During the time the present Wisconsin Dells High School has been in existence, there has been only one man holding the honored office of principal.




Commenting on the WDHS students, Mr. Reineking stated, "The students are sharp, excellent competitors, and always ready to compete. After all, life is competition."

### Class Togetherness Makes Year Successful





### Juniors Invade Big Cities








# Freshmen Begin Long Road Ahead




# Female Netters Face Tough Competition


## Netmen Place Fifth in Conference Standing





The 1976 Dells football team was very successful. The Chiefs completed the regular season with 9 wins—0 losses. This was only the second time in history the Chiefs went undefeated. 









## Future Stars Gain Valuable Experience





The Grapplers also surprised many people throughout the state by placing fifth in the prestigious Badger State Tournament.




## Young Grapplers Pin Hopes on Future




## Chiefs Get New Start with Lewison





# Students Show Their Talents





The fundamentals of family life, cooking, clothing and child care are subjects covered in home economics. Mrs. Brew and Mrs. Golz, teach these classes which are open to both boys and girls.

The food classes have an annual buffet for the faculty, prepare meals for their own groups and visit the grocery store to study food buying. They also have demonstrations of prepared dishes.


Housing and family living classes tour area homes to observe real situations in family life.



## Student Reporters Cover School News


Journalism classes at W.D.H.S. broaden the students scope in the field of mass communication.








#### English/Spanish

### Library/Study Hall


# Center for Research and Study




# Special Departments Aid Students and Teachers


