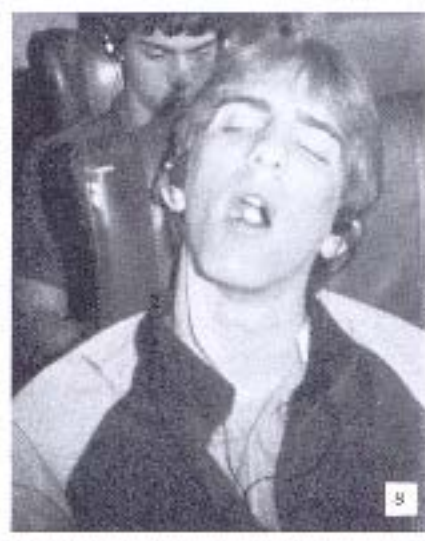
W.D. to N.Y.C.

A Southern Ball

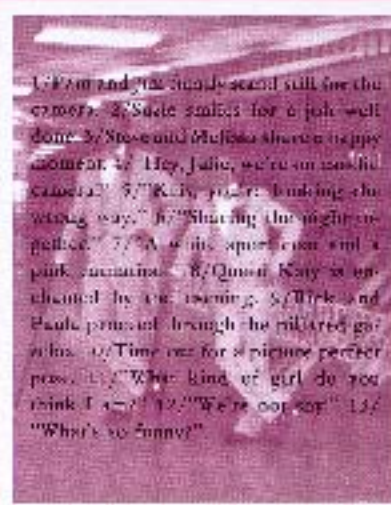
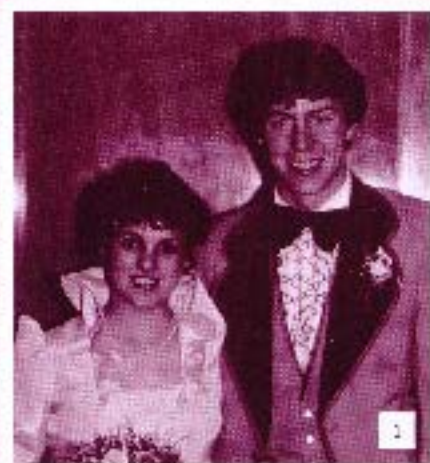

