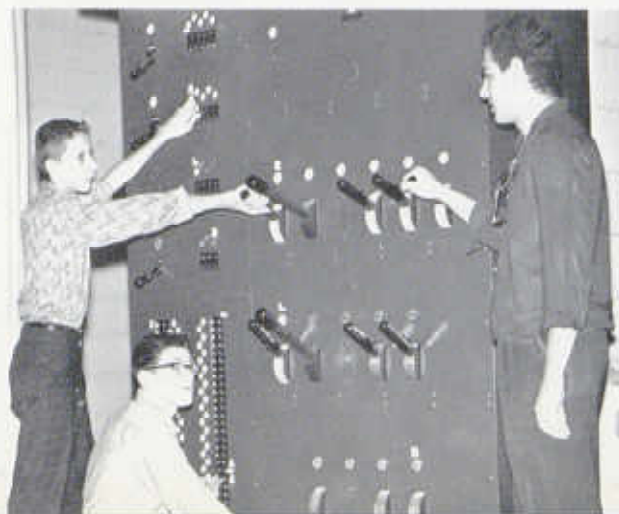

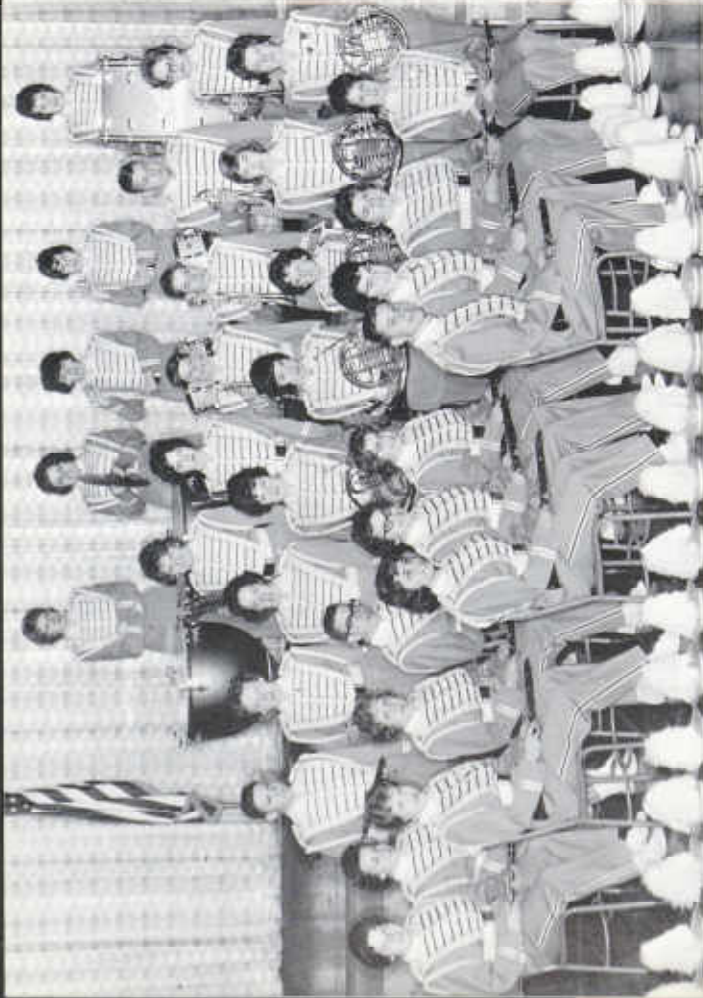

