Social Studies at WDHS provides students with an experience to travel throughout the past and the present with reading and projects. Three years of social studies are required, and students are offered a wide range of classes.
The journey begins with freshmen starting out on the road to understanding World History. Their choice includes either History 9 or Humanities. The students' journey through time continues with their junior year in U. S. History. These classes give the chance to learn about yesterday and today through reports and research.
Social Problems is the next stop on this excursion, and students learn about government, society, and other related subjects. Through projects on vocations, speakers, and bulletin boards, the students are subjected to universal culture.
A new course offered this year, Wisconsin Studies, gives students a better background of our state and the early history of the region. Current Affairs is also a new class being introduced which centers around the current problems of today.

## Science

Since the beginning of time, man has been a species filled with curiosity. He has always had a need to find out "Why". A goal of the WDHS Science Department is to allow students to further that desire in order to help them discover new insights. This year the department has the help of two new additions to it's "storehouse of knowledge": a computer and a greenhouse. Both of these items are extremely useful in enriching the science curriculum. Whether matching brains with the computer or playing doctor in the "plant hospital," science students discover many daily challenges. Electronics, ISCS, Biology, Zoology, Chemistry, Botany and Physics make up the great variety of courses offered to WDHS young "scientists.'

"In math you learn techniques to solve problems. This problem solving approach helps you, not only in math, but in all other classes," stated Mr. Geyman.

Mathematics is one of the most useful and fascinating divisions of human knowledge. It helps in many important areas of study and solves some of the deepest puzzles man faces.

A new course, Constructive Geometry, has been added to the curriculum this year. Constructive geometry is based on inductive reasoning and students form conclusions based on constructions with compasses and straight edges. Other math classes available for students are Algebra II, general math, Math IV, and geometry.

## Phy. Ed. <br> Health

Getting in shape is a main objective for physical education students. Students learn new techniques and acquire skills through various activities while also getting a chance to have fun, compete, and let out frustrations.

Running and exercising are only a small portion of an average gym class at WDHS. Freshmen and sophomores meet on a regular basis to participate in such activities as volleyball, gymnastics, tennis, and softball. Juniors and seniors have the advantage to choose their own gym units. Units, which are three weeks in length, range from self defense to weight control.

Physical Education classes are only one aspect of keeping the body healthy. Another way of accomplishing this is through the health course required by all sophomore students. This course teaches the fundamentals of physical, mental, and social health, including caring for teeth, the dangers of drugs and alcohol, bandaging, first aid and CPR.
