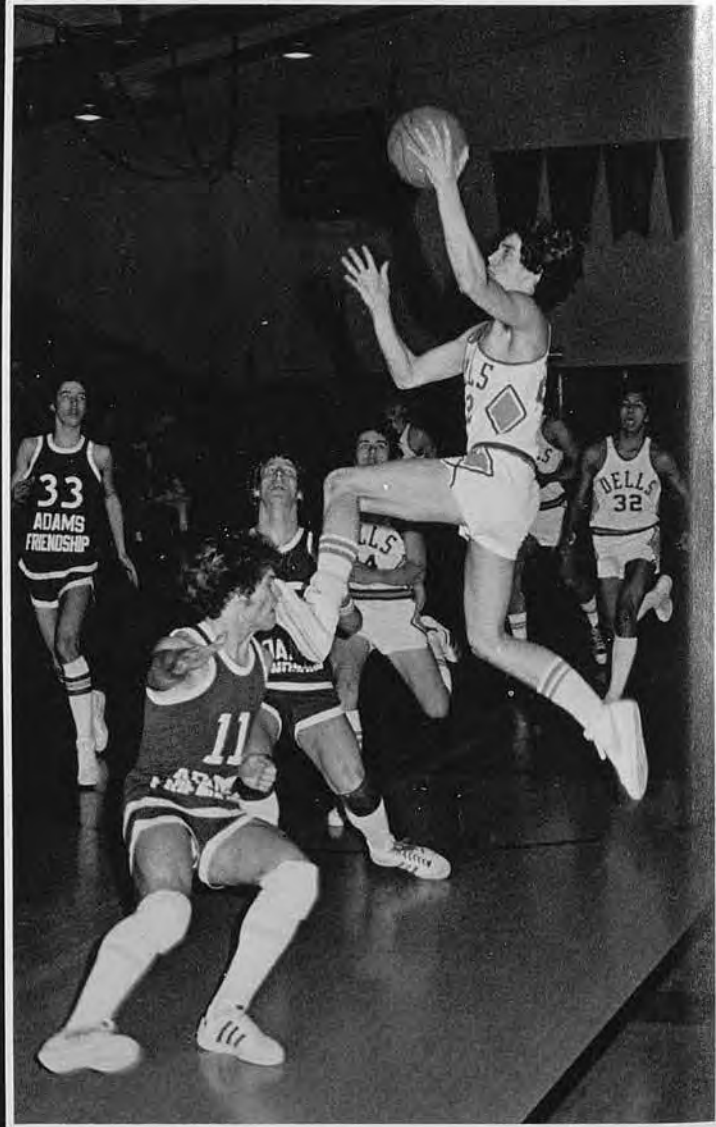


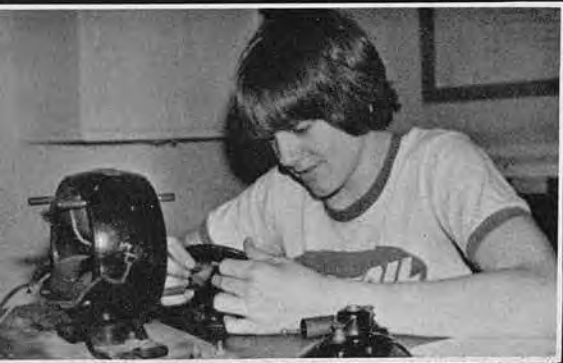

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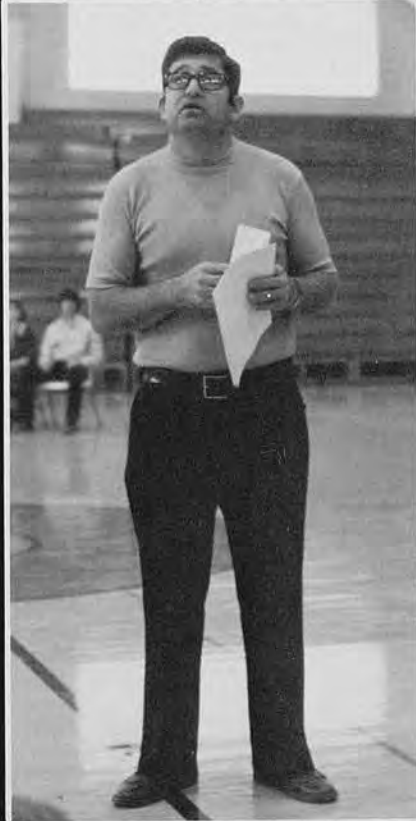

Special Departments Expand Programs

Various programs are offered to students at WDHS to provide specialized training in many educational areas. The programs have proven to be very helpful to the school, as well as to the students involved.