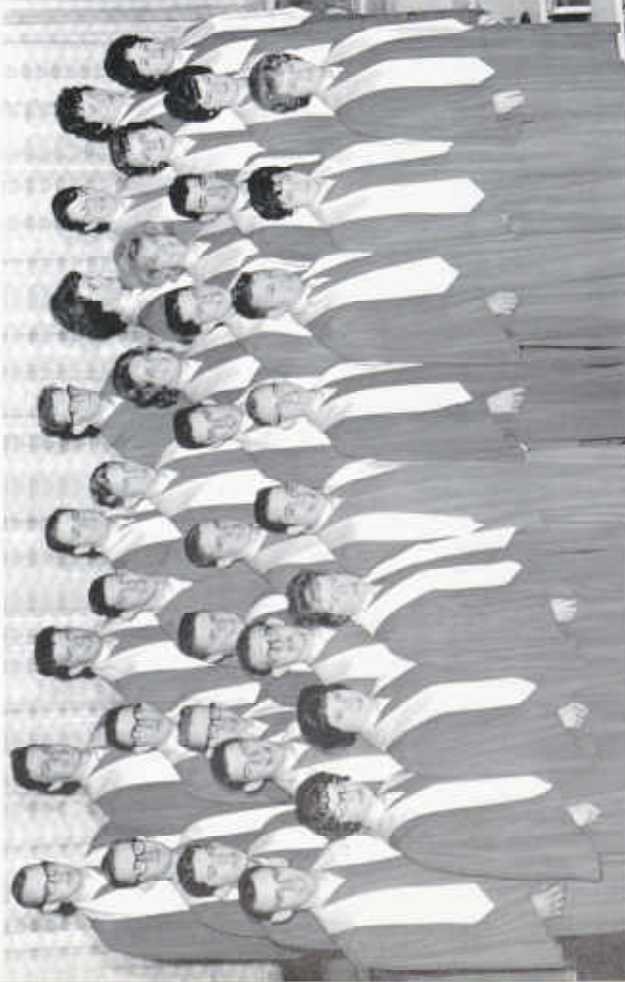


Maneuvers

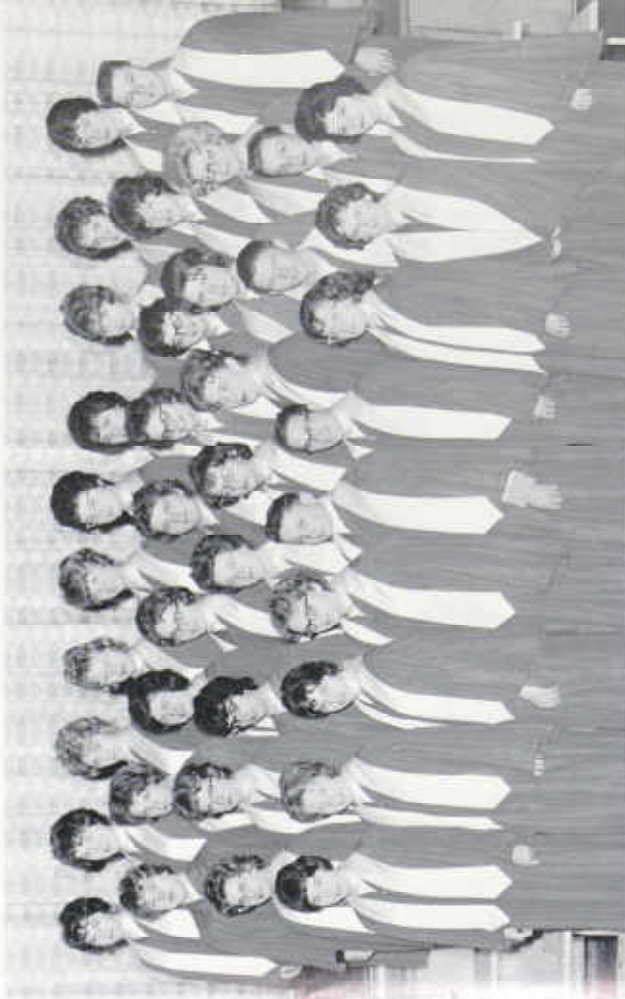

