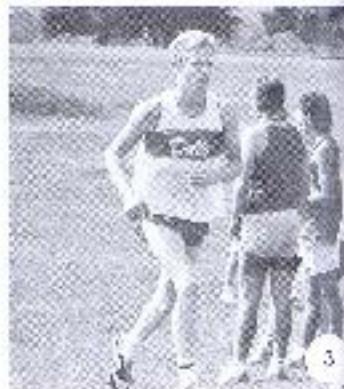
"I think it's good that we travel to other cities and compete," quoted Most Improved player Russ Erickson. "I like being part of the team and the good times we have."

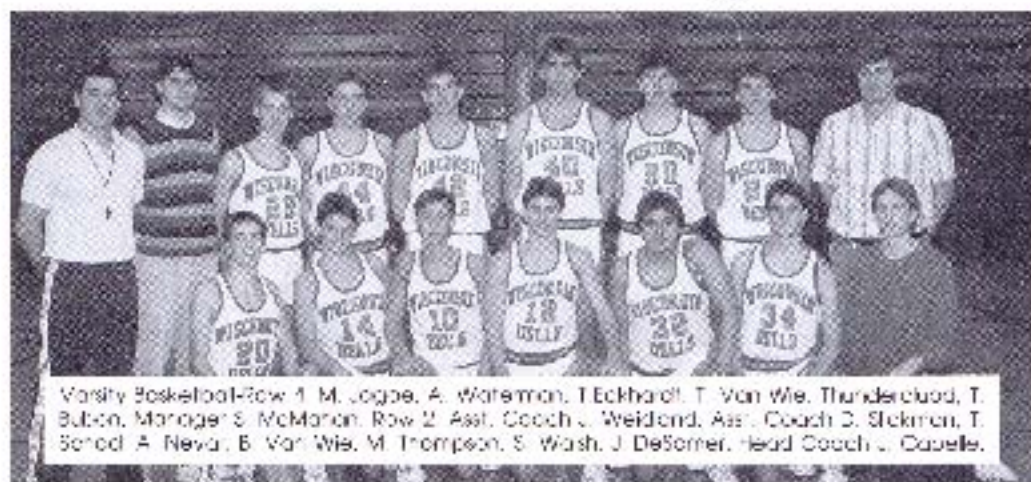

The Chiefs owe some of their success to the tremendous support they received to the spirit of the boys' basketball cheerleaders. "It was an added touch of support to the team and we appreciated it," commented Co-captain Jen Waterman.

The Varsity squad consisted of five seniors who led the way: Julie Anchor, Heather Geyman, Traci Rose, Jen Waterman, and Marvina Young. Julie and Heather finished out the year strong coming off injuries occurring in the middle of the season. Traci was described by Coach Tucker as having "speed, heart and more speed." Traci came from Mauston and became the point-guard floor-leader for the Dels. Because of Traci's quickness, she received the Coaches' Award. The MVP for the second year in a row was Jen. Jen can be considered a "living legend" in Wisconsin Dells Basketball as well as Wisconsin Basketball. In three years Jen beat the school record for most points scored by scoring an awesome 1,200 points, averaging 22 points a game in the 1988-89 season. In both Jen's junior and senior years, she was voted unanimous First Team All-Conference. Jen has also been recognized as a Top 10 player in the state. Because of Jen's determination and hard work she received a Division I Scholarship from UW-Wisconsin-Madison.

