History

U.S.S. Dells High School Sea of Life May 23, 1947

Dear Public.

Let me tell you about the four-year voyage just completed by the never-to-beforgotten class of '47. In September, 1943, with Mr. Drozd and Miss Western to guide us over this roughest of seas, we embarked on what proved to be a fascinating journey. Even though many of the passengers, not being used to the sea, were extremely green, we nevertheless managed to bring ourselves immediately into the limelight by setting out on the voyage in an extremely overloaded canoe, to the extent of 83 passengers. Though this may have contributed somewhat toward rocking the school's most recent "dream-boat", we were very proud of the fact, since we had the largest crew ever to enter W.D.H.S. Not wanting to be the cause of any drastic change in the manner in which things were formerly done here, we very conventionally elected John Trumble as president, "Red" Novak, vice president, Lucille Baggot, secretary, and Norman Fedderly, treasurer. crew made itself notable as the four F'ers, and in our case it didn't refer strictly to lack of physical prowess, but also to our shining scholastic records. of the first part of our journey, when the spade was being awarded in the traditional manner to the highest-ranking Junior, we again became famous. Guenther Schultz, a member of our crew, became the first (and undoubtedly last) person ever to receive the "hoe". This no doubt must be looked upon as a great honor.

Having thus illustriously completed the first portion of our voyage, and deciding the canoe was not capable of undergoing another, our crew joyously boarded a steadier craft on which to continue our trip---a rowboat!! With Mr. Loomis acting as chief coxswain, and our slightly diminished crew exhibiting great cooperation, we began rowing across the second sea. We were comparatively experienced seamen by this time and the sailing was much smoother. However, just as an extra precaution, Mrs. Jackman was lucky enough to be awarded the position of second advisor, seeing as how it seemed to be established that we should have two each year. (Probably that was because they wanted as many teachers happy as possible.) When the heavy-hearted sighs of the less fortunate ones who had not won the cherished positions of Sophomore advisor had died down, class elections were held. Norman Fedderly was elected president; Frank Russell, vice president; Jeannine Schultz, secretary; and Gordon Gasser, treasurer.

Having safely crossed the second sea, we prepared for our third cruise only to be met with a very pleasant surprise. Since we now had reached the "upper classmen" stage, we found that this journey was to be made on a yacht—no less. With Mr. Holden

and Miss Spangenberg occupying the ever-present positions of, our "two" advisors, elections were held to determine the all-important question—"Who will be prom king?". Karl Decker proved to be the answer to that question, while Mouse Kaiser was elected vice president; Jean Kelly, secretary; and Frank Russell, treasurer. The next important question, of course, was "What shall we have for a prom theme? After much discussion we chose Arabian Nights, and decided on Hal Edwards to provide the music. 'Though there was some cause for the harassed look on Mr. Holden's face a few preceding May 3, the finished product could not have been improved upon, and the prom was the most successful ever held in Wisconsin Dells High School.

The beautiful ocean liner which we boarded (along with our position of "high and mighty") to complete our voyage was truly befitting our rank. The cruise across the fourth sea seemed to be done in no time, riding in style as we were. We did manage to pass one great milestone, 'though. The established custom that we were to have two advisors each year was broken and we were entrusted into the care of only Miss Isakson. The Senior banquet was held at Berry's hotel, where we indulged freely in delicious food. Afterward we danced in lovely surroundings——decorated by our own ingenious crew. It was with none of our usual gayety that we descended the gangplank for the last time, for graduation was over, and we have now realized that after four very pleasant years of being able to share our journeys with the rest of the crew, it would not be up to each of us to start "paddling our own canoe." This four-year voyage just completed by the never-to-be-forgotten class of '47, is also a voyage the class of '47 will never forget!!

A wonderful time was had by all and we are proud of the success of our Prom.








The colorful procession proceeded up Broadway and the laughter, singing, and cheers were undoubtedly heard for blocks.

The Homecoming celebration ended early (supposedly) as our football players needed sleep to be in first class condition for the game with Portage on the following afternoon.




THE 1946 FOOTBALL SEASON

BASKETBALL