The South Central Vocational Center is in its second year of operation. The goals of this program are to teach job-entry level skills for high school students, in addition to preparing students for post-high school technical education. Mr. Spagnolletti, director of this program, commented, "The Baraboo Project offers students training for lasting career opportunities."

Two new programs were initiated into the school system. The first, alternative education, is a program which gives individualized help to students. This program, under the direction of Mrs. Potter, gives students a chance to achieve certain academic credits on a one to one basis. The second new program is conducted by Mrs. Paulson to help improve the reading program for students in kindergarten through twelfth grade.

Within the school system, there is also a program of special education, taught by Miss Becker, in which Miss Koschmann also teaches students with learning disabilities.

A student help program which has been offered to students in previous years, is audio-visual aid. Movie projectors, tape recorders, and audio-visual equipment are handled by student volunteers under the supervision of Mr. Torgerson. Mr. Torgerson has been faithful to this department for the past eight years.

Giving special help to everyone in this school are the helpful guidance counselors. Mrs. Keeble keeps busy counseling freshmen, starting them off on the right foot, while Mr. Skarda dedicates his twenty-sixth year at WDHS guiding the sophomores, juniors and seniors through scheduling and planning for their future.

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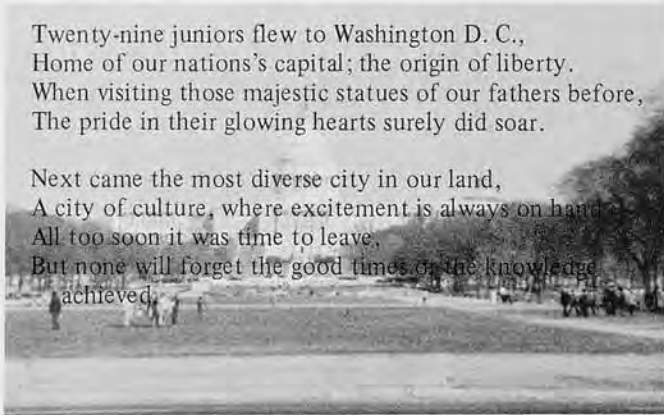

CHIEFS COME CLOSE: NOT CLOSE ENOUGH

1978 was a football season which brought the Dells Chiefs back into contention for the South Central Conference championship with a 7-2 record, compared to a dismal 3-6 record the previous season. The Chiefs finished in second place, one game behind the champion Reedsburg Beavers.

The Dells gridgers opened their season with Little Chute with a disappointing 20-2 defeat.

Coach Fred Kuhl's Chiefs came back hotter than ever in the 80 degree summer weather to pick up their first victory with a 14-0 score over LaCrosse Aquinas.

The Baraboo Thunderbirds were the next victims of the Chiefs explosive offense as senior tailback Eugene Morse raced for 278 yards and scored four touchdowns in a narrow 28-26 victory.

September 22 matched the Chiefs against a tough Portage Warrior ball club but found the Dells coming out on top with a 12-0 victory.

"This is our first championship game this season," commented Coach Kuhl before the game with Mauston, spotting a 2-0 conference record against the Dells 2-0 conference mark. After a close 14-6 first half, the offense and defense settled to a 27-6 win, preparing them for the showdown with Reedsburg the following week.

Reedsburg meant two very important factors for the Chieftains, as it being Homecoming, but more important the leadership in the conference standings. The Dells held a 7-6 advantage until midway through the fourth quarter when the Beavers scored six more points, making this game only the 2nd loss for the Dells and putting Reedsburg in the driver's seat.

Adams-Friendship was the next opponent. The Green Devils scored their lone touchdown in the fourth quarter against the tough Dells defense. It marked a 20-8 victory for the Chiefs.

The story was the same for the Spartans as the "Blue Machine" rolled to a 21-6 victory.

Tomah brought forth the close of the season and Parent's Night. Once again the Chiefs chalked up another victory with a commanding 26-8 decision.