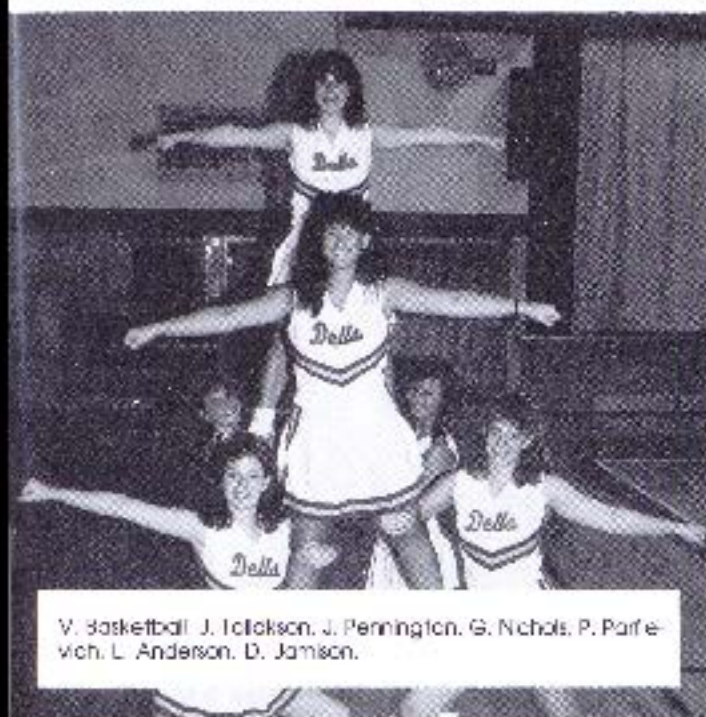

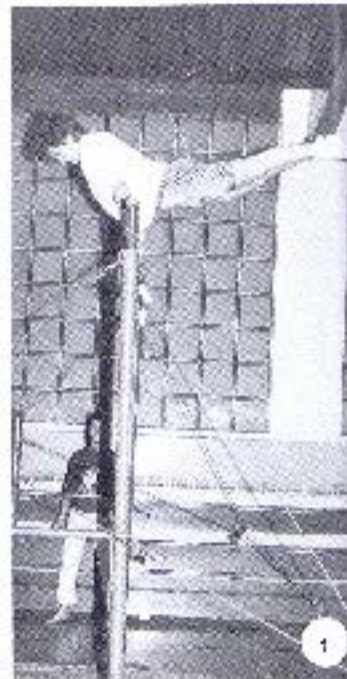
State was a goal to many of the team members. Until this year, members could not attend sectional or state competitions.