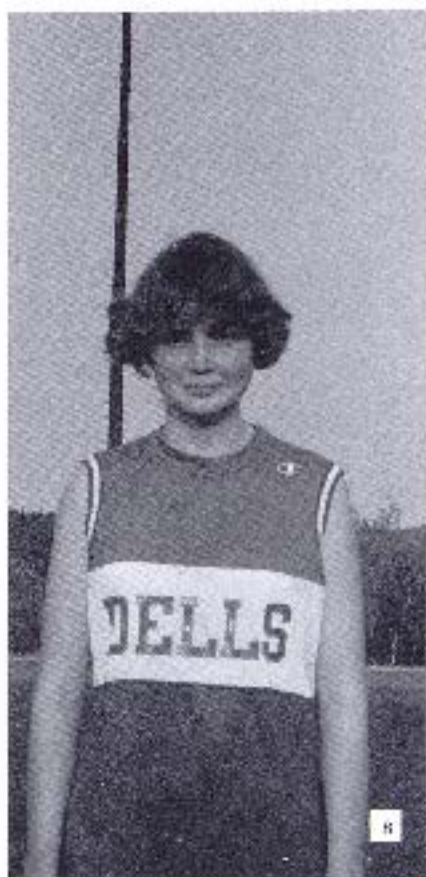

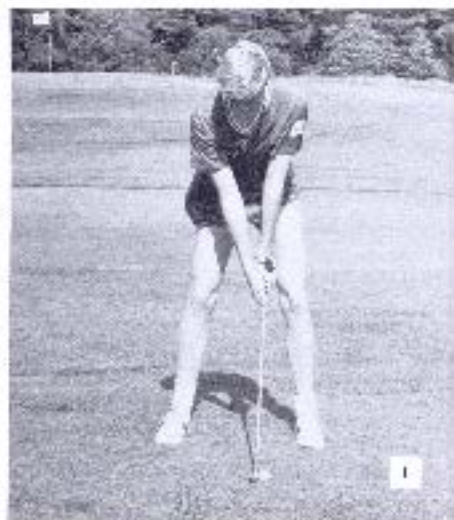

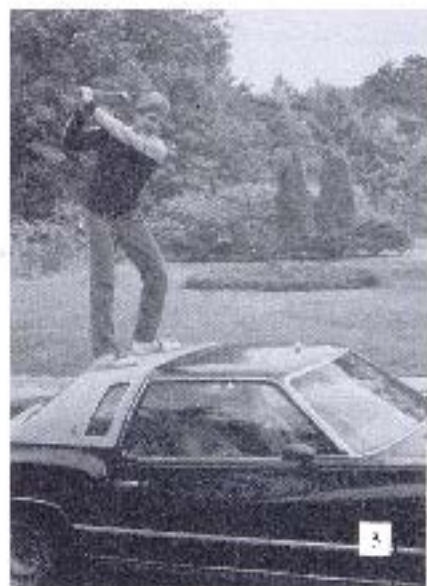

On the first day of practice, the 1984 Football Chiefs were greeted by a chalkboard extending its welcome to the future S.C.C. Co-Champions. During the remainder of their prep careers, 15 seniors and other members of the varsity squad hared down to fulfill the prophecy.

Early on in a lackluster non conference game against Jefferson, the Dells lost 6-0, showing a promising defense and an uncertain offense. After a win against Adams, the Chiefs lost to Nekoosa in one of a number of games that came to be called "championship" games. In previous years, the Chiefs might have collapsed after such a loss, but this team believed that it *deserved* to win. This was a major difference between this year's squad and teams from years ago.

Senior guidance, along with co-captains John Vernon and Willie Wimmer, helped the Chiefs put together a consecutive six game winning streak. They began by shutting out Sparta and Portage. Then, in the waning seconds of the game, the Chiefs beat Reedsburg with a game-saving interception by Willie Wimmer.

Finally, against Baraboo, a punt return for a touchdown sent the game into double overtime. This strong finish earned the Chiefs, along with Reedsburg, a Co-Champion South Central Conference title and a berth in the play-offs.

The "second season" saw the Chiefs conquer Kiel, winning their first playoff game in Dells history, and finish up their season with a loss to Oconto Falls in the State semi-finals.

In a season of bright spots, one of the major disappointments was the lack of Dells players selected to the Conference team. The Chiefs placed only three players: David Anderson, C; John Vernon, OT; and Pete Johnson, DT; who also was named to the all-district team.

Coach Kuhl summed up the season by saying, "We were considered a dark-horse at best. To get as far as we did and succeed at what we set out to do was quite an accomplishment, with a lot of credit going to the leadership and determination demonstrated by the seniors. I hope that the athletes can take what they've learned and experienced this football season and apply it to situations that they may be confronted with later on in their lives."

Sophomore Tim Deereah and junior Bill Rindersdorf anchored the back court and provided inside play as the Dells made its championship run.