All-Conference honors went to Tom Baggot, Tim Buss, Chris Frederiksen, and Eugene Morse for offense, and Bryce Knuth, Tim Anderson, Robin Staniszewski for defense. Chris Frederiksen was voted Most Improved Player, while Tim Anderson and Eugene Morse were chosen as co-captains for the 1978 season. In addition to being voted Most Valuable Player, Eugene Morse received the "Prep of the Week" award from the Wisconsin State Journal for his outstanding performances during the season. Eugene scored 17 touchdowns and totaled 1572 yards for a new school record.

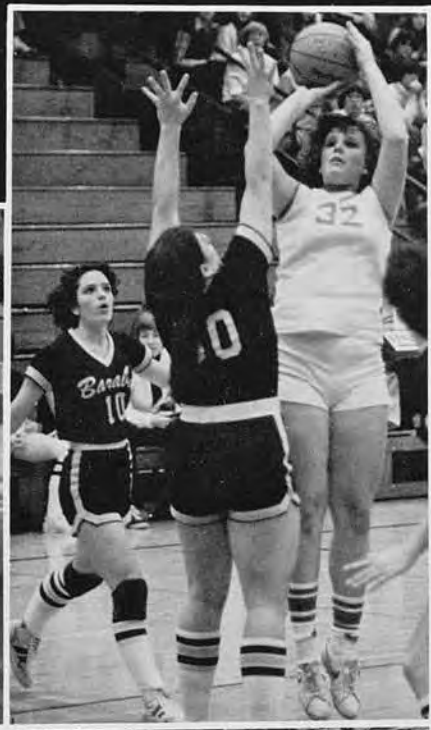

The Wrestling Chiefs kept up the tradition that has made the Dells a South Central Conference power. Under second year head Coach Wayne Stapleford, the Chiefs were guided to a 10-3 dual meet record.

The Dells led off with second place conference winner and sectional qualifier Nathan Young at 105. Nathan finished with a 15-10 record.

The Dells was hampered for the first part of the season at 112 when Jay Schoenbeck was out with a broken collarbone. He returned after the Christmas break to finish with a 9-4 record.

State qualifier Brian Cahoon led the Chiefs in an exciting season with his gramby rolls. Brian finished at State with a 18-13-2 mark.

Jim VanDinter proved to be the hero of the conference meet for the Chiefs as he pinned his semi-final opponent and went on to beat highly rated Craig Douglas in the 126 pound finals by a 15-11 decision. Jim finished his junior year with a 9-8 mark.

Co-captain Doug Reifsteck took his 23-6 record into the State tournament, along with capturing the Dells Invitational 132 crown. He wound up 3rd in State and 27-7.

Sophomores Dan Stroebel and Tim Stowers finished their first year on Varsity, Dan winning the Racine title, finishing with a 11-11-1 record, and Tim finishing second at Racine and 11-12 overall.

155 pounder Scott Sitas was another exciting Chief wrestler as he won both Dells Invitational and Racine Invitational titles. Scott had an impressive 19-4 record.

Co-captain Tim Anderson captured a sectional berth this year and showed his senior leadership in finishing out at 18-8-1.

The Dells takedown technician, Eugene Morse, led the Chiefs in his two-point moves in recording individual titles in the Dells and Racine invitationals. Eugene finished his career with a 19-3 mark.

Bryce Knuth proved to be one of the lighter heavyweights in the conference, but this didn't stop the tough senior as he won the Racine title and wound up 17-7 for the year.

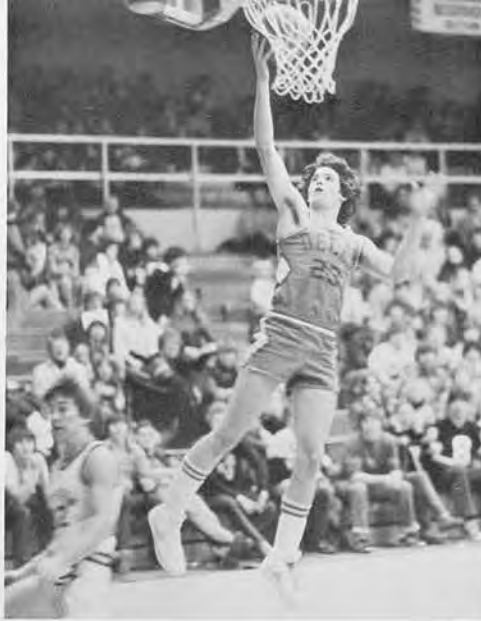
