For when Elton and Anka are gone from us, when our favorite jeans have long been discarded, our yearbook remains, every picture telling a story about a moment in my life.














































Administration



This year the Math Department purchased four new calculators which are, according to Mr. Engsberg, very helpful in all of his classes.







Biology student Mike Heitman commented, "I feel with the problems of today, the younger generation should be more aware of our health conditions. And through science we can accomplish many of our future problems."



1974 Brings a Remodeled Shop, New Tractor










"A season of ups and downs." That was how Coach Dale Maher characterized the 1974 baseball season.



Portage: Homecoming '75 was just one more victory for the high-flying machine as they drew a 34-7 win over the Warriors.






Junior Varsity Boasts Undefeated Season