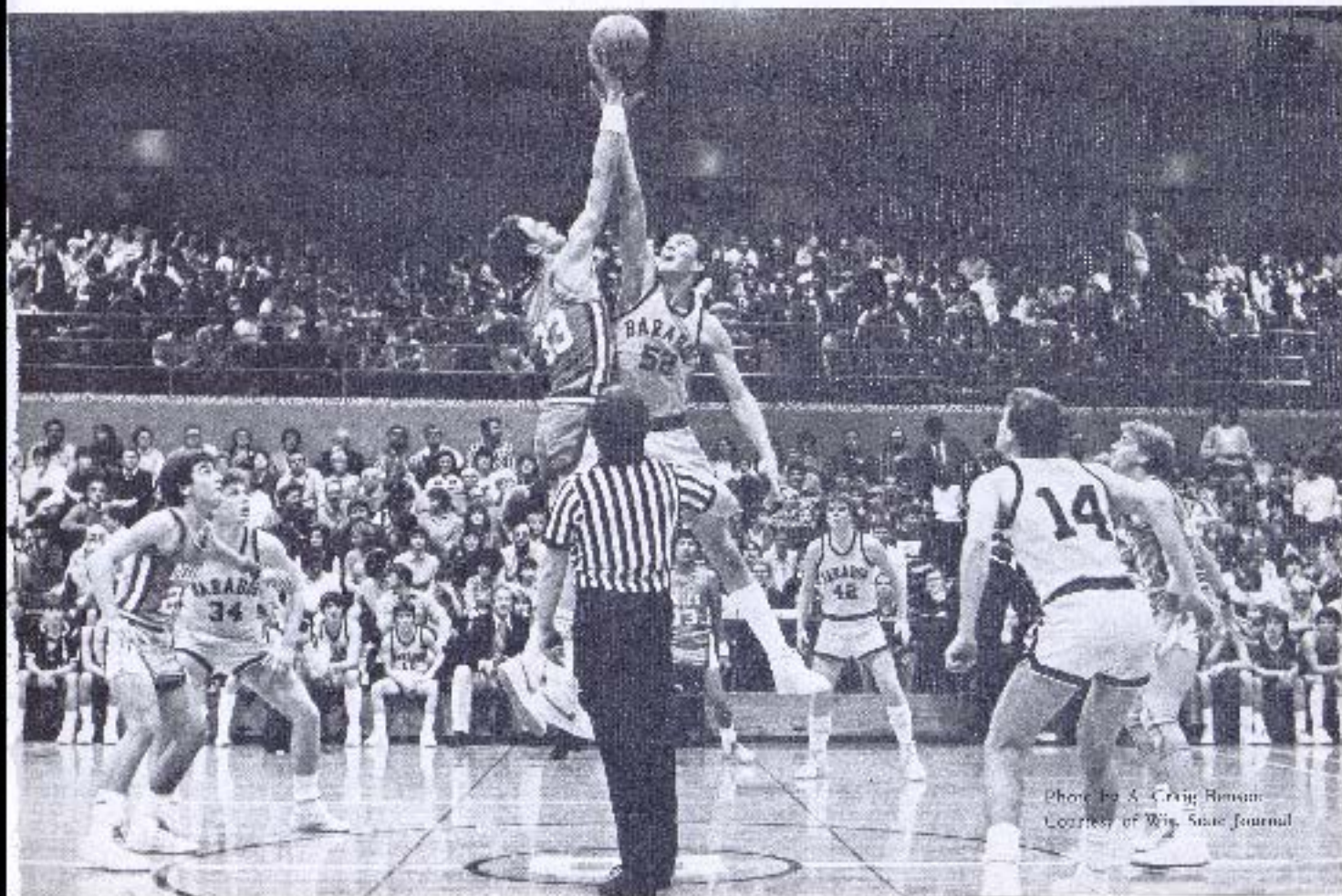

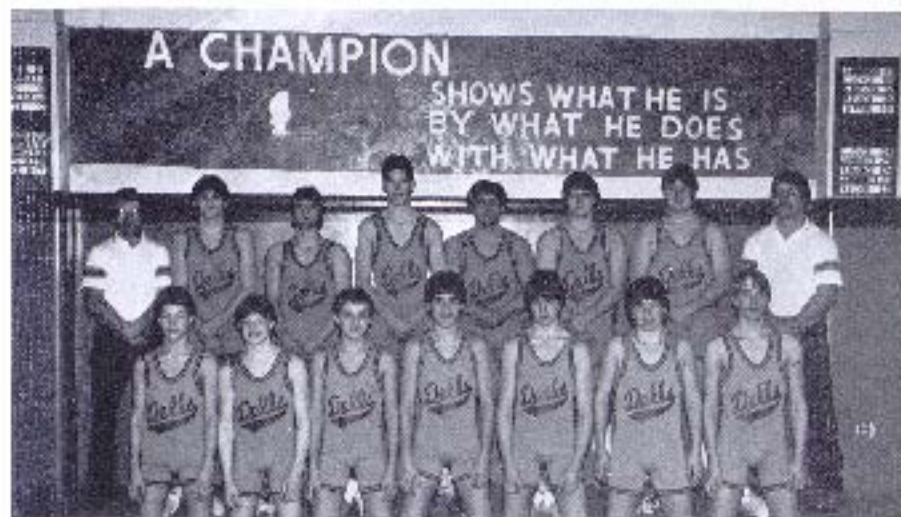

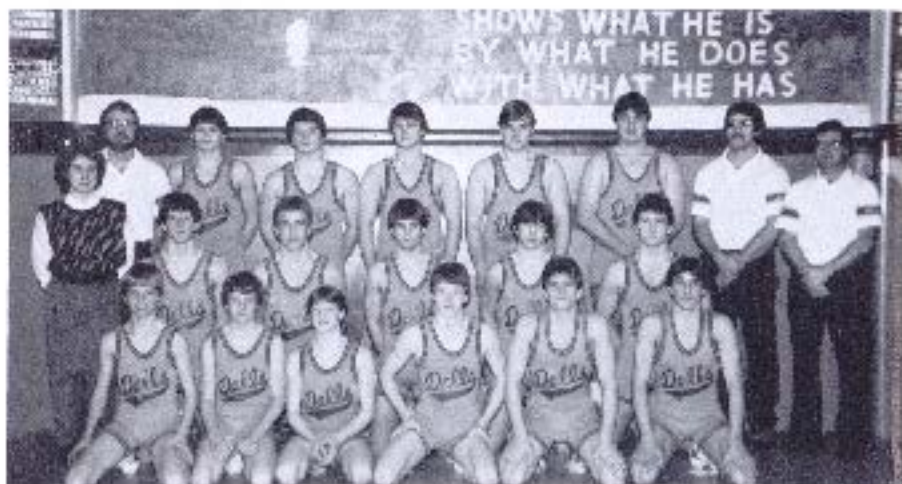
Varsity Wrestlers Have . . .

