

Another activity of the Camera Club was taking pictures of couples at the Prom.


To raise money for flood lights, which they plan to buy next year, they sold popcorn during the basketball season.






























# Class History


To our dear old school building itself, we leave the peaceful quiet caused by our absence and any apple cores, wads of gum or crumpled notes we may have left about.