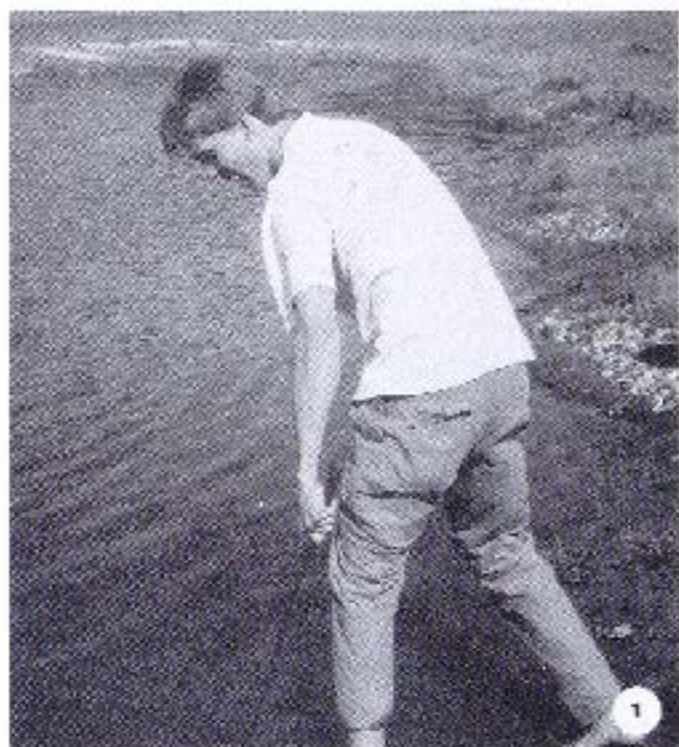

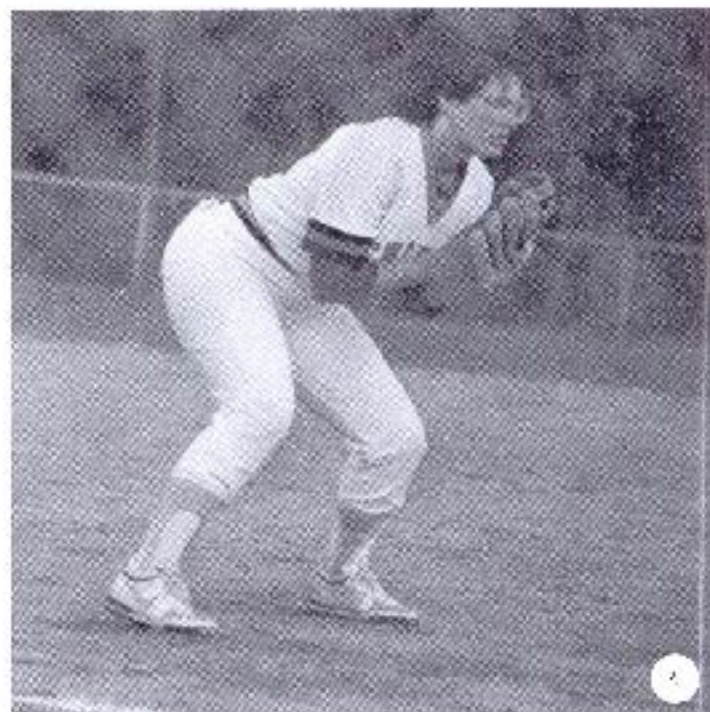

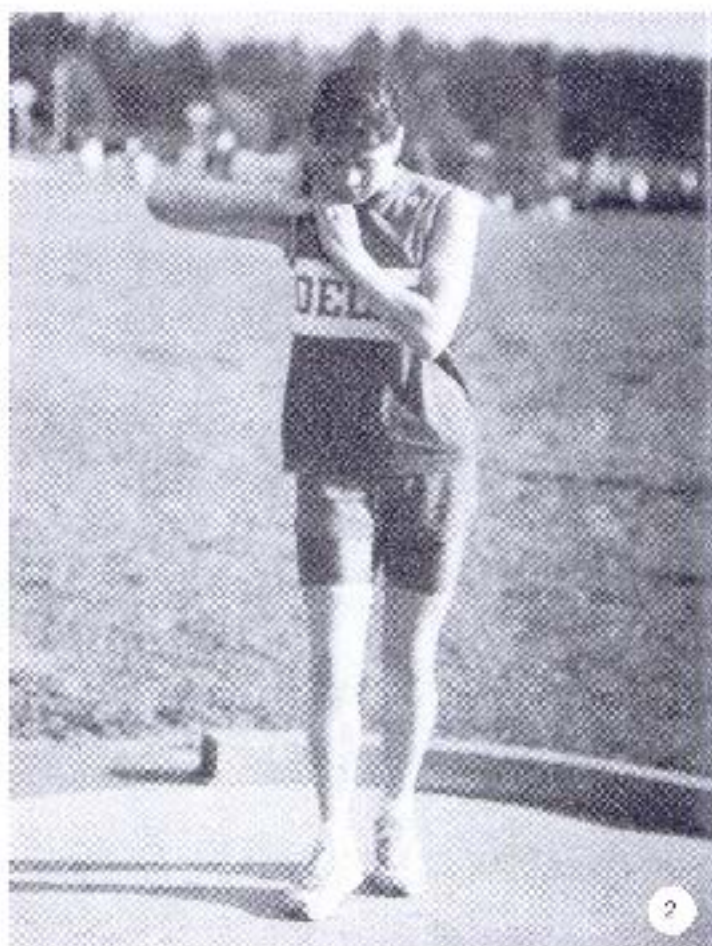


The tension pulses in your veins and your adrenalin begins to rise. You explode out of the starting blocks at the sound of the gun's powerful echo . . .

Is bigger better? Does size equal success? Members of the boys' track team do not think so. Last spring's team may have lacked members, but they continued to show high performance standards.

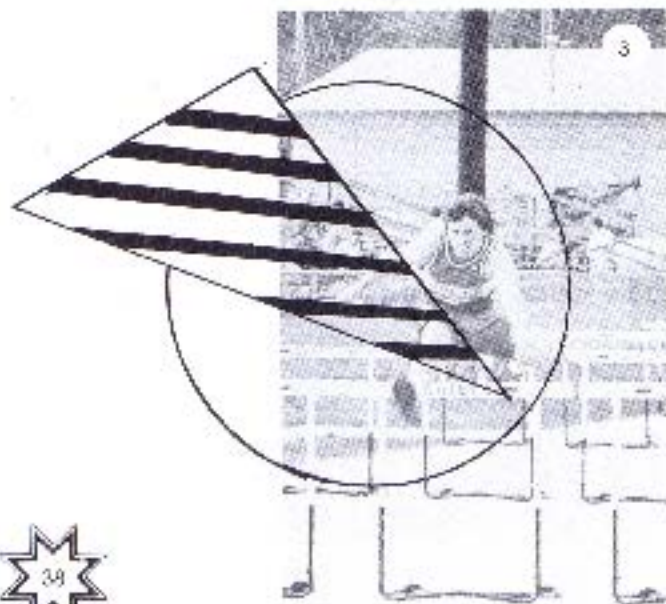

Then, before we know it, the weekend is over and we are in class Monday morning. As we struggle to do the homework we failed to do and sit back and wonder where the weekend went.

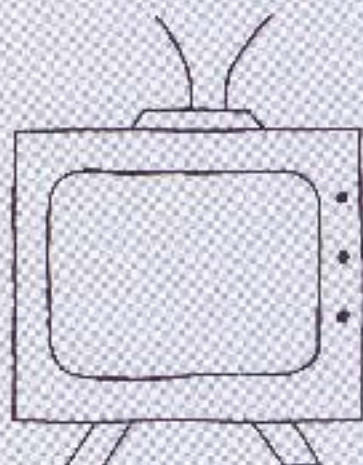

Jim Kadera added, "Long hours of individual and group study sessions were a must but it's easy to become discouraged because a person can cram and cram and only get half of the questions right."