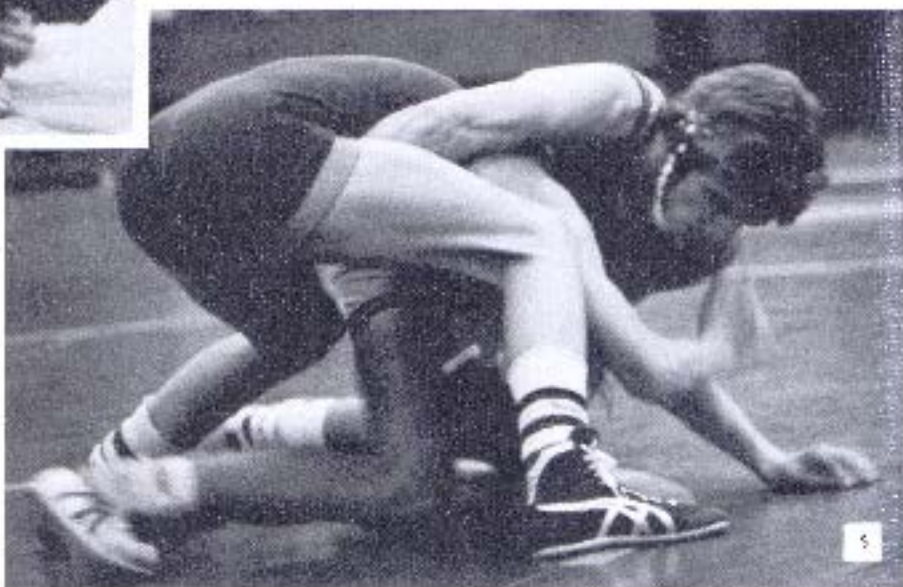

Running for city, county, and municipal offices and attending rallies, debates, and general sessions were all part of the daily routine.



