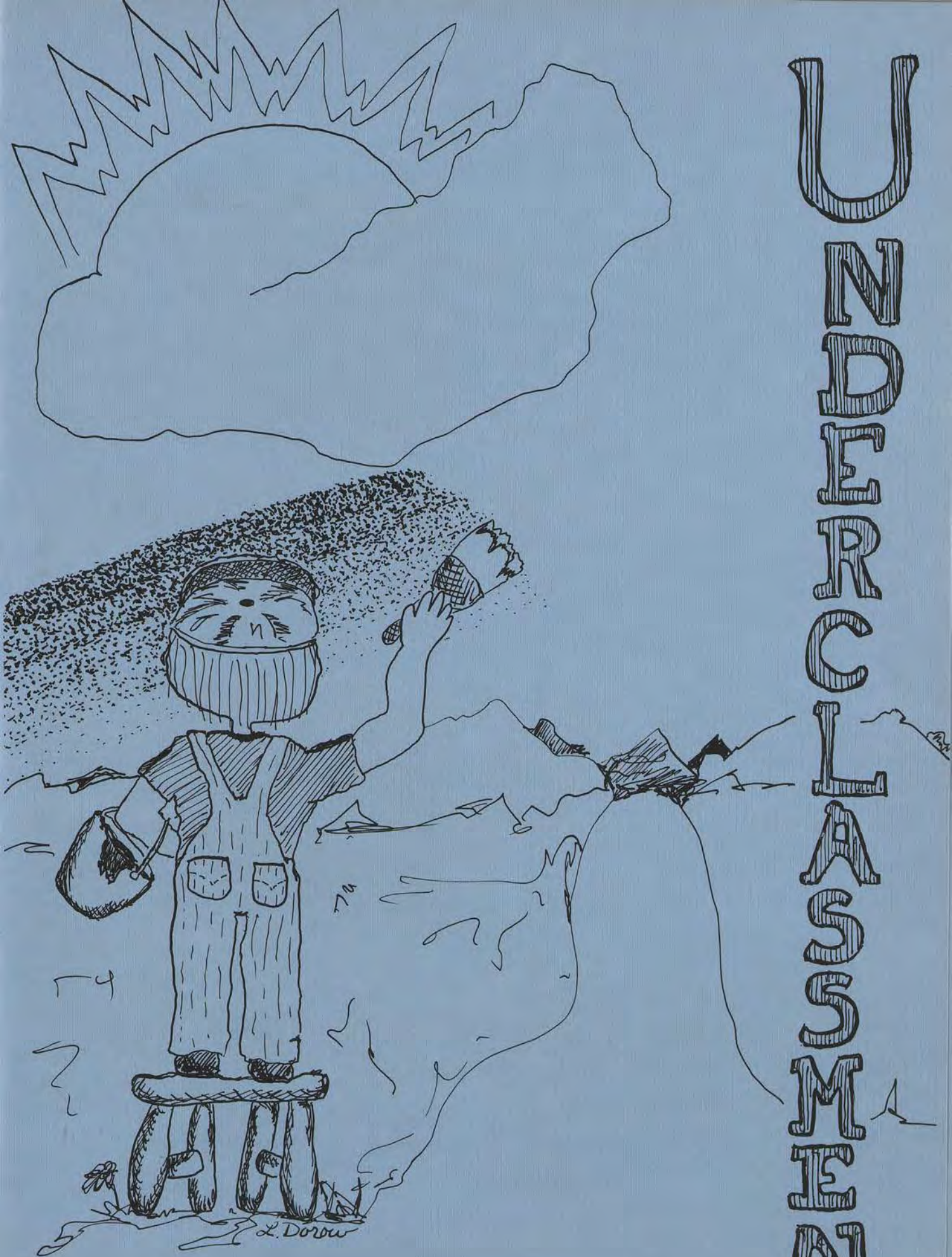

Many occupations and professions rely on a knowledge of agriculture. The Dells High School assists the community in educating the students in "agri-business."

Some of the classes offered in the agriculture department, taught by Mr. Weigel, are Horticulture, Conservation, Animal Science, Plant Science, Livestock Production, Agriculture Mechanics, and Welding.

Other courses offered to students in the Industrial Arts Department, which are taught by Mr. Capelle, are Auto Mechanics, Power Mechanics, Small Engines and Car Care.

The WDHS Art Department includes courses that range from very fundamental to advanced. These classes are designed to teach and cultivate new artists. Each art student has the chance to utilize equipment to enhance their creativity.

There are seven art courses available to students which include: Ceramics, a class that introduces a variety of media and techniques of working clay forms; Drawing and Painting I, which introduces the student to techniques, media and subject areas; Drawing and Painting II, a course that emphasizes techniques, media and creative thought; Drawing and Painting III, art students are able to explore in further depth; Sculpture, an introduction of three dimensional design and subject matter; Jewelry and Leather Craft, the students acquire the ability to make various simple pieces of jewelry and other objects of practical value.

## Business

# Students Acquire Practical Business Techniques

Under the supervision of Mrs. Reifsteck and Miss Beres, students acquire better techniques in business education. Student electives include foundational business courses in general business, recordkeeping, bookkeeping, personal typing, Typing I & II, and Shorthand I & II.

General Business enriches the students' understanding of basic business operational skills. During the course of the semester, students improve their business vocabulary and knowledge through solving business and economic problems.

By enrolling in Recordkeeping, students learn how to balance check books, and become adept in various other individual business matters. Bookkeeping enables students to acquire a practical experience in business transaction, and also provides an insight into the field of accounting.

Typing I & II provides instruction and structured practice materials needed for maximum growth in typing skill. Students develop speed and accuracy through the sequential skill building drills.

In Shorthand I & II, students gain knowledge of the shorthand elements of transcription. Students take dictation on material to improve their rates of speed and also practice reading and typing from their notes.

Home Economics I is offered as a general introductory course designed to explore various aspects of basic home making.

The Clothing I and II classes show the significance of the effect of line, texture, color combinations and fabric characteristics. The Clothing I class is involved in the processes of constructing a simple garment. Clothing II is an advanced class in which students learn special techniques of construction.

Child Care and Development is an elective course dealing with the influence of education in human development and the importance of developing and strengthening morals and values. This class also aids young adults in the art of preparing for parenthood.

Foods I teaches the principles of preparing food for family meals. Techniques of table service and table manners are also taught in this class. Foods II shows the significance of food in the past and future and the effect of sanitation and safety precaution in the food service industry.

## Math/Science

# Classes Promote Investigative Research

Science classes of various kinds are offered at WDHS. Freshmen are required to take the ISCS series. General Biology and Life Science are most commonly taken in a student's sophomore year, but these classes can be taken any time after the completion of the ISCS program. Biology is an elective course and a prerequisite for Botany, Zoology and Ecology.

The next series of courses in the science field is the Chemistry series, with General Chemistry being a prerequisite for Organic Chemistry and Inorganic Chemistry. Advanced science courses include Chemistry, Physics, Project Physics and Electronics.

There are also a wide variety of Math courses offered to students. Classes consist of General Math, which teaches the basic math skills. Algebra I is designed to introduce students to beginning algebraic expressions. Geometry and Algebra II let the students investigate the field of proofs, theorems, and logarithms. The most advanced math course offered, Math IV, teaches the processes of trigonometry.