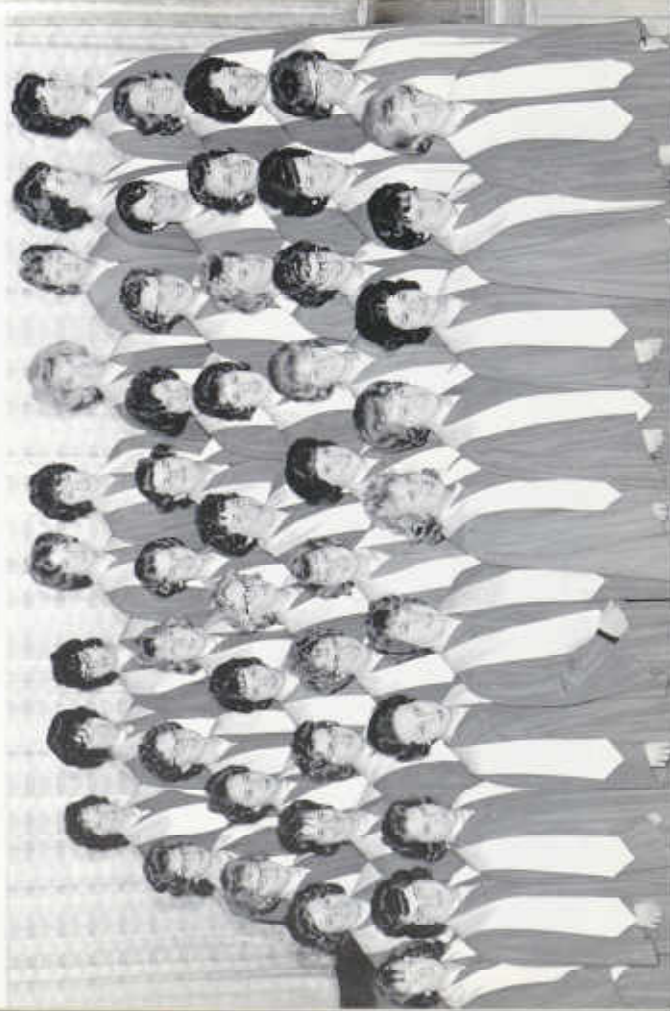

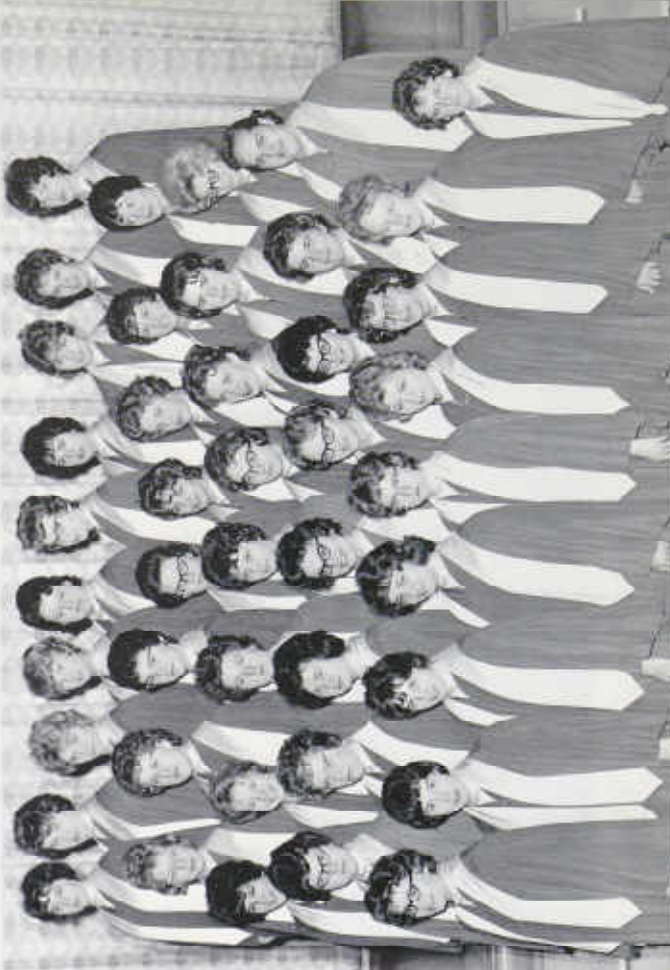