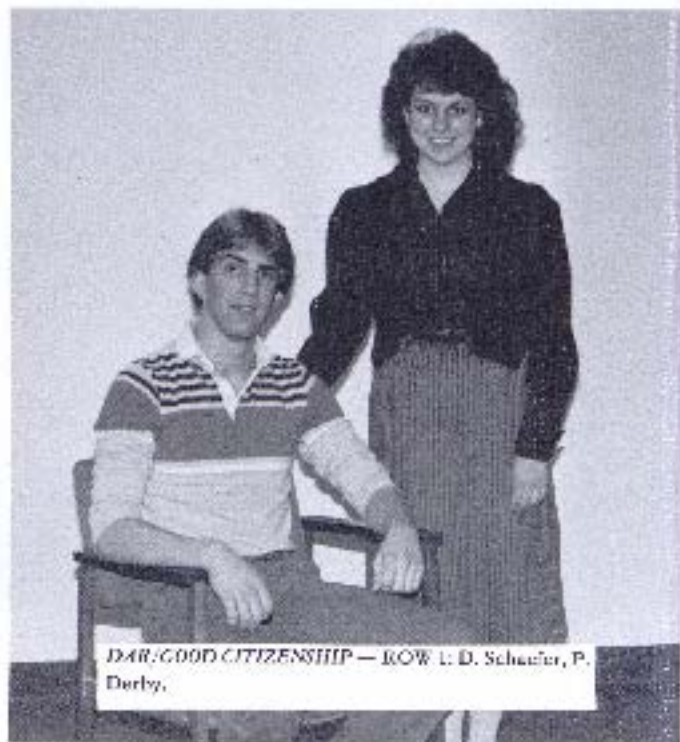

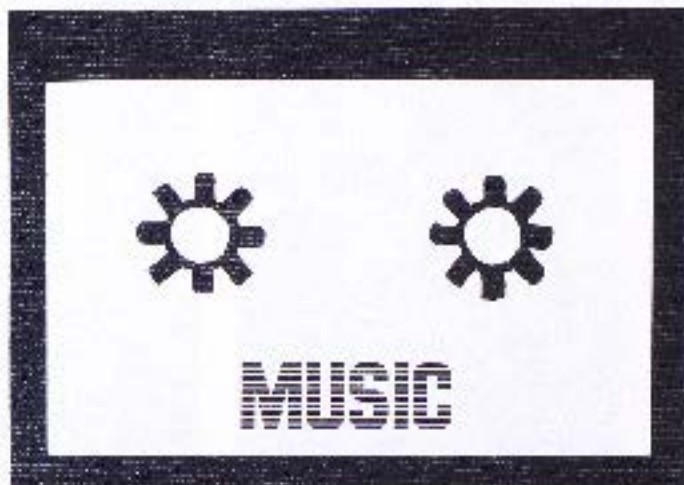
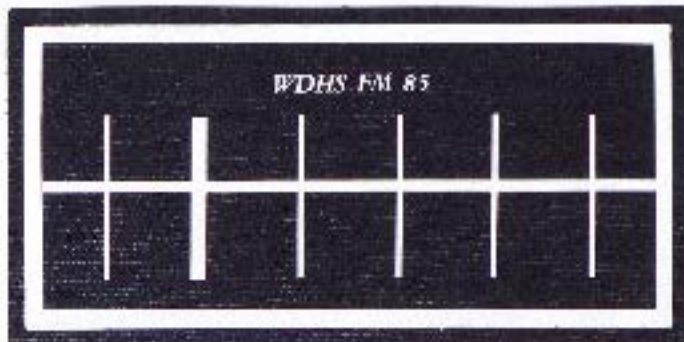
DAR/Good Citizenship

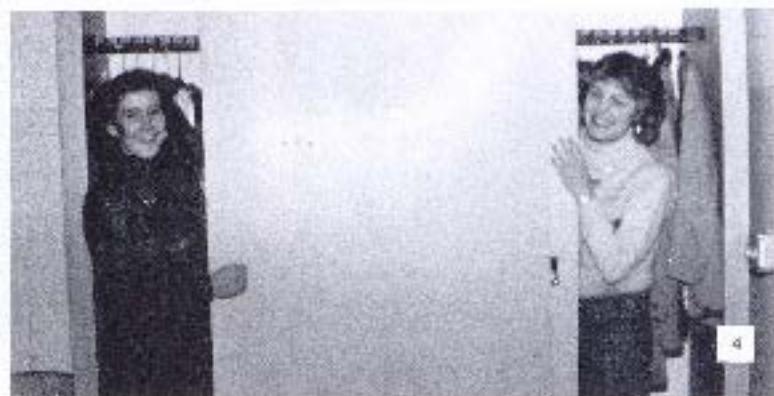