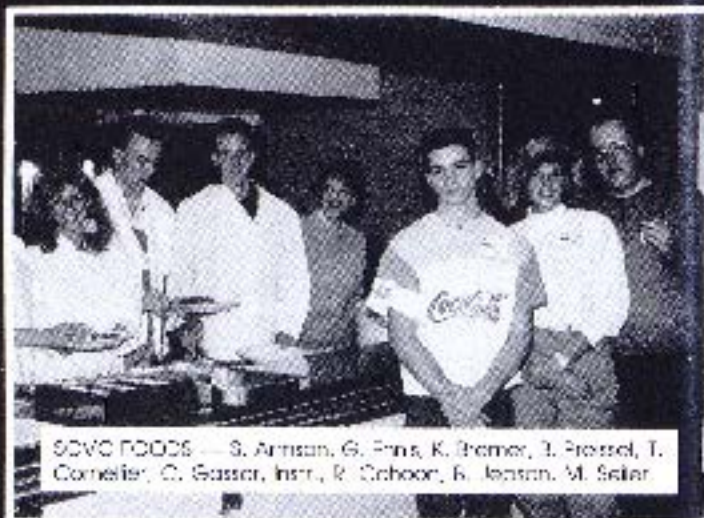

SCVC is the South Central Vocational Center in Baraboo. It offers classes in Building Trades, Food Service, and Health Occupations to juniors and seniors from Wisconsin Dells, Baraboo, and Portage. A few of our students spend each school day afternoon in the Health Occupation class and Food Service class. These career based classes are very educational to those interested in these fields.

The Health Occupations course gives students an opportunity to explore health careers. These students have opportunities to actually visit hospitals and perform as Nursing Assistants. Units of study include basic anatomy, diseases, human behavior, communications and Standard First Aid. A certificate of training is issued to the student upon completion of this course to work at a hospital as a Nursing Assistant.

The Food Service program is also career-based and teaches students communications, hygiene, preparation techniques and nutrition. The students visit restaurants, cater events, tour MATC, enter competitions and create ice carvings. Food Service students bake cookies and sell subs to their schools for fundraisers. Overall it helps a person to obtain background for the food service career.

Math League "The science of numbers and their operations and the relations between them and of space configurations and their structure of measurement."

To some students this definition of mathematics is quite confusing, but to the few students who are in the Math league it's quite familiar.

The Math League advisor, Mr. Geyman, says that the total number of participants has increased greatly over the past few years. Last year was the first year that Freshman and Sophomores were allowed to compete. Students in Math IV are required to compete, but how do the other students get involved? Students receiving an A or B in math class are allowed to participate in the math league. Also the math teachers may ask students if they would like to join.

When Katrina Chwala was asked why she enjoyed the math league she commented, "It gives you a chance to see how you compare your math ability with kids from all over the state. It also gives you some experience with solving problems different from a textbook."

The math league meets during reading period in the library, to take these tests. Then Mr. Schaur and Mr. Geyman record the results and the four students in each class compete at the South Central Conference Math Tournament in March. There are six contests each year and the tests are created by Beloit College. Mr. Geyman sends in the results from every test and Beloit College keeps track of the scores.

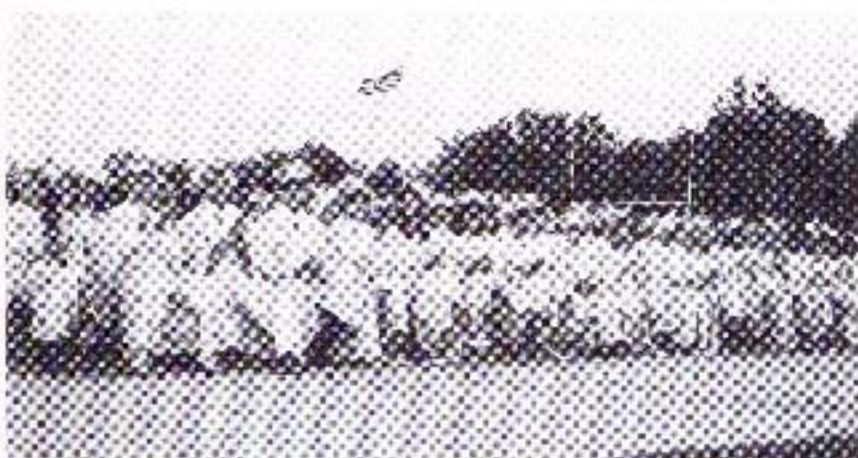
You came into the year with a reputation for arrogance, impudence and impatience. As is always the shortcoming of prejudice, the many were labeled with the most noticeable faults of the few.
