




#### The Iran Crisis . . .



#### Our Very Own ...



#### A Wisconsin First . . .



#### New Look For Fall . . .




#### "Dells Country"

#### Special Tribute . . .



# Seniors












### Administration Adds to Class

The administration seems to be overlooked frequently, but the time they spend is greatly valued and needed. These people prove to be an all-important critical link between the community and the school.











### Big Business

Will the Dells eventually be run by robots and computers? WDHS science students prepared for this possible encounter by studying the forces that pull on an object, its composition, and energy source.


The Freshmen classes did everything from making lipstick to errupting volcanoes. These projects were part of the General Science and Physical Science II curriculum, which introduced a basic knowledge of science. Electronics students spent hours wiring and rewiring breakers, switches, and batteries to find the perfect connection. Disecting various creatures and viewing organisms under the close lense of a microscope occupied Biology students.

Upperclassmen had the option of experimenting with three science courses. Chemistry students learned new principles with the assistance of substitute teacher, Mr. Harlan Feldt. The periodic chart became as familiar as the teacher, and was especially useful in balancing equations. Students enrolled in Physics experimented with the laws of matter, which involved vector addition, converting pounds to newtons, and solving torque problems. The computer science department added one new computer this year, making three terminals available for use in Computer Science. The studies consisted of daily classroom discussion plus developing programs. One program, student oriented, made printed computer class lists available for the first time.

These science courses gave students an understanding of the present-day life and introduced the possibilities of the futuristic world. Whether years ahead will bring robot villages or a community on the moon, Dells students have basic background knowledge pertaining to the science of the future.

The history lesson began with freshmen studying World History or Humanities. These courses took an in depth look at ancient civilizations. U.S. History lead the Junior Class from the Boston Tea Party through World War II. Film strips helped the students visualize the changes America encountered. Seniors focused on the economic, political, and social problems governments face. Social Problems also required seniors to look to the

future by preparing a career paper to assist them in choosing a vocation.

Our first stop deals with freshmen and sophomores. At this time you are required to take two full years of English.




### Let's Get Physical

### Specialized Courses Add Variety



The advisor, Mr. Dean Piehl, has been involved with the FFA for three years. Mr. Piehl remarked that a combination of competition and actually learning benefited all members.







# Old Attraction - Talk of the Town




# Symphony Band Goes on Tour







# On the Road Again





As the year drew to a close, members were filled with memories of strenuous rehearsals, lengthy bus rides, and rousing applause. Participants realized that all of their work and practice had been worth the satisfaction of knowing they had put on a spectacular show. While members may be relieved that the hectic schedules and the rehearsals are over, they will miss the friendships, glitter, and excitement that comes from being a part of the Corporation.



### Batmen/Sparkle on New Diamond





#### Track Attracts






The season was summed up by Most Valuable Player, Paula Ramsey, commenting, "The overall attitude was great, but it was mixed with the normal ups and downs of any sport."

### Chiefs Display Exuberant Effort



#### Chiefs' New Field Adds Appeal
















#### Young Gridders Hold Potential Power
