"My favorite moment in choir is when they get it," Munderloh said when discussing the different choirs. "You have to fail until you find it."

"Choir rehearsal is not a text message; it doesn't happen that fast and it's not that easy," said Thomas Munderloh, when explaining the hard work that gets put into choir every day. With five years of teaching students choral music at Wisconsin Dells High School, Munderloh knows what he's talking about.

On average, it takes Munderloh 4-5 hours each night to prepare for the next concert. Concerts this year have included the "Just Us" concert at St. Cecelia's Chorch; the "Colors of Winter" holiday concert; the first ever WDHS Alumni Choir Concert at Robin's Nest Restorations; The Celebration of Choral Music, featuring a capella group Cat's Pajamas; and The Dells Choir Show.

For the first time ever, the Chieftain choir performed at the Show Choir National Championship Series "Fame" in Chicago on March 21, 2014. The songs performed for competition included "Sing Me to Heaven" by Daniel Gawthorp, "Walk a Mile" by Mark Hayes and "Owls" by Vijay Singh.

Unlike a math teacher who is required to teach the same curriculum year after year, a choir teacher instructs differently each year depending on the strength of the choir. Munderloh said, "Music selection is a thing that constantly changes every year. You have to look at the kids you have and find out their strengths."

"Vox can easily be dubbed the most improved choir. We have great leaders and every singer has a great attitude and work ethic. Every year in Chieftain, we lose great singers and every year our top auditioned choir steps up and fills in those shoes. This year is no different. Our singers filled those shoes with grace and good work ethic. I'm very proud. Columbia has been the most fun and most talented Columbia to date. They have a great future in our choir program."

Munderloh is looking forward to the addition of the new a capella choir next year.

"It's going to push me outside of my comfort zone. And if I want my kids to step outside their comfort zone, then I have to step outside my comfort zone."


"This team was a lot of fun to work with, not just because they did well, but because they are a great bunch of kids," stated head coach Troy Ryan.





"It was a long process, taking about seven months total, just for one night," said prom committee member, Becca Frederiksen.


The juniors met often after school for months to work on decorations and to build props for prom.


"In the end it was worth it," Frederiksen concluded.
